MEMORANDUM.

Mrs. Jamison's Endowment.

1. A sum of £5,000 is placed at the disposal of the Board of Public Examiners of the Cape of Good Hope to advance the education of young men born in the Cape Colony, by offering to competition, from time to time, a Scholarship of £200 per annum, to be known as Mrs. Jamison's Scholarship.

2. This Scholarship is founded to enable a holder of the Second-class Certificate in Literature and Science to pursue and complete a course of professional study in Europe, with the view of afterwards practising his profession in the Colony.

3. Competitors must be the sons of parents domiciled in the Cape Colony, and must have been born within the Cape Colony, and must have attended the classes of the South African College continuously for the two years just preceding the date of competition; and, further, must have obtained the Third-class Certificate in Literature and Science.

4. Competitors must be under twenty years of age on the day when the examination commences.

5. The Scholarship will be given to the competitor who shall take the best certificate of the Second-class in Literature and Science, provided that he shall have reached such a standard of merit as is satisfactory to the Board.

6. The Scholarship shall be of the value of £200 per annum, and be tenable for four years; but should it appear to the Board of Public Examiners that an additional period is necessary or desirable for the more satisfactory completion of the course of professional study which the holder may have chosen, the Scholarship may be held for one year additional, and no longer.

7. The holder of the Scholarship shall within a reasonable time proceed to some European University, approved by the Board, for the purpose of taking a degree; or shall pursue his professional studies under such persons and in such place as he may select, subject to the approval of the Board; and shall satisfy the President of the Board annually, and from time to time as required, that he is actually a Student of such University, or that he is actually pursuing the study of the profession selected by him.

8. The Scholarship shall not be held in addition to any other Scholarship, or Studentship, or Bursary, at the disposal of the Board.

9. The Competition for the Scholarship shall, if possible, be so arranged by the Board as to take place in the interval when no Porter Studentship is vacant.

10. Should the capital yield interest exceeding £200 per annum, or should the Scholarship not be awarded by reason of the absence of a qualified Competitor, the surplus interest and the amount of the unappropriated Scholarship shall be at the disposal of the Board, for the encouragement and advancement of the education of young men born within the Colony, and being the sons of parents domiciled in the Colony, to be applied in such a manner and under such conditions as may from time to time be laid down by the Board of Public Examiners, with the consent of the donor during her lifetime.

11. It shall be competent for the Board of Public Examiners, with the consent of the donor, during her lifetime, to revise from time to time, and if necessary to annul, all or any of the foregoing arrangements and conditions, and in lieu thereof to substitute such other arrangements and conditions as may be thought desirable, for the encouragement and advancement of the education of young men born in the Cape Colony.

12. Any change which after the decease of the donor may be necessary or desirable in the conditions under which Mrs. Jamison's Scholarship is to be awarded, or under which the surplus interest and other accumulated moneys are to be appropriated, may be made from time to time by the Board at its sole discretion, provided that the advancement of the education of young persons born in the Colony, and of parents domiciled in the Colony, be always and strictly kept in view.

13. The first competition for Mrs. Jamison's Scholarship shall take place at the Annual Session of the Board in June, 1874.

At a Meeting of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, held at the Office of the Superintendent General of Education, in Cape Town, on Monday, the 1st day of September, 1873, at 11 o'clock, a.m., in conformity with His Excellency the Governor's Proclamation No 77, of the 30th July, 1873, were present:

On the motion of the Honble Mr de Villiers, seconded by the Honble Mr Smith, Dr Dale was unanimously elected as Chairman.

Dr Dale proposed that Mr Elliott should fill the Office of Acting Registrar. Carried unanimously.

The Chairman read the Governor's Proclamation No 77, of the 30th July, 1873, appointing the University Council and convening this Meeting.

Honble Mr de Villiers proposed that Dr Dale be Vice-Chancellor of the University. Rev. Dr Faure seconded the proposal, which was carried by acclamation.

Dr Dale signified his acceptance of the office.

The Vice-Chancellor proposed that the functions and Salary of the future Registrar should be defined.

This proposal was agreed to.

Honble Mr de Villiers proposed that the Salary of the Registrar should be subject to the approval of Government.

Honble

Mr Smith seconded the Motion which was put to the Meeting and negatived, 6 Members voting for it and 7 against.

Dr Stewart proposed that the Salary of the Registrar should be £450 per annum.

Dr Edden seconded the motion, which was put to the Meeting and negatived, 4 Members voting for it, and 7 against.

The Council resolved unanimously that the following conditions, proposed in outline by the Vice-Chancellor and slightly modified by the Council, should be attached to the appointment of Registrar, viz:

"The Registrar shall discharge the functions of Secretary and Treasurer to the Council, and such other duties as the Council shall from time to time assign to him; shall have charge of and be responsible for the safe keeping of the Library and all Records; shall be charged with the superintendence of the printing of the Summation papers, shall be Secretary to Convocation, until other provision be made; shall give security to the extent of £1000 Sterling; shall have no other office or employment, without the express sanction of the Council; shall receive a fixed Salary of £400 per annum."

Mr Stone proposed that the Registrar shall not be a Member of the Council.

Dr Edden seconded the proposal, which was carried unanimously.

Mr Elliott proposed that Rev. Dr Cameron be appointed Registrar of the University.

Rev. Canon Judge seconded the proposal, which was carried unanimously.

Mr Elliott, as Secretary of the late Board of Public Examiners, laid before the Meeting a copy of the Report of the Board's proceedings during 1873.

