Report of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope for the Year ended 31st December, 1908.

Presented to both Pouses of Payliament by Command of Dis Excellency the Governor

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1908.

2. The Inter-Colonial Conference on University Education, summoned at the instance of His Majesty's High Commissioner, which assembled in Cape Town on the 10th February, 1908, under the chairmanship of the Hon. Sir W. Bisset

Berry, submitted its report in the following month. The Conference was composed of seven representatives of the Cape Colony, two of Natal, three of the Transvaal, two of the Orange River Colony, and one of Southern Rhodesia. As the resolutions adopted by it must necessarily carry weight when the question of University reorganisation is eventually taken in hand, it will be well to recapitulate them here.

The resolutions adopted by the Conference were as follows:

I. Introductory.

1. That this Conference is of opinion that it is not expedient at present to establish single college universities in South Africa.

2. That this Conference is of opinion that, under existing circumstances, the best solution of the University question will be the establishment of a South African University with constituent or affiliated colleges.

II. STYLE OF THE UNIVERSITY.

3. That the name of the University be "The University of South Africa," and that the University of the Cape of Good Hope be merged in the University of South Africa.

III. CONSTITUTION OF THE UNIVERSITY.

(i) Council.

4. That a body to be called the Council of the University be constituted.

5. That the University Council consist of twenty-six members, ten of whom shall be allocated to the Cape of Good Hope, six to the Transvaal, four to Natal, four to the Orange River Colony, and two to Southern Rhodesia.

6. That the members of the Council shall be appointed to hold office for a

term of three years.

7. That any casual vacancy in the Council be filled up for the unexpired term

by the authority by which the vacating member was appointed.

8. That the Conference recommends that, in the appointment of members of Council, adequate provision be made for the representation of the constituent and affiliated colleges, and of the graduates of the University.

(ii.) Senate.

9. That a body to be called the Senate of the University be constituted.

10. That each affiliated or constituent college be entitled to send to the Senate one representative for each subject in the Degree Syllabus in which it provides a course of instruction.

11. That the University Council may for special purposes, including the purpose of granting representation on the Senate to Colonies which have no such

representation, appoint additional members of Senate.

12. That, pending the full recognition of any college recommended by a Government as a constituent or affiliated college, the University Council shall be entitled to appoint such teachers of that college as it may see fit, as members of the Senate.

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(iii) Constituent or Affiliated Colleges of the University.

13. That each Colony represented at the Conference shall be entitled to have one college recognised by the University, provided that in the opinion of the Council such college is adequately staffed and equipped for the full course of at

least a degree in literature, philosophy, or science.

14. That Cape Colony be entitled to have its five colleges under the Higher Education Act recognised by the University, provided that they are nominated for this purpose by the Cape Government, and provided further that in the opinion of the Council these colleges are adequately staffed and equipped for the full course of at least a degree or degrees in literature, philosophy or science.

15. That any college, additional to those already indicated, to be admitted in future as a constituent or affiliated college, must be recommended by the Government of the Colony in which it is situated, and approved by the University

Council.

IV. Powers and Functions of Council.

16. That the supreme governing body of the University shall be the University Council.

17. That the University Council be empowered to appoint Professors to such

Chairs as it may deem fit.

18. That the University Council may meet at such centres as from time to

time shall be considered desirable.

19. That the Council of the University of South Africa shall have the power to confer, according to the bye-laws and regulations of the University, all the degrees at present conferred by the University of the Cape of Good Hope, and any other degrees as it may find expedient.

20. This Conference recommends that the University Council be entitled to appoint at least one member on the Council of each constituent or affiliated

college.

21. That the University scholarships, exhibitions and prizes at the disposal of the University Council shall be awarded by examinations conducted exclusively by the University Council, subject to such regulations as the said Council may make hereafter, and that such examinations be conducted, as far as possible, by examiners who have not had any of the candidates under their tuition at any time during the two years next before the examination.

22. That the University Council shall have the right to admit external students to its examinations, and to grant degrees to such students, subject to such

regulations as it may from time to time determine.

V. FUNCTIONS OF THE SENATE.

23. That the functions of the Senate be as follows:

(a) To draw up from time to time regulations for the conduct of its business, subject to the approval of the Council.

(b) To consider the syllabuses of the University Examinations and advise the

Council thereon. (c) To recommend any change in the general scheme of any University Examination.

(d) To submit annually to the Council a report on any matter referring to

the conduct of the University Examinations, and

(e) Generally to report on any matters referred to it by the Council.

24. The University Senate shall meet once yearly in vacation time, and Special Meetings may be called in accordance with the regulations adopted by the University Council from time to time.

VI. EXAMINATIONS AND DEGREES.

25. That the examinations of the University shall be conducted in English, with the exception of the examinations in the Dutch language and literature, in which the questions will be set in English and in Dutch, and the answers may

be written in either language.

26. That the University Council shall conduct the entrance and final examinations for University Certificates, diplomas and degrees, but that the Council shall take due account of the college records of candidates, and shall give teachers of these college candidates such a share in the examinations as it may deem fit.

