I read J. C. shows me more & more
what amount of work you are putting
in. And this perhaps is the last

exciting part of the work. I am
wishing to relieve you of some
of the strain. And yet can I? I
must challenge arrest. The strain
upon you will therefore continue.
May God give you strength to
bear it.

I have sent^{to Mr. C. H.} a very important
letter to Lord Buxtonhill. After you
