## Report of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope for the year 1901.

 1902.

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1901 .
2. The lamented death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria having occurred early in the year, the University Council resolved to forward to His Majesty King Edward VII. a loyal and dutiful Address.
3. It is with great regret that the Council has to report the death of the Hon. Mr. Justice Smith, Chancellor of the University from 1898 to 1901. The Council resolved to express in the following Memorial Minute its sense of the loss sustained by the University:

The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope desires to place on record its high regard for the character of its late Chancellor, the Hon. Mr. Justice Smith, and its appreciation of the important services which he rendered to the cause of education in South Africa.
4. At a meeting of the Convocation of the University, held on June 1st, His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and York was unanimously elected Chancellor of the University in place of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Smith.
5. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and York was installed as Chancellor at a Congregation of the University, held on August 21st, in the Legislative Council Chamber, Houses of Parliament, and received on that occasion the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws. His Royal High-

ness graciously consented, at the request of the Vice-Chancellor, to convey the Council's Address to His Majesty the King. The following is the text of the Address presented:

## TO HIS MAJESTY THE KING.

May it please Your Majesty,
In name of Your University of the Cape of Good Hope we respectfully crave permission to approach Your Majesty's Throne.

We desire to take advantage of the auspicious occasion of the Installation of His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and York as Chancellor of the University, to offer to Your Majesty and to Your Royal Consort, through our Chancellor, the assurance of our deep sympathy in the loss which has fallen on Your Majesties and on the Empire in the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

To the cause of education among all ranks of Her subjects, both in Great Britain and in Her Empire overseas, the patronage of Her late Majesty was ever extended graciously and ungrudgingly and with the happiest results.

By this University Her Majesty will be held in grateful remembrance as our Gracious Foundress, from Whose charter we draw recognition and perpetuity .

We desire to offer to You and to Your Consort the humblest and most earnest assurances of our devotion to Xour Throne, and to express our heartfelt wish and hope that the reign of Your Majesties may be marked by all the virtues which will keep illustrious the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

We respectfully ask for this University, in its succession of Officers and Graduates, and in the discharge of the duties entrusted to it by Your Revered Predecessor's charter, the continuance of Your Majesty's gracious protection and favour.

6. On hearing that His Royal Highness the Chancellor had been created Prince of Wales, the Vice-Chancellor forwarded through His Excellency the Governor the following congratulatory message from the University:

The University of the Cape of Good Hope sends respectful greetings to her Chancellor His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.
To this message a reply was received conveying the thanks of His Royal Highness to the University for its congratulations.
7. To commemorate the visit to South Africa of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, the Citizens' Reception Committee has founded a University Prize, to be called the Cornwall and York Prize, for the encouragement of scientific research. It is expected that this Prize will be open for competition for the first time in 1903, and tbe Council trusts that it will be the means of stimulating original work amung the students of the Natural and Physical Sciences in South Africa.
8. The office of Vice-Chancellor, left vacant by the retirement through effluxion of time of Dr. Muir, C.M.G., was filled by the election of the Hon. Sir John Buchanan.
9. The office of Pro Vice-Chancellor, vacated by the Hon. Sir John Buchanan, was filled by the election of Dr. Muir, C.M.G.
10. A vacancy in the Council, caused by the retirement of the Right Hon. Sir J. H. de Villiers, LL.D., K.C.M.G., P.C., was filled by the appointment by Government of the Hon. Mr. Justice Maasdorp to the vacant seat.
11. Leave of absence for various periods was granted during the year to the following members of Council: The Right Hon. Sir J. H. de Villiers, Mr. Russell, the Right Rev. Dr. Gibson, the Hon. J. X. Merriman, Rev. T. Chubb, Professor Bodkin, the Hon. Sir Henry Juta.
12. A vacancy in the Vice-Chancellor's Committee, caused by the resignation of the Rev. Dr. Cameron, was filled by the election of the Hon. C. Abercrombie Smith. Two vacancies in the Honorary Degrees Committee, caused by the retirement of the Right Hon. Sir J. H. de Villiers and the resignation of the Rev. Dr. Cameron, were filled by the election of the Hon. Mr. Justice Maasdorp and the Rev. Dr. Walker. Dr. Muir was elected a member of the Science Committee.
13. The Rev. Dr. Walker was re-elected President of Convocation for a period of two years. The vacancy in the office of Secretary of Convocation, referred to in the Report of last year, was filled by the election of Mr. Charles Murray.
14. Vacancies in the Comncil of the South African College, caused by the resignations of the Hon. Mr. Justice Smith and the Right Hon. Sir J. H. de Villiers, were filled by the appointment of Dr. Anderson, to hold office for three years, and the Hon. T. L. Graham, to hold office for two years.