Dr Dale, as President of the late Board, reported that the sum of £8742"6"2, in debentures, stock, and Cash, would be placed at the disposal of the Council by the Secretary to the Board.

The Meeting adjourned at quarter past 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.

At 2 p.m. the Council resumed business.

Rev. Canon Ogilvie moved that the Seal of the late Board of Public Examiners be adopted by the Council, the words "The University of the Cape of Good Hope" being substituted for "Board of Public Examiners in Literature and Science, Cape of Good Hope." Carried unanimously.

It was resolved that the Embossing Press should be altered accordingly.

The Council then proceeded to frame Rules of Order and Procedure. The following Rules were adopted:

Rules of Order and Procedure.

1. The ordinary or stated meetings of the Council shall be held quarterly, and on the following days, namely, the first Wednesday in March, June, September, and December.
2. A special Meeting, at his own instance, may be called by the Vice-Chancellor at any time, and he shall be bound to call such a Meeting at the request, in writing, of any four Members of Council, the object of the Meeting in either case being stated in the requisition.
3. The first act of each Meeting, after being constituted, shall be to read and confirm, by the signature of the Vice-Chancellor or Chairman, the Minutes of the Meeting immediately preceding. All objections to the form and manner in which the Minutes have been taken must then be raised and decided; unless a Member shall be allowed, by special permission, to give notice of further discussion at next Meeting.
4. All questions coming before the Council shall be decided by the majority of the votes of the Members then present, except in those cases referred to in the Section next following, where votes by proxy are admissible. On every question the Vice-Chancellor or Chairman shall have a vote; and in the case of the votes being equal, the question shall be decided by the casting vote of the Vice-Chancellor or Chairman.
[The Council decided by a majority of 7 to 4 that the Vice-Chancellor or Chairman should have a casting vote as provided for in Rule 4.]
5. The Vice-Chancellor shall have the power of referring any question, which he may deem of sufficient importance, to the non-resident Members of the Council, and of inviting their votes by proxy on such a question. Members shall be deemed non-resident who shall live more than twelve miles from Cape Town.
6. Any Member shall be entitled to record his dissent from any decision of the Council, except where decisions relate to the granting or withholding of any degree, distinction, or certificate after Candidates have undergone examination. In all such cases, the decision of the Council shall alone be recorded.
7. Twenty-one days before the day appointed for any Meeting

Meeting, the Registrar shall give notice by Circular to each Member of the Council of the subjects to be brought under consideration at the Meeting, either by notice previously minuted or by requisition to the Vice-Chancellor, and the opinions of Members unable to attend personally, if given in writing, shall be laid before the Meeting.

8. No question affecting the subjects and conduct of Examinations, or the appointment and dismissal of any Officers or Examiners, or changing any of the by-laws, shall be put to the vote, without due notice previously given.

9. Notices of subjects for consideration shall be in writing, they may be given from Meeting to Meeting, or they may be sent to the Registrar. In the latter case, they must be lodged three days at least before that on which the Registrar is required to give notice of Meeting.

10. Any notice made by a Member shall be in writing, but shall not require to be recorded. No motion can be withdrawn except by permission of the Council.

11. The votes of the Members on all questions except those which relate to the granting or withholding of any degree, distinction, or certificate, shall, if desired by any Member, be recorded in the Minutes of the Council. All dissents given in writing shall also be recorded.

12. The ruling of the Vice-Chancellor or Chairman on any question of order or procedure shall be binding, unless immediately challenged by a Member, in which case it shall be submitted to the decision of the Council, whose decision shall be final.

13. It shall be competent for the Council to adjourn any Meeting to a future day, in order to complete the business then before the Council.

Rev. Dr. Cameron signified his acceptance of the Office of Registrar.

The Honble Mr de Villiers proposed that a Committee consisting of the Vice-Chancellor and Mr Elliot, assisted by the Registrar, be appointed to frame rules for the conduct of Examinations and such other rules as they might consider desirable; and that the Meeting be adjourned to Wednesday, the 17th instant, to receive their report and to consider the rules submitted.

This proposal was carried unanimously.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice-Chancellor reported the resignation of Dr. Cameron as a Member of Council, on his acceptance of the office of Registrar of the University; and the appointment of the Rev. G. F. Childs M. A., Professor of Mathematics in the South African College, as a Member of Council.

The Vice-Chancellor drew the attention of the Council to some points in the Rules of Order and Procedure adopted at the last meeting which might be amended; and the following alterations were approved by the Council:—

In Rule 2 the words "in either case" to be struck out.

In Rule 5 the first part of the rule to read thus:—

"The Council or the Vice-Chancellor shall have

"the power of referring any question which the

"Council or Vice-Chancellor may deem of suf-

"ficient importance," &c

In Rule 8 the words "Rules or" to be inserted before the word "By-Laws".

Rule 6 to be struck out.

Rule 11 to read as follows:—

"The Votes of the Members, and all dissent's given in

"writing on all questions except those which relate

"to the granting or withholding of any degree, dis-

"tinction or certificate, shall, if desired by any

"member, be recorded in the minutes of the Council."

Between Rules 11 and 12 the following Rule to be inserted:—

"In all cases relating to the granting or withholding of any degree, distinction, or certificate, the decision of the Council shall alone be recorded."