27. That (a) the standard of the Matriculation Examination be raised, and (b) the matriculated student be free to adopt any particular line or lines, faculty

or faculties, he may choose.

28. That the lists of compulsory and optional subjects in the Matriculation Examination be so arranged as to afford considerable freedom to intending candidates.

29. That professors and lecturers in the constituent or affiliated colleges shall not be debarred, as they appear to be by Section 9 of the University Act, from being appointed by the University Council as examiners in the conduct of

the University examinations.

30. That the University shall prescribe the requirements of each post-matriculation course, but that each constituent or affiliated college be entitled to present for the approval of the University Council equivalent alternative syllabuses or portions of syllabuses, lists of set authors, and similar matters: provided always:

(a) That the University shall determine for each examination or course the

extent or range of such permissible alternatives.

(b) That in all Intermediate and pass degree courses in Arts or Science, and in all professional courses there shall remain a common nucleus adequately embracing the essential and fundamental parts of the subjects.

31. Candidates presented from constituent or affiliated colleges shall be regarded as "internal," and all others shall be regarded as "external" stu-

ents.

32. That external and internal students be separately classified.

33. That students who pass any examination shall be arranged in classes in alphabetical order.

VII. FINANCE.

34. That this Conference suggests that the contribution of the various Governments to the funds of the University be in the same proportion as the representation indicated in resolution 5.

VIII. GENERAL.

35. That the administrative centre of the South African University should be in the buildings now occupied by the University of the Cape of Good Hope.

36. That if a South African University be formed, all students regarded as matriculated students of an institution recognised by the Government of any Colony shall have the same academic status in such University as matriculated students of

the Cape of Good Hope University.

37. That this Conference is of opinion that the holders of certificates issued by the Transvaal University College and by the South African College should, in the proposed University of South Africa, have the same standing which attaches to the certificates of a corresponding grade issued by the University of the Cape of Good Hope.

38. That it is the opinion of this Conference that, the promotion of Research being one of the most important functions of a University, the University Council, with or without the co-operation of the constituent colleges, should give the matter

due attention.

39. That this Conference is of opinion that the number of independent institutions preparing students for University degrees in South Africa is greater than the need requires, and that the organisation of such work is in consequence difficult and uneconomical; and this Conference recommends that co-operation or union of the present University Colleges be encouraged and that the multiplication of such Colleges in the future be discouraged.

It was hoped that the Report of the Conference would be brought at once before the Parliaments of the different Colonies represented, and that the necessary legislation would be introduced in 1908; but no action was taken in that direction; and, in view of the fact that, in the draft Constitution since framed by the National Convention, it is proposed that the control of Higher Education throughout South Africa should be reserved for the Central Authority, the Council recognises that it is highly improbable that any action will now be taken by these Parliaments. The immediate delay will, however, be the less to be regretted, if the result be the final settlement of the question of University reorganisation in a thoroughly effective way in the near future.

3. There was no change in the personnel of the Council in 1908; but the following changes were made in the Standing Committees appointed the previous

(a) Finance Committee: Dr. Gregory was appointed an additional member.
(b) Literature Committee: Professor Cholmeley's appointment as an Assessor lapsed,

and the following additional Assessors were appointed: Prof. Nauta, Diocesan College, Rondebosch; Prof. Hoernlé, South African College, Cape Town; Prof. du Toit, South African College, Cape Town; Prof. Paterson, Transvaal University College, Pretoria; Prof. Cillie, Victoria College, Stellenbosch; Prof. Exham, Rhodes University College, Grahamstown. (c) Science Committee: Professor du Toit Malherbe, Transvaal University College, Pretoria, was appointed an additional Assessor. (d) Law Committee: Advocate Tatham, K.C., Pietermaritzburg, was appointed an additional Assessor.

4. Consequent upon the passing of the University Incorporation Amendment Act of 1908, which empowered the University to confer Degrees in Divinity, the following Standing Divinity Committee was appointed to hold office until the expiry of the Council's term of office: -Mr. Bender, Dr. Flint, Dr. Jenkins, Dr. Kolbe, Prof. Marais, Prof. Moorrees, Prof. Ritchie, Mr. Russell. Chairman: Prof. Marais. This Committee has for some time been engaged in drafting the regulations and courses of study for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity, and it is hoped to institute examinations for the degree in 1910.

5. Leave of absence for various periods was granted during the year to the following members of Council: -Mr. Mudie, the Hon. J. X. Merriman, Mr. Adamson, Sir Bisset Berry, Dr. Brill, Rev. Dr. Macgowan, Mr. Slater, Mr. Tucker, and the

Hon. Mr. Justice Wessels.

6. The Hon. Dr. J. Petersen, M.L.C., was appointed a member of the South African College Council in place of the Rev. T. E. Marsh, resigned; and Dr. H. Bolus, whose term of office as a member of the said Council had expired through effluxion of time, was re-appointed for a further period of two years.

7. An invitation was accepted from the Executive Board of the Inter-State Native College to appoint two representatives to the Governing Council of the College, and the Rev. Professor Marais and the Hon. W. P. Schreiner, M.L.A., were

nominated to represent the University thereon.

