18. In view of the increase in the clerical work of the University, due to the development of its scope and functions and the growth in the numbers of candidates for examination, the Council having resolved, in accordance with the provisions of the University Incorporation Act, to appoint an additional officer, to be styled "Clerk of the University," elected Mr. C. S. Edgar, M.A. (Edin.), B A. (Oxon.), to the office thus instituted.

19. During the year the Council received invitations to send representatives to the Celebrations of the Tercentenary of the Bodleian Library, Oxford, the Jubilees of Sydney University and of Owens College, Manchester, and the Installation of the President of the Northwestern University, Evanstown, Chicago. In the case of the last three invitations the Council, while recording its appreciation of the honour paid it by these institutions, regretted that it was unable to send representatives to the respective celebrations. The Rev. Dr. Cameron represented the University at the Bodleian Tercentenary, and on behalf of the University presented the following congratulatory address to the University of Oxford:—

"The University of the Cape of Good Hope desires to convey to the Vice-Chancellor and the University of Oxford its hearty congratulations on the occasion of the three-hundredth anniversary of the foundation by Sir Thomas Bodley of the magnificent library which bears the name of its founder.

Our University, though young in years, and wanting in those noble traditions which are the heritage of the older Universities of Europe, claims nevertheless a place, however humble, in the fellowship of those great institutions which have fostered the intellectual life of the world; and we aspire to emulate, in a distant land, the illustrious example of Oxford in maintaining a high

standard of learning and in encouraging by all the means in our power the intellectual life of the country. In this aspiration we shall be stimulated by the example, and we trust that we shall be sustained by the generous sympathy of the University of Oxford."

- 20. In the report of last year it was stated that the Council had appointed a deputation to interview the Government with a view to securing the appointment of a Commission representing the Civil Service, the Civil Service Commission and the University Council, to discuss and report on the whole question of admission to the Civil Service. This deputation was received by the Prime Minister in May, but was unable to persuade him to grant the appointment of the Commission as requested.
- 21. In the report for 1901 the Council noted with satisfaction that the regulations for admisssion to the Civil Service had been so modified as to give certain concessions to graduates and undergraduates of the University. These privileges have since been further extended in the case of Third Class Intermediate and Second Class Matriculated undergraduates. The Council welcomes such changes, as tending to encourage a larger number of candidates to continue their school and college education for a longer period and thus enter the Public Service with higher qualifications.
- 22. In order to provide examination facilities for members of the Civil Service resident in England, a centre for the Civil Service Law Examination has been established in London.
- 23. The Council notes with gratification that the University of Oxford has extended the privileges granted to this University and to its other affiliated institutions, thus exempting qualified Colonial students from one year's residence and from certain of the examinations required for a degree.
- 24. The Council is further pleased to note that the University of London now admits graduates of this University to the privilege of being registered as students without passing the London Matriculation Examination.
- 25. The Council is pleased to be able to report that, in accordance with the provisions of the University Act, arrangements have been made whereby the School, Music, Arts, Science and Law Examinations of the University are held in Natal, Transvaal, Orange River Colony and Rhodesia, under the auspices of the Education Departments of these Colonies.
- 26. The Council has entered into an arrangement with the Governments of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony to conduct on behalf of these Governments certain qualifying examinations in Law for Attorneys and Civil Servants. The standards for passes in these examinations are the same as for the corresponding Cape Examinations, and the subjects are the same but for the substitution of the local Statute Law in each case in place of the Cape Statute Law.