31. At the last Council Meeting of the previous year a letter was submitted from the Under Colonial Secretary requesting the views of the University Council upon a petition (with draft chater) addressed to Her Majesty Queen Victoria by the Faculty of Divinity of the Church of the Province of South Africa, and praying for the recognition of degrees conferred by the Faculty. After receiving a Report from a Committee appointed to obtain information on the whole subject, the Council passed the following resolutions:-
(i) "That in the opinion of the Council it is expedient that the University should take steps to secure power to confer Divinity Degrees."
(ii.) "That the Under Colonial Secretary be informed that the University has decided to apply for power to confer Degrees in Divinity, and therefore does not consider it advisable that similar powers should be conferred on any other body."

Owing to the fact that Parliament has not met since these resolutions were passed, the Council has not had the opportunity of taking further action.
32. The Council notes that the Regulations for admission to the Civil Service have been so modified as to give certain concessions to graduates and undergraduates of the University. The Council welcomes a change which will tend to encourage a larger number of candidates to continue their school and college education for a longer period and thus enter the Public Service with higher qualifications and higher emoluments.
33. During the year the Council appointed a deputation to interview the Government with a view to securing the appointment of a Commission representing the Civil Service, the Civil Service Commission, and the University Council to diseuss and report on the whole question of admission to the Civil Service. The deputation was, however, owing to various circumstances not received by the Prime Minister during the year, so that the matter stands over for further report.
34. In view of the increase in the clerical work of the University, due to the development of its scope and functions and to the growth of the number of candidates for examination, the Council resolved, in accordance with the provisions of the University Incorporation Act, to appoint an additional officer, to be styled "Clerk of the University," and elected Mr. C. S. Edgar, M.A. (Edin.), B.A. (Oxon.), to the office thus instituted.
35. A decree with reference to the simplification of French Syntax having been recently issued by the Minister of Public Instruction in France, the Council has decided to permit candidates to use the simplified forms in all examinations of the University.
36. During the year the Council received invitations to send representatives to the Celebrations of the Millenary of King Alfred the Great and
the Ninth Jubilee of Glasgow University, and appointed the Rev. Dr. Marais and the Right Hon. the Chief Justice respectively, to act as its representatives at these functions.
37. During the year examination centres were, at the request of certain prisoners of war, and with the consent of the military authorities, established at St. Helena and Simonstown, and a petition to form a centre at Bermuda for this year's examinations has been conditionally granted by the Council.
38. The Council has resolved that no candidate who has passed any examination of the University in any class shall be re-admitted to the same examination.
39. The Amended B.A. Regulations referred to in previous Reports have been approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council, and will come into force in December, 1903.

The changes in the B.A. Regulations will necessitate corresponding changes in the M.A. Regulations as well as in the Regulations for Scholarships, and Committees of the Council have been entrusted with the drafting of amended schemes.

The drafting of the Regulations for the conduct of the Practical Examinations instituted in all the Science subjects under the Amended B.A. Scheme, has been referred to the Science Committee.
40. The Amended Regulations for the Intermediate Examination referred to in last Report, which came into force this year, have been further amended by the inclusion of Zoology and Geology in the list of the alternative Science subjects.
41. The resolution referred to in last Report to reduce the time assigned to the Matriculation Arithmetic Paper has been rescinded, and two hours will be allowed for this paper in 1902. Certain other changes in the Matriculation Regulations are being considered.
42. Acting on the recommendation of the Committee of Examiners in Law, the Council has reduced the minima in all failing subjects in the Law Examinations from one-half to two-fifths of the possible marks. It has also referred to the Law Committee the question of the revision of the LL.D. Regulations.
43. Slight verbal amendments have been made in the Regulations for the Degrees of M.Sc. and B.Sc. in Mining Engineering.
44. The Amended Regulations for the School Higher and the School Elementary Examinations referred to in last Report will come into froce at the Examinations in November next. The marks assigned to History at the School Higher Examination have been raised from 200 to 300.
45. In view of the great increase in the number of candidates for the Music Examinations, arrangements have been made for these Examinations to be conducted in future by two Examiners annually. The Examinations this year will be conducted by Professors Franklin Taylor and Oscar Beringer.
46. In connection with the Music Examinations the Council has instituted a number of Music Bursaries, and the drafting of regulations for the award and tenure of these has been referred to the Music Committee.
47. The Council desires to acknowledge the liberality of the Legislature in its grant to the University, both for general purposes and for bursaries.
48. Appended to this Report are:-(1) A tabular statement showing the results of all the examinations conducted by the University since its incorporation; (2) The usual financial statements, showing the receipts and expenditure for the year, and the position of each of the funds administered by the Council.