The Vice-Chancellor brought up the Report of the Committee appointed to frame Rules for the Conduct of Examinations. The Report embraced the following Subjects:—

1. By-Laws and Regulations for the Conduct of Examinations in general.
2. By-Laws and Regulations for the Matriculation Examination.
3. By-Laws and Regulations for the Examinations of Candidates for degrees in Arts.
4. By-Laws and Regulations for the Examination of Candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Laws.
5. By-Laws and Regulations for the Examination of Candidates for the Certificate of Proficiency in Law and Jurisprudence.
6. By-Laws and Regulations for the Examination of Candidates for the Certificate of Proficiency in the Theory of Land Surveying.
7. By-Laws and Regulations for the admission of Graduates of other Universities ad eundem gradum in this University.
8. By-Laws and Regulations, prescribing the forms of Presentation, and of conferring or admitting to any degree.
9. Regulations for the Porter Studentship, and Mr. Jamison's Scholarship.
10. Competition of Schools Prizes.
11. Estimate of Expenditure of the University for the first year.

The Vice-Chancellor called upon the Registrar to read the Report of the Committee. The meeting adjourned at one o'clock till two P.M. On recurring business at 2 P.M., the Registrar proceeded with the Reading of the Report of the Committee. The Committee's estimate that the expenditure for the first year would be Fifteen Hundred Pounds Stg was discussed, and it was resolved to ask the Government to allow that sum for the use of the University. It was further resolved that the Report of the Committee should be printed, and circulated among the members of Council; and that the meeting be adjourned to Thursday, the 9th of October.

The Registrar reported that he had resigned the Professorship

of Classics in the South African College, and that his successor had been appointed: and further, that the Council of the College had requested him to continue to act as Classical Professor till the end of the year. The sanction of the Council was given to the Registrar's acceding to this request.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that the Government had approved of the Estimates made by the Council of the Expenditure of the University for the first year, and had authorized the Registrar to submit Requisitions in the usual manner for an expenditure at the rate of £1500 per annum from the 1st of September. It was decided to open an account with the Cape of Good Hope Banks, and the Registrar was instructed to submit all accounts for payment at the ordinary meetings of Council: but that in cases of necessity or emergency the authority of the Vice-Chancellor should be sufficient warrant for payment.

On the suggestion of the Vice-Chancellor, it was agreed that an allowance of £1 per month should be made to the Messenger of the Education Office in consideration of his services as temporary Messenger to the University, commencing from 1 September.

It was further agreed that the Council should defray any expenses incurred in the preparation of the Security Bond required by the Council from the Registrar.

The Vice-Chancellor brought forward for discussion the Rules of Order and Procedure and By-laws and Regulations ordered to be printed and circulated among the Members of Council and to be considered at this meeting.

The Rules of Order and Procedure were adopted, with the following changes:—

In Sect. 1 the words "or stated", and the word "and" to be struck out.

In Sect. 2 the words "at his own instance" to follow the words "by the Vice-Chancellor", instead of preceding the words "may be called".

In Sect. 6 the word "given" to be substituted for the word "minuted".

In Sect. 8 the second sentence to read thus:— "They may be given at any meeting, or they may be sent to the Registrar, or be embodied in a Requisition to the Vice-Chancellor". In the third sentence, the words "In any case notices" to be substituted for the words "In the latter case, they". After the word "lodged" the sentence to read thus:— "Three days with the Registrar" at least before that on which he is required to give notice of meeting."

In Sect. 9 the words "Every motion" to be substituted for the words "Any notice made by a member".

Section 10 to read as follows:— "On all questions except those which relate to the granting or withholding of any degree, distinction, or certificate, the names of the members voting, when decided by any member, and all doubts given in writing, shall be recorded in the Minutes of the Council."

In Sect. 11 the words "which relate" to be substituted for the word "relating".

In Sect. 12 the words "submitted at once to the Council" to be substituted for the words "submitted to the decision of the Council."

The By-laws and Regulations were then considered, and the following changes ordered to be made.

In the title of the first portion, the word "Examinations" to be substituted for the word "Examiners".

In the By-laws and Regulations for the Conduct of Examinations in general, the words "in Cape Town and", and the word "other" to be struck out in Sect. 2.

In Sect. 3 the words "from Candidates" to be struck out. The word "Sufficient" to be substituted for the word "reasonable". The word "any" before the word "Examinations" to be

struck out. The words "may appoint one or more Commissioners" to be substituted for the words "will appoint a Commissioner". The words "to be held" to be inserted before the words "at such town". The words "the same examination held in Cape Town" to be changed into "the examinations held elsewhere".

In sect. 4 the first part to read as follows:—"Throughout each examination there shall be present at least two Examiners, or a Commissioner specially appointed, except &c"

In sect. 8 the first part to read as follows:—"The fees for the various examinations shall be, For Matriculations &c". For the words "For M. A. £10." the words "For M. A. £5" to be substituted. The section to end with the words "successful Candidates". The word "will" to be inserted before the word "cover". All the words after "successful Candidates" to form a new Section 9.

Section 9 to become Section 10. The form for Matriculation Certificate to be as follows:—"We hereby certify that _____ has matriculated in this University, and that his name appeared in the Pass (or Honours) Division at the Examination held in _____

The certificate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts to be as follows:—"We hereby certify that _____ appeared as a Candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts at the examination held in _____, and has obtained that degree (with honours in Literature and Science) (or with honours in Literature) (or with honours in Science)

The certificate for the degree of Master of Arts to be as follows:—"We hereby certify that _____ appeared as a Candidate for the degree of Master of Arts in the year _____, and obtained that degree after examination in the department of _____

Section 10 to become Section 11, and to be as follows:—"For the Matriculation examinations, and for the examinations for degrees in Arts, there shall be two Committees of Examiners, the one in Literature and the other in Science. Each Committee shall consist of three or more Examiners, one of whom shall be Moderator."