- 27. At the instance of the Natal Government, negotiations are proceeding for the substitution of the University's Examinations in Law for the examinations which at present qualify for practice in Natal.
- 28. With reference to the Matriculation Examination, no important change has been made during the year in the regulations. The Council has, however, decided that each paper shall in future occupy three hours; the Botany syllabus has been slightly modified and the marks for English have been redistributed between the two papers.
- 29. During the year the amended regulations for the Intermediate Examination came into force. Provisional syllabuses in Geology and Zoology were adopted, and these, along with the Botany syllabus, have since been revised for the examination of 1903.
- 30. With reference to the amended regulations for the B.A. Examination, which come into force in 1903, the Council resolved to require, for Honours in Modern Languages the philology of two languages only, along with the literature of three, instead of the philology as well as the literature of all three languages. Certain changes were also made in the textbooks prescribed in grammar and history of language for the Modern Languages Honours Examination.
- 31. Recommendations with reference to the conduct of the practical examinations under the amended B.A. regulations are under consideration. Special arrangements were made for the examinations of the past year, held under the existing regulations.
- 32. Pending the adoption of amended regulations for the M.A. Examination, the existing regulations remain in force, a more detailed syllabus in the departments of Mathematics and Physics having been added during the year.
- 33. The drafting of amended regulations for the M.A. Examination, referred to above, has been completed, and the recommendations of the Committee are under consideration by the Council.
- 34. The drafting of regulations for the degrees of D Litt. and D.Sc. has been deferred until the amended M.A. regulations have been finally adopted.
- 35. The privileges conferred under the special regulations for the LL.B. degree have been extended to Bachelors of Civil Law of the University of Oxford and to Oxford Bachelors of Arts who have graduated with First or Second Class Honours in the Final School of Jurisprudence.
- 36. It has been decided to divide the Committee of Examiners in Law into two Committees, one to deal with the LL.D., LL.B. and Civil Service Higher Law Examinations, and the other to deal with the Law Certificate and Civil Service Lower Law Examinations.

- 37. Slight modifications have been made in the Spherical Trigonometry, Coordinate Geometry, and Geodesy syllabuses for the Survey Examination. The question of providing a more detailed syllabus in Geodesy has been referred to a Committee for consideration and report.
- 38. The Council has resolved that in and after 1903 the minima for a pass at the Second and Final Mining Examinations shall be one-third of the possible marks in subjects and two-fifths in aggregates. The Council has further resolved to add a second paper in Mechanical Engineering at the Final Mining Examination.
- 39. Certain modifications in the regulations for the degree of B. Sc. in Mining Engineering are under consideration.
- 40. Amended regulations for scholarships, necessitated by the Amended B.A. Regulations, have been drafted and will be considered by the Council at an early meeting, so as to come into force at the examinations of 1903.
- 41. Regulations for the award and tenure of the Cornwall and York Prize have been adopted and published. With a view to the encouragement of scientific research, this prize will be awarded biennially to the author of the best dissertation dealing with any scientific subject. The Council trusts that it will thus be the means of stimulating original work among the students of the Natural and Physical Sciences in South Africa.
- 42. Regulations for the award and tenure of the Music Bursaries instituted last year have been framed and published. The value of the Music Exhibition has been raised from £75 to £125 per annum, experience having shown that the former amount was insufficient to support the exhibitioner during the course required by the regulations.
- 43. The Council desires to acknowledge the liberality of the Legislature in its grant to the University both for general purposes and for bursaries.
- 44. The Council has pleasure in reporting that progress is being made towards the erection of suitable University Buildings. A competition for architects has been initiated and will, the Council trusts, be the means of providing shortly designs for a building worthy of the University and the country. For the liberal grant by the Legislature towards this object, the Council tenders its grateful thanks.
- 45. The Council desires to place on record its appreciation of the munificence of the Legislature in founding, during the past session, the Queen Victoria Scholarships in commemoration of the reign of Her late Majesty. The establishment of these scholarships appears to the Council the most appropriate method of commemorating the reign of a Queen, whose patronage was ever ungrudgingly bestowed in the cause of education throughout her Empire, and whom, as its gracious foundress, the University has special reason to hold in grateful remembrance.

- 46. The present Council will, in July next, have completed its term of six years, and will then go out of office by effluxion of time.
- 47. Appended to this report are:—(1) A tabular statement showing the results of all the examinations conducted by the University since its incorporation; (2) The usual financial statements, showing the receipts and expenditure for the year, and the position of each of the funds administered by the Council.
