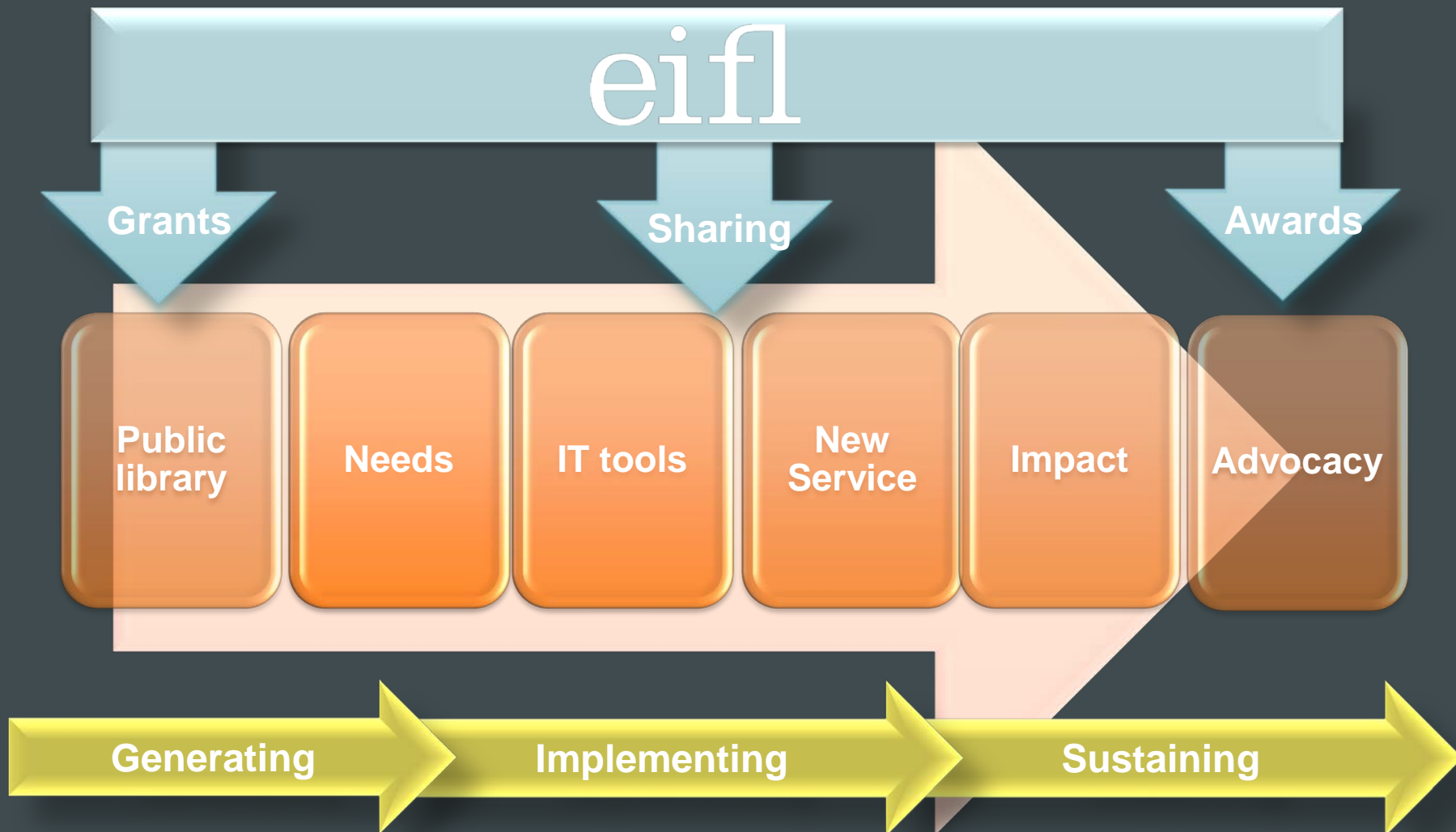
EIFL-PLIP context

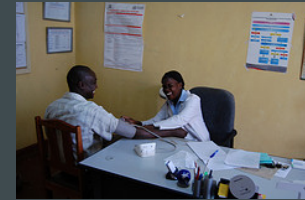

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Ho Municipality: the District Profile

- a land area of 2660sq.km
- 772 communities
- total population of 271,881 (average of 352.2 people per community)
- Men make 47.51 per cent and females 52.49 per cent of total population.
- 65.8% of the population live in rural areas and 34.2 live in the urban areas.

Problem / Need Identified

- Computer and internet skills are compulsory subjects for Junior High School students (ages 11-16) in Ghana.
- However, many schools do not have computers, internet connections or electricity, and so the students cannot practice.
- As a result, they fail their ICT exams and cannot progress to secondary school.

Solution

- Volta Regional Library is helping reduce exams' failure rates by giving children in poor, rural parts of Ho Municipality hands on computer lessons
- Applied for external funding to equip its mobile library service with five laptop computers with educational software, a solar system and a digital resources
- Created partnerships with the technology support agency TechAide, schools and radio stations
- Scheduled weekly visits to 5 communities: Ziavi Dzogbe, Ziavi Lume, Klefe Achatime, Deme Fiave and Taviefe

Implementation

- Each school was visited once in a week for 21 weeks
- The total number of visits made to the schools -105
- A total of 215 children, between the ages of 11 and 19 benefited from the service.



Outcomes & Impact

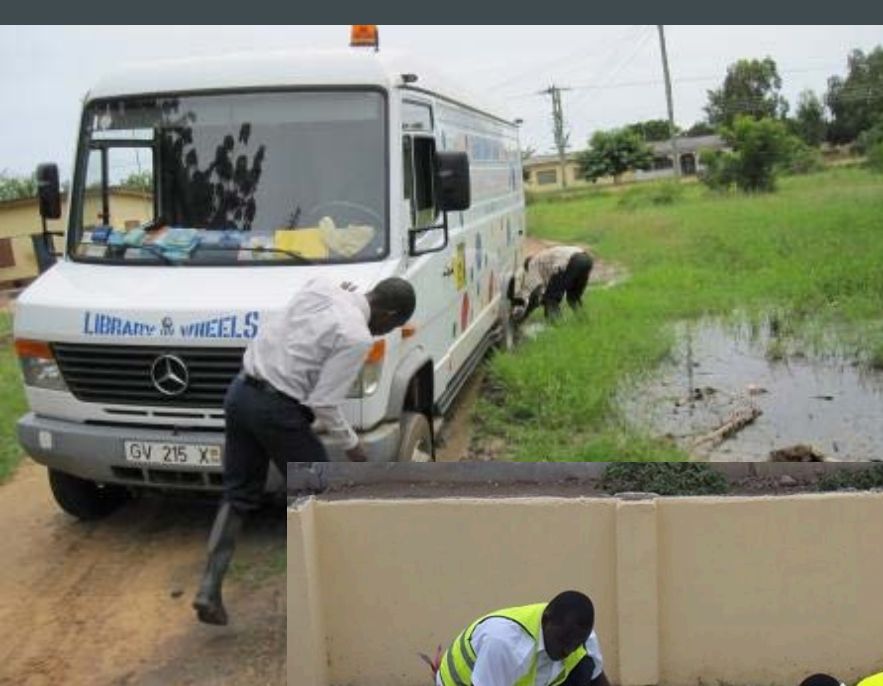