Section 11 to become Section 12. The words "names", "examiners", "have" and "are" to be substituted for the words "name", "examiner", "has" and "is".

Section 12 to become Section 13. All the words after "in Science" to be struck out.

Section 13 to become Section 14, and to read as follows:—"The Examinations in Law and Jurisprudence shall be conducted by a Committee of at least two Examiners, one of whom shall be Moderator."

Section 14 to become Section 15. A full stop to be substituted for the comma after the words "Bachelor of Arts". The remainder of the Section to be as follows:—"This examination will be conducted by the Committee of Examiners in Science."

A new Section (16) to be added, as follows:—"The functions of the Committee shall be to superintend the preparation of the Examination Papers, and the examinations: to confer with the Examiners: to decide all matters relating to the examinations: to receive the Reports of the Examiners: and to certify the Results of the Examinations to the Vice-Chancellor."

In the Bylaws and Regulations for Matriculation, in the first Paragraph the words after "in each year" to read "and commence on the second Tuesday in July."

In the second Paragraph, the words "has produced" and "has paid" to be substituted for the words "have produced" and "have paid". The word "Satisfactory" to be inserted before the word "Certificate".

Under the title "Languages, Literature, and History", in Section 3, a colon followed by a dash to be substituted for the comma after the words "Latin languages". The words "and on" after the word "antiquities" to be struck out, and a comma to be inserted after the word "geography". In 4 to read in for on.

During the discussions, the Council adjourned from 1 p.m. till 2 p.m.

It was voted to adjourn the meeting till tomorrow (Friday, the 10th inst.) at 7 o'clock 11 a.m. Shortly after 4 o'clock, the Vice-Chancellor called attention to the fact that a quorum was not present, and the meeting terminated.

The Consideration of the proposed By-Laws and Regulations was resumed.

M. Stone moved that the Clause on page 8 commencing with the words "No candidate shall be placed in the Honour Division unless" &c be struck out. After discussion, the motion was put to the meeting by the Vice-Chancellor, with the following result:

The motion was therefore lost. He then requested that the names of the voters on either side should be entered on the minutes.

In the last Paragraph under the heading "Matriculation" the word "shall" in the first line was struck out.

In the By-Laws and Regulations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts the following changes were made.

In Paragr. 1 the word "shall" before the word "commence" to be struck out. Instead of "have obtained a 3rd class, & had held a ^{for of the} " read "from the".
The next Paragraph to be as follows: - "No Candidate, unless a holder of a Certificate in Literature and Science of the late Board of Public Examiners, shall be admitted to his Examination until after the expiration of one year from the time of his passing the Matriculation Examination, and

until he has paid to the Registrar of the University a fee of five pounds, and has furnished a Satisfactory certificate of good Conduct."

Under the heading "Languages, Literature, & History", the Section 1821 to stand thus: "The Constitutional History of England." In the foot-note to 1824, the word "Subjects" to be substituted for the word "Subject"; a dash to be placed after the word "Speak". In 1823 the word "Candidate" to be substituted for the word "Candidates".

Under the heading "Mathematics", in 1822, a full stop to be placed after the word "Exponents", and all the words that follow to be struck out. The next paragraph to read as follows:—"Permutations and Combinations, and the Binomial Theorem." In the next paragraph the words "indeterminate Equations" to be struck out.

The Council adjourned at 1.15 till 2 o'clock.

On resuming the consideration of the By-Laws and Regulations at 2 p.m., under the heading "Physical Science" on page 9, the words Fixed Subject: "Physical Geography, excluding the Distribution of plants and animals, and ethnology. Of Terrestrial Subjects:" to be struck out. In the same paragraph, the word "Subjects" to be inserted after the word "following".

On the same page the words "and history" to be struck out after the words "The English Language". Four lines lower down, the word "Geometry" to be substituted for the word "Trigonometry".

On page 10, all the words between "Friday: Morning, 9-12. Physical Science" and "Monday: Morning 9-12" to be struck out. The two paragraphs commencing with the words "No Candidate shall be placed in the Honours Division" to be struck out.

Under the heading "Master of Arts", the word "shall" to be struck out before the word "Commence" in the 1st Paragraph. In the next Paragraph, the word "has" to be substituted for the words "shall have"; and the words "and has paid to the Registrar a fee of £5" to be inserted after the words "his 20th year". On page 11, the first paragraph to be struck out. In the second paragraph, the words "one of the three" to be substituted for the words "either of the two". The sections 1 & 2 which next follow to be followed by a new Section 3, to read thus "Physical Sciences". All the words in Section 2 after the words "natural Philosophy" to be struck out. After the words "Geometry of Three Dimensions" the following words

to be added: "excluding the Curvature of Surfaces". The next line to read thus: "6. The Elements of Differential and Integral Calculus"; and the line next following to be struck out. All the words which follow, down to the words "at the option of the Candidate" to be struck out, and the following to be substituted:

II. Natural Philosophy.

- 1. Statics, excluding LaPlace's functions.
- 2. Dynamics, including Moment of Inertia, & Compound Pendulum.
- 3. Hydrostatics.
- 4. Geometrical Optics.
- 5. The Elements of Plane Astronomy.

III. The examination in Physical Sciences shall include any three of the following subjects which the Candidate may select.

- 1. Physical Geography
- 2. Geology
- 3. Botany
- 4. Zoology
- 5. Animal Physiology.
- 6. Chemistry
- 7. Light.
- 8. Heat and Sound.
- 9. Magnetism and Electricity.

