Report of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope for the year 1900.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by command of His Excellency the Governor.
1901.

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1900.

2. Three vacancies in the Council, caused by the resignation of the Hon. W. P. Schreiner, the decease of the Rev. J. Thompson, and the absence of the Rev. A. Hofmeyr from the meetings of the Council for more than six months without leave of the Council, were filled by the election by Convocation of the Hon. Sir W. Bisset Berry and the Hon. Sir H. H. Juta and by the appointment by Government of the Rev. C. F. J. Muller to the vacant seats.

3. Leave of absence for various periods was granted during the year to the following members of Council:—The Rev. T. Chubb, Canon Ogilvie, Dr. Hoffman, and Professor Lawn.

4. A vacancy in the office of Secretary of Convocation was filled by the re-election by Convocation of George Gilchrist, Esq., B.A., to the vacant office. Mr. Gilchrist resigned his office soon after his re-election on his departure for Europe. The vacancy thus created will be filled by Convocation at its next meeting.

5. A vacancy in the Council of the South African College was filled by the re-election by the University Council of the Right Hon. Sir J. H. de Villiers to the vacant seat.

15. A travelling grant of £120 was awarded to Mr. N. M. Hoogenhout, M.A., to enable him to continue his linguistic studies in Europe, the grant to be for one year, on the understanding that an application for a renewal for a second year would be favourably considered by the Council should satisfactory reports be received of the candidate's progress.

With reference to this Prize it has been decided that the Essays are in future to be handed in not later than the 31st of July. Certain alterations have also been made in the conditions under which the competition for this Prize is carried on. The subject for the competition in 1901 is "History of Geographical Discovery in South Africa from 1750 to 1820."

17. The Essay Subjects for 1901, and Special Examination Subjects for 1902, have been selected as follows:—

18. As a majority of the Colleges under the Higher Education Act were found to be in favour of changing the time of holding the University Examinations from June to the end of the year, the Council has resolved that from and after 1901 these Examinations will be held only in December, commencing on the first Monday after the fourth of the month.

The question of removing the School Examinations to the end of the year has also been under discussion, but no decision has yet been arrived at.

19. Certain changes, rendered necessary by the transfer of the University Examinations from the middle to the end of the year, have been made in the dates of University fixtures. Under the new scheme the Annual Graduation Ceremony will in future be held on the second Friday in February, and the age of candidates for Scholarships and Exhibitions will be reckoned from the first of July, instead of from the first of January preceding the Examination.

20. As it has been found expedient to reduce the number of Council Meetings from six to four per annum, a Committee, called the Vice-Chancellor's Committee, has been appointed to deal between the dates of Council Meetings, with matters of routine or of minor importance, or matters requiring immediate attention. The Council has every reason to think that this arrangement will be an improvement.

21. Under the Amended Regulations recently issued by the War Office, a Commission in the British Army will in future be offered annually to a student of the Cape University. In connection with these Regulations, the Council has decided that candidates for a nomination must be students who have passed the Intermediate Examination, and who have also passed in Geometrical Drawing at the First Mining Examination.

22. The General Regulations for the award of Scholarships have been amended by reducing the minimum aggregate of marks to qualify a candidate for a Scholarship, in either Department, from 1650 to 1600.

The fund bequeathed by the late Dr. Hiddingh for a Scholarship has been duly invested. The first competition for this Scholarship will be held in 1904.

As the revenue from the Porter Fund is now sufficient to provide one Scholarship each year, it has been decided to withdraw for the present the combined University and Maynard Scholarships, and to substitute therefor an additional Porter Scholarship.

23. The Regulations for the award of Exhibitions at the Intermediate Examination have been amended by requiring candidates for such Exhibitions to have passed the Matriculation Examination.

24. With reference to Exhibitions and Bursaries it has also been decided:—

- (1) That the term Bursary shall in future be restricted to awards made in connection with the School Examinations,
- (2) That all Exhibitioners and Bursars must continue their studies in Cape Colony or in some contributing Colony or State.
- (3) That Exhibitions and Bursaries shall be of two kinds—Major and Minor—and that the number and value of such Exhibitions and Bursaries shall be as follows:—

(Fractions not less than one-half being considered as wholes.)

- (4) That the Exhibitions and Bursaries shall be awarded by the Vice-Chancellor and Registrar, and that the list of awards shall be published at the same time as the Class Lists.

25. The Regulations for the M.A. Examination have been amended by the omission from Section 1 of the words "and will be held only in Cape Town," and by the addition of the following sentence to Section 4, "The *viva voce* Examination will be held only in Cape Town."

26. The syllabus in Geology for the B.A. Examination has been amended, and the Examinations in 1901 and 1902 will be conducted in accordance with the new syllabus.

* One being the Frere Exhibition.

