you in your loss. It is our loss too, as private individuals and nieces; not to mention Botswana's loss. We pray that God may bless his soul, and

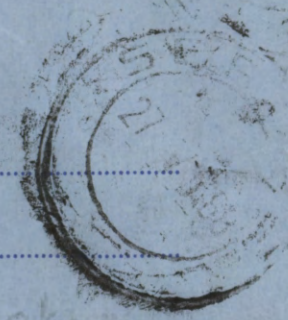
bless you and your family.