The subjects which admit of it are to be treated mathematically as well as experimentally."

The paragraph beginning with the words "no Candidate shall be admitted" to be struck out. In the next Paragr. the words "twenty-five" to be substituted for the numerals "25". On page 12 the first words to be "highly in any one Department shall receive one hundred pounds per annum for three years, and shall bear the title of University Fellow". In the next paragraph, the words "twenty-five" to be substituted for the numerals "25".

Under the heading "Bachelor of Laws," the word "shall" to be struck out before the word "Commence" in par. 1. In the next Paragr. the words "has obtained or been admitted to" to be substituted for the words "shall have passed the examination for"; and the words "and have been admitted to that degree" to be struck out. The word "is" substituted for the words "shall be". A new Paragraph to follow here, viz: - "The Fee for this Examination shall be £50: and no Candidate shall be admitted to this Examination until he has paid this Fee to the Registrar". The Paragr. commencing "Roman Law" to be struck out, and the following paragr. substituted

"Roman Law: English Law: Dutch and Colonial Law,
Law of Evidence: International Law, including the max-
ims of the Conflict of Laws."

In the paragraph commencing "In Colonial Statute Law",
the words "Certificate of proficiency in Law and Jurisprudence"
to be substituted for the words "Second class certificate".
After the words "No. 14 of 1864" the words "and Act
No. 11 of 1873" to be inserted. A comma to be inserted
after the word "minors."

In the paragraph commencing "In English Law", all the
words after the words "real property" to be struck out.
The words "The fee for this examination shall be £30" to
be struck out, and the following words substituted:—

"International Law: Wheaton's International
Law, Part 2; and Chapter 2 of Story's Con-
flict of Laws". The next par. to be struck out.

On page 13, in the first line, the words "shall be holders of"
to be substituted for the words "to have taken". In the
second line, the words "of the" to be changed into the
words "granted by the". A new paragraph to be inserted be-
fore the paragraph commencing "Candidates shall be
examined", as follows:— "The Fee for this Examina-
tion shall be £10: and no Candidate shall be admitted
to this Examination until he has paid this Fee to
the Registrar". In the paragraph commencing "Ele-
ments of Roman and Dutch Law", a full stop to
be placed after the word "law" wherever it occurs, and
the word next following to begin with a Capital Letter.
In the paragraph commencing "In Colonial Law", after
the words "Acts Nos 12 and 21 of 1869" the words "and
act No 7 of 1873" to be inserted. After the words
"Act No 15 of 1856" the words "and Act No 18 of
1873" to be inserted. The Section commencing with
the words "In connection with" to be struck out.
"No. 6 of 1843" to be read instead of "No. 6 of 1842".
The next three (3) clauses, to the end of the Section, to be
struck out.

In the By-Laws and Regulations for the Norway Examina-
tion, in the first paragraph the words "plane and" to
be struck out, and the words "spherical trigonometry
and co-ordinate geometry of the straight line" to be
substituted. The word "in" after the words "for that"
to be changed into "on". In the next paragraph after
the words "shall be £15", the following words to be added:—
"And no Candidate shall be admitted to this Exami-
nation until he has paid this Fee to the Registrar".

The last paragraph on p. 13 to be struck out.
Under the heading "Forms of Presentation to" (page 14) the several clauses are passed by the Council, with the exception of those numbered II, which were passed provisionally.

Under the heading "Regulations for the Post Graduate Ship" &c the following addition to be made to clause 82. 5. "But no candidate otherwise eligible, shall be disqualified by any cause arising from the change of the period of his examination from June to October, 1875."

All the remaining portions of the By-laws and Regulations were approved by the Council, with the exception of the Section on page 14 entitled "Admission of Graduates of other Universities as eccedens graduates in this University." After some discussion of this Section, it was voted to adjourn the meeting till Monday next, the 13th inst., at 2.30 p.m., for the further consideration of this Section, and for other business.

In the last Par. the word "may" to be substituted for the word "shall"; the word "to" to be inserted before after the words "in literature and"; and the words after the word "Science" to be as follows:—"if sufficient merit has been shown ^{by the Candidates} in either case". Under the heading "Master of Arts", the words "will embrace" before the enumeration of the subjects in Mathematics (p. 11) to

be changed into the words "shall include".

The Vice-Chancellor called attention to the fact that the changes approved at the last meeting in the By-Laws and Regulations for the degree of Master of Arts in the Departments of Mathematics and Physical Sciences required that some modification should be introduced into the By-Laws and Regulations for the same examinations in the Department of Languages and Literature. The following changes were therefore agreed to:— After the words "The examination in Languages and Literature shall include", on p. 11, the words following, from "1. The English Language" to the words "philological questions" to be struck out, and the following words to be substituted:— "The Greek and Latin Classic Authors, with composition in Latin and Greek, and critical and philological questions; and also one of the three following subjects which the Candidate may select; viz,

" 1. The English Language and Literature

" 2. Logic and Mental Philosophy

" 3. Modern History."

Par. 3 to read: "Languages and Literature, with History, Logic & Mental Philosophy."

The Council then proceeded to the consideration of the Section, on p. 14, entitled "Admission of Graduates of other Universities" &c. Mr. Stone moved that the whole Section be struck out. The motion was put by the Vice-Chancellor, and lost: the votes being

Against it, Messrs Childs, Elliott, C. A. Smith & D. Edden.