8. An intimation was received from Convocation that Professor W. Ritchie, M.A., whose office as President of Convoction had expired through effluxion of time, had been re-elected for a further period of two years.

9. Messrs. F. H. Long and S. Robertson, M.A., of the Education Department, acted as Scrutineers of the marks and lists in connection with the examinations of the year; and Mr. E. H. W. Müller, B.A., of the Audit Office, acted as Auditor of

the University Books and Accounts.

10. The usual Examinations were conducted during the year, and the names of the successful candidates are published in the Supplements to the "University Gazette" for September, 1908 (Music Examinations), and March, 1909 (all other Examinations). A list of the Scholarships, Exhibitions, and Prizes awarded in connection with the different Examinations will be found in Annexure A to this

13. On the recommendation of the examiners (Hon. W. P. Schreiner and Professors J. Edgar and Godée-Molsbergen) the Chalmers Memorial Prize for 1908 was awarded to Mr. L. Blackwell, B.A., LL.B., the subject of the essay being "The influence of Subject Races on the development of Nations with an application to South Africa."

The subject selected for 1909 is "Forms and methods of government among the native races in South Africa."

14. In connection with the Music Examinations it was decided to institute in 1909 a more advanced examination in performance, to be confined for the present to the Pianoforte, and to allow successful candidates in this examination to describe themselves as "University Licentiate in Music." The opportunity was taken at the same time to improve the status of the Examination for the Teachers' Diploma in Music by conferring a like privilege upon holders of the Diploma under certain conditions. The Licentiate Examination will thus consist of two Branches: Branch A comprising the old Teachers' Diploma Examination, and Branch B the new examination in Pianoforte.

15. Owing in part to the institution of the Licentiate Examination, but chiefly to a still further increase last year in the number of candidates for the Practical Examinations in Music, the Council has decided to arrange for the appointment of

five visiting examiners for the Music Examinations in 1909.

16. The proposal to institute a School Leaving Examination as an alternative to the Matriculation Examination which has been before the Council for many years, was at length approved in 1908. The new examination, which will be known as the University Senior Certificate Examination for Schools, will be held for the first time in 1910. The Examination will be of the same standard as the Matriculation Examination, but will differ from Matriculation in that Latin and Mathematics will be optional subjects, and a number of additional alternative subjects will be introduced, such as Elementary Agricultural Science, Domestic Economy, Music, and Drawing. The Examination is designed more particularly for students who do not propose to enter upon a University course, but provision is made by which holders of the Senior Certificate may subsequently complete the Matriculation Examination.

Concurrently with the introduction of this new Examination the name of the School Higher Examination will be discontinued and that of University Junior Certificate for Schools adopted in its place, and the standard required for a pass in the

examination will be slightly raised.

17. The most important changes introduced during 1908 in the Regulations for the School Higher Examination were the adoption of a new Syllabus in Botany and the addition of Elementary Physical Science (Physics and Chemistry) to the list of Science subjects. These will take effect in 1909.

18. In the Matriculation Examination Regulations the following changes were made, to take effect in 1909: Elementary Natural Science (Botany and Zoology) was added to the list of Science subjects, and new Syllabuses were adopted in Arith-

metic, Modern Languages, and Botany.

In 1909 the Matriculation Examination and the School Higher Examination will be held simultaneously, both examinations commencing on the last Monday in November: in and after 1910 the Matriculation, the Senior Certificate, and the

Junior Certificate Examinations will also be held simultaneously.

19. During the year a new scheme was adopted for the Intermediate Examination, to take effect in 1910, under which Latin and Mathematics are no longer both compulsory subjects. They are, however, alternatives, while one Modern Language becomes compulsory. The marks assigned to Latin, Physics, and Chemistry are increased, and new syllabuses are introduced in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, and History, with minor alterations in other subjects.

20. A large number of important alterations were made in the B.A. Regulations for 1910 and 1911, all of which will be found in detail in the University Calendar for 1909-10. The regulations for 1909 have been amended in one or two points affecting the Honours Examination only. The papers in the Department of Classics were re-arranged; an alternative syllabus in Geology was adopted; and it was decided to set three written papers instead of two in each of the following sub-

jects, viz., Physics, Chemistry, Geology, Botany, Zoology.

As regards the Pass Examination, a change of considerable moment was introduced by the institution of two additional alternative courses. Candidates for the B.A. Pass Examination in 1910 will be permitted to enter either in the existing Department of Literature and Philosophy, or in that of Science, or in a Department of Literature and Science combined. In this new Department the subjects to be taken must include either Mathematics or Greek or Logic and Psychology, but candidates are offered the option of taking either two subjects in Literature and Philosophy with two in Science, or four subjects in Literature and Philosophy with one in Science, as they may prefer. This change has been introduced largely with a view to meeting the ordinary teaching requirements obtaining in the majority of schools in South Africa.

21. The usual financial statements showing the receipts and expenditure for the year 1908 and the position of each of the funds administered by the University will

be found in Annexure B to this Report.