In the case of Higher Mathematics the marks for each of the two Pass Papers have been increased from 300 to 350, and for the Honours Paper from 350 to 400.

It has also been decided that from and after 1902 practical work shall form a part of the Examination in Physics and Geology. From 1902 there will, therefore, be a practical examination in all the science subjects of the B.A. Examination.

27. Amended Regulations for the Intermediate Examination have been issued and will come into force in 1902.

28. The Chemistry Syllabus for the Matriculation Examination has been revised and somewhat simplified, and with a view to encouraging the study of History it has been resolved from and after 1902 to increase the marks assigned to History from 200 to 250 and to omit the third Modern Language from the list of optional subjects. It has also been resolved from and after 1902 to allow two hours for the Algebra paper and one hour for the Arithmetic paper, and to reduce the marks for Mathematics from 800 to 600.

29. No changes have been made in the Regulations for the Second Mining Examination.

30. In the case of the First Mining Examination the syllabus for Drawing has been revised and considerably modified, and it has been decided that candidates holding Teachers' Certificates in Freehand Drawing from the Education Department, or equivalent Certificates, will be excused the examination in Freehand Drawing. The subjects hitherto grouped under the heading of "Physics" have now been divided into Physics and Dynamics, the number of separate subjects at the First Mining Examination being thereby increased to six.

The Regulation governing the issue of Partial Certificates has now been amended so as to provide that such Certificates can only be gained if the candidate has passed in the aggregate and in all the separate subjects but one.

31. No changes have been made since last report in the Regulations for the Law Examinations, with the exception of the substitution after 1901 of Hall's *International Law* for Woolsey's *Introduction to the study of International Law*, and of Dicey's *Conflict of Laws* for Foote's *International Law*; the addition of the following paragraph to the Regulations for the Preliminary LL.B. Examination dealing with Roman-Dutch Law, viz. :—"Candidates are recommended to read Supreme Court Reports of cases bearing upon points of law and practice dealt with by the author"; and the exclusion of the *Law of Real Property* from the subject of English Law at the LL.D. Examination.

32. Amended Regulations for the School Elementary and School Higher Examinations have been issued and will come into force in 1902.

In the case of the School Higher Examination, Algebra and Geometry constitute under the new scheme one subject, but candidates who may be debarred by this arrangement from taking a third subject in Group II. (Science) will be able to take four instead of three subjects in Group I. (Literature). In all the compulsory subjects the percentage of marks required for a pass has been increased, from 20 to 33 in some cases, and from 20 to 25 in others.

In the case of the School Elementary Examination, Mathematics has been added to the list of optional subjects, and, as in the case of the School Higher Examination, the percentages for passing have been increased.

In both Examinations the syllabuses have been carefully revised and have, as far as possible, been brought into harmony with specific standards of the Education Department, the School Higher with Standard C., and the School Elementary with Standard VII. The new Regulations have been

prepared with a view to simplifying educational work by bringing the requirements of the University and Education Department into line, and the Council has good reasons for believing that the new scheme will command the general approval of those interested in these Examinations.

33. An Intermediate Division, corresponding to the Junior Centre Grade of the Associated Board, has been added to the scheme of Music Examinations.

With reference to the Examinations for Music Teachers it has been decided to discontinue the examination for Teachers of Class-Singing, no candidates having presented themselves for examination since the examination was instituted. It has also been decided to substitute Intermediate Harmony for Advanced Harmony as one of the preparatory examinations to be passed by all candidates.

The requirements and standards for each of the Music examinations of the University are now the same in every respect as for the corresponding examinations of the Associated Board.

34. Since the issue of last report the executors of the late Dr. Hiddingh have paid over to the University the sum of £23,800, being the amount, less legacy duty, bequeathed by the deceased for the purpose of building a University Hall and suitable University offices, and a Sites and Building Committee has been appointed to make such preliminary arrangements as may be necessary to carry into effect the wishes of the testator.

Acting upon the recommendations of the Committee the Council has resolved to proceed as soon as possible with the erection on the site bequeathed by Dr. Hiddingh of a building sufficient for present needs, and so constructed as to form the front of a larger quadrangular plan to be carried out whenever it is found necessary or desirable to do so, and to invite architects to send in competitive plans. The drafting of the conditions of competition has been taken in hand by the Committee, assisted by the Government Architect, whose services have been kindly placed by the Government for the purpose at the disposal of the University, and the Council hopes to be in a position to issue such conditions at any early date.

35. The Council desires to acknowledge the liberality of the Legislature in its grant to the University, both for general purposes and for bursaries.

36. Appended to this Report are:—(1) A tabular statement showing the results of all the examinations conducted by the University since its incorporation; (2) the usual financial statements, showing the receipts and expenditure of the year, and the position of each of the funds administered by the Council.