Mr. Stone moved that instead of the words "ad eundem gradum" in the Title the words "to a degree" be substituted. Carried unanimously. In the first Par. of the Section, it was agreed to substitute the words "to a degree" for the words "ad eundem gradum". The proposal to strike out the words "bona fide" was rejected. The words of the next paragr. to be struck out. In the concluding paragr. the words "on his admission to a degree" to be substituted for the words "admitted ad eundem gradum".

In the Section headed "Forms of Presentations" &c the sections passed provisionally at the last meeting were adopted, with the substitution of the words "the degree of _____" for the words "that degree".

The Recommendations of the Committee on the "Competition of Schools Prizes" were adopted.

The Registrar was instructed to forward the entire Series of the "Laws of Order and Procedure" and "By-Laws and Regulations" to the Government for its approval.

The Vice-Chancellor submitted the following propositions with respect to the travelling allowances of Members of Council and Examiners:

"Non-resident Members of Council will be allowed their actual and necessary travelling expenses incurred in proceeding to and from the meetings of Council, on their furnishing to the Vice-Chancellor a statement, duly attested, of the expenses so incurred; but no Councilor shall receive a sum exceeding £20 in one year in respect of his travelling expenses."

"Examiners who reside more than ten miles from Cape Town will be allowed their actual and necessary travelling expenses incurred in proceeding to and from the places of holding the University Examinations and the meetings of the Committees of Examiners, on their furnishing to the Vice-Chancellor a statement, duly attested by the Moderator of the Committee, of the expenses so incurred: but no Examiner shall receive a sum exceeding £30 in one year in respect of his travelling expenses."

These resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The Vice-Chancellor introduced the subject of the Standards of the Senior examinations. It was decided that for the Matriculation Examination the scale of marks shall be

Candidates who obtain 1000 marks and upwards shall be entitled to appear in the honours division. Candidates shall not pass unless

they obtain one-fourth of the marks (250) in each Department, and one-third of the aggregate number of marks (500)

The Vice-Chancellor suggested "that the Standard of Competent knowledge shall be as a general rule one-fifth of the marks assigned to the subject." Upon this Mr. Stone proposed, seconded by Prof. Murray, that the words "as a general rule" be omitted. The Hon. C. J. Smith proposed as an amendment upon this the following Resolution:-

"That competent knowledge cannot be strictly defined by marks, but as a rule a Candidate who does not obtain one-fifth of the marks assigned cannot be deemed to possess competent knowledge."

This amendment was seconded by the Hon. Mr. de Villiers, and on being put from the Chair was lost by the casting vote of the Chairman. Mr. Stone's proposition was also rejected, and the original suggestion of the Vice-Chancellor adopted.

The question was raised by the Vice-Chancellor whether holders of the third-class certificate of the late Board of Public Examiners can be admitted to matriculation in the University. The Council decided, by a majority of four votes to two, that they can be admitted.

The Registrar submitted a request from Mr. J. T. Hillard, of Queenstown, to be allowed to proceed to the examinations for B.A. without matriculating in this University. The Council declined to accede to the request.

An account from Messrs. Saal Johnson & Co, for Books, Stationery &c, amounting to £25.8.6 was submitted by the Registrar, and ordered to be paid. The Registrar was also authorized to pay the Salaries of the Registrar and the Messenger for four months at the end of the year.

The Registrar reported that after consulting with the Vice-Chancellor, he had tendered on behalf of the University for £1000 of the £10,000 4½ per cent Government Debt authorized for sale in the Estate of the late J. B. Edden Esq, at an advance of ½ per cent upon the average price obtained for the remaining £9000.

An extract was read from the will of the late J. B. Edden Esq, containing the conditions of a bequest of £200 to the University by Mr. Edden, the interest of which is to be paid by the University in each and every year as a prize to the author of the best original Essay on some subject, selected by the Council, bearing on Banking, Currency and Finance in relation to the improvement of the material wealth, Social welfare, and to the development of the Commercial and Agricultural resources of the Colony. It was ordered to ^{ask the Hon^{ble} Mr. de Villiers} take legal opinion ^{as to} _{part}

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whether the terms of the bequest make it imperative upon the Council to award the prize every year.

The following regulations relative to an Academic costume were adopted:—

Members of Council, Graduates, and Members of Convocation to be entitled to wear of a gown, of silk or stuff, of a pattern to be approved by the Council. The Hood in each case to be as follows:—

For B.A., black silk, with white edge.

" M.A., white silk, with black edge.

" LL.B., black silk, with scarlet edge.

" LL.D., scarlet silk, with black edge.

" M.B., black silk, with blue edge.

" M.D., blue silk, with black edge.

Holders of the second-class certificate in Literature and Science to be entitled to wear the same Hood as Bachelors of Arts; and Holders of the first class certificate in Literature and Science the same Hood as Masters of Arts.

The Registrar reported that an application from Mr. J. Slater, of Queenstown, had been received, requesting that examinations for matriculation and the Survey Certificate might be held in that town. The Council decided that that question should be considered after the applications from Candidates for these examinations had been received.

A letter was read from Dr. H. A. Edden, asking the Council to admit himself, and certain of his medical brethren, to a degree in this University, accompanying this letter, Dr. Edden sent an official list, published by the Government, of the Medical Practitioners licensed to practise in the Colony. Dr. Edden further stated that the credentials & diplomas in each case had been carefully examined by the Medical Board. The Vice-Chancellor reported that the several Gentlemen nominated as Examiners had accepted the nomination, and pointed out that, as some of the Examiners resided at a distance and there were unwilling to undertake the whole series of examinations, there would be a difficulty in securing a quorum of three unless the number of Examiners was increased to five in Literature and in Science. The Vice-Chancellor therefore suggested that the Registrar should be appointed as an additional Examiner in Literature, and the Rev. J. Espin, M.A., as an additional Examiner in Science. It was proposed by Mr. Elliott, and carried by a majority of five votes against three, "that each Committee of Examiners shall elect its own Moderator". It was also resolved that the first meeting of each of the Committees of Examiners should be convened by the Vice-Chancellor.

"The Council regrets that it cannot accept the Ebdon Request of £200 on the terms of the Testator's will, which appear to require that a prize should be awarded for an essay in each and every year.

"The Council is prepared to carry out what is presumed to be the intention of the Testator, under conditions to be agreed upon between this Council and the Executors of the late Mr. Ebdon's Estate.

"The Council is prepared to receive the sum of £200 from the Executors as the Ebdon Prize Fund, in trust; the interest of which shall be appropriated to the object specified in the late Mr. Ebdon's will, under the following conditions:—

"The Ebdon Prize shall be awarded every five years, or at such other intervals as the Council may from time to time appoint."

"As soon as the Executors shall have consented, in writing, to this condition, the Registrar is empowered to receive the amount from the Executors."

The Vice-Chancellor read a letter from Messrs James Bruce and Co. containing an estimate of the cost of the gown and the hood adopted by the Council for the several degrees. Samples of the gown and hood were also submitted for the approval

These were approved of, and the Registrar was authorized to pay Messrs Bruce and Gandy's account for furnishing the articles, amounting to £15. 16. 6: with an intimation to Mr. Bruce that all the Hoods must be of the same quality and weight of silk; and that the cost of the Gown (£3. 15. -) is in the opinion of the Council excessive.

It was decided that students who have matriculated in the University may wear a plain stuff gown, without sleeves; and the ordinary square tunic cap with a tassel.

The Vice-Chancellor called the attention of the Council to the necessity of investing the funds of the University, from time to time, in profitable and valid securities: and a Finance Committee was appointed, empowered to make investments of the Funds of the University in Government or other good Security - the Committee to consist of the Vice-Chancellor, Mr. Elliott, and Dr. Ebdon.

The Vice-Chancellor called the attention of the Council to the necessity of procuring suitable premises in which to conduct the business of the University; and stated that the rooms in the Education Office at present used by the Registrar would soon be required for the business of the Education Department. It was resolved that the Vice-Chancellor be empowered to hire suitable apartments for the temporary use of the University; and also that the Council make a formal application to the Government for a Sum of money - say £5000 - for the erection of permanent University Buildings.

At the request of Dr. Ebdon, the Registrar read a letter dated 13 Dec. 1873, in which Dr. Ebdon intimated to the Registrar that many members of the Medical Profession "desire the voice in Convocation, if obtainable only by having the "M. D. degree." The Registrar was instructed to write to each of the gentlemen whom the Council at its last meeting resolved to admit to the degree of M. D., and ascertain whether it was his intention to accept the degree of M. D. to which the Council had resolved to admit him.

The Registrar reported that the Committees of Examiners had met, by Summons of the Vice-Chancellor, as follows:—

Committee of Examiners in Literature on Monday, 9 February: present: the Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Badnall, and the Registrar. The Vice-Chancellor was appointed Moderator and Chairman.

Committee of Examiners in Science on Tuesday, 10 February: present: Mr. Stone, Hon. C. A. Smith, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Marguard, Rev. J. Espin. Mr. Elliott was appointed Moderator and Chairman.

Committee of Examiners in Law and Jurisprudence on Monday, 10 February. Present: Hon. J. H. de Villiers, Mr. Cote. Mr. de Villiers was appointed Moderator and Chairman.

The Vice-Chancellor reported to the Council that numerous Enquiries, made by himself and the Registrar with a view to procuring Suitable premises for the University, had led to no satisfactory result; and that Mr. Inglesby, the builder, had been requested to furnish a sketch of a building suited to the requirements of the University, with a rough estimate of the cost of such a building.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that no meeting of the Finance Committee had been held, but submitted a statement drawn up by the Registrar showing that from the various funds of the University there is a sum of about £1200 available for investment. The V.C. also stated that the General Estate and Exchequer Chamber is willing to receive to receive money as Fixed Deposit for 12 months, with 3 months' notice of withdrawal, allowing interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per Cent. The Council authorized the investment of £1200 with the Chamber on these terms.

The subject of the printing of the examination papers was brought forward by the V.C., and various suggestions were made with a view to preventing the possibility of access to the Manuscript or printed copies of the papers before the examination. No resolution was taken by the

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Council, but it was understood that the officers of the University would use every precaution to secure the protection of the papers.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that a general desire existed among teachers throughout the Colony for the establishment, in connection with the University, of a series of examinations for School-Certificates, and gave an outline of a scheme to be considered at a meeting of Teachers to be held on the 14th inst. The Council, without any formal resolution, expressed its favourable disposition towards such a scheme.

An account from Messrs Lawson, for a strong tea box to contain documents &c, (£3 " 3") was ordered to be paid.

The Registrar reported that he had written to each of the Graduates upon the Council's request to admit to the degree of M. D., to ascertain whether he intended to accept the degree, with the following result:— Dr. Ebdon wrote, accepting the degree: Dr. Ross & Dr. Weber wrote, declining to accept it: the others had not answered the Registrar's letters on the subject. Dr. Hermann stated that he had the matter still under consideration.

The Registrar reported that the Trustees in the Estate of the late Mr. J. B. Ebdon had accepted the conditions upon which the Council is willing to receive the money bequeathed by Mr. Ebdon to the University, and that they had paid the money into the Cape of Good Hope Bank to the credit of the University.

The applications of Dr. Brown of Fresenburg, Master of Arts of the Univ: of Aberdeen, for the same degree in this University, and of Mr. A. The Council expressed its approval of the action taken in the matter.

The Registrar was instructed to pay these accounts.

The V. C. reported a vacancy in the Council, caused by the absence of Mr. Porter from the Colony for a longer period than six months. It was resolved to make arrangements for calling together the Convocation of the University, which in terms of the Incorporation Act is entitled to fill this vacancy.

The Registrar read a letter from the Rev. J. Porteus, M. A., resigning his appointment as a Member of Council. His resignation was accepted, and the vacancy ordered to be reported to the Government.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that he had been able to secure suitable premises for the University, and had agreed with the Consistory of the Dutch reformed Church to hire on lease for five years the upper story of the Church Buildings in Bureau Street, at an annual rental of £100. When certain alterations now in progress are complete, there will be a large examination Hall, Library, and all requisite accommodation. The V. C. also stated that in consequence of these arrangements he had not asked upon the Resolution of the Council to apply to Government for a sum of money for the erection of University buildings. It was also reported that when the University takes possession of these premises, it will be necessary to make new arrangements for a messenger and attendance. The Council resolved to leave these matters to the V. C.

Also for Matriculation Doctrines of Chemistry to be the Subject in Physical Science - the limits of the Subject to be defined by the Committee of Examiners in Science.

The Registrar reported that he had received letters from the authorities of the Royal College of Physicians, the Royal College of Surgeons, and the General Council of Medical Education, to the effect that each of these Institutions had agreed to accept the Matriculation Certificate of the University as exempting medical students from a Preliminary Examination in Arts.

On the suggestion of the Vice-Chancellor it was una-

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simultaneously resolved that from the 1st of September next the Salary of the Registrar should be at the rate of £500 per annum, on the distinct understanding that in case of the Registrar not being appointed an Examiner, no fee or compensation can be claimed by him.

The Registrar submitted an application from Mr. J. Slater, B.A. of the Univ. of London, to be admitted to the same degree in this University; and an application from Mr. A. Drummond, M.A. of Edinburgh, to be admitted to the same degree in this University. Mr. Slater's application was granted; Mr. Drummond's postponed for consideration at a future meeting.

The Registrar reported that Dr. Wright of Weyburg, and Dr. Smith of Stillenbach, had intimated their acceptance of the degree to which the Council admitted them at its meeting on the 3rd of December last.

The Vice-Chancellor then introduced the subject of the proposed Scheme of School-Examinations and Certificates in connection with the University. After some discussion, it was proposed by the Rev. G. Agelie, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Fooks, and resolved, that a special meeting for the consideration of this subject be called for Wednesday, the 24th instant.

The Registrar reported that the Rev. W. Leith, the Rev. W. B. Philp, B.A., and the Rev. A. M. Fosse M.B., had undertaken to superintend the Matriculation Examination at Somerset East, Queenstown and Grahamstown respectively.

A special meeting of Council was held this day, in the Educational Museum, to consider the subject of a proposed scheme of school-examinations and certificates in connection with the University. Those were present

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice-Chancellor introduced the subject for the consideration of which the meeting had been called; stating that it is the general opinion of persons interested in Education that a system of school-examinations is very desirable, but that there is some difference of opinion as to whether the University should undertake to conduct such examinations.

After discussion, the following Resolution was unanimously adopted:—

"That it is desirable to examine young persons who are candidates for certificates of qualification in Elementary subjects of instruction, and to issue certificates of qualification to such candidates as reach a standard to be prescribed by the University."

The Council then considered, in detail, the suggestions for carrying out the proposed system of school certificates, and adopted them, provisionally, in the following form:—

1. The University Council is prepared to undertake provisional examinations of boys and girls who are candidates for certificates of qualification in elementary subjects of instruction, and to issue certificates of qualification to such candidates as reach a standard to be prescribed by the University.
2. The examinations will take place in the chief towns of the Colony, and at other convenient centres where sales—

factory arrangements can be made.

3. Teachers and others interested in Education must, in each town, or at each centre, constitute themselves into a local Committee of supervision, and provide the necessary accommodation for the examination. The University Council will appoint one or more Commissioners, to be charged with the personal superintendance of all Candidates throughout the examination, and to be responsible for the integrity of the work done during the examination.
4. The answers of the Candidates will be sealed up by the Commissioner or Commissioners, who will forward them at once to the Registrar of the University.
5. The University will defray all expenses incurred in printing the Examination papers, examining the answers of the Candidates, and issuing certificates. For this purpose a fee of 7/6 shall be paid to the University by each Candidate. The local Committee must collect the fees and transmit the amount to the Registrar.
6. The local Committee must defray all the expenses incurred at the place of examination.
7. The University Council will appoint special examiners to value the answers of the Candidates, and to arrange the names of successful ones in two classes.
8. The Examiners will issue a certificate to all Candidates who have passed the presented examination.
9. Candidates, whether boys or girls, shall be under sixteen years of age when the examination begins.
10. Candidates shall satisfy the examiners of their proficiency in the following Subjects of examination:—
 - (a) The English Language: viz, Writing passages from dictation: parsing of words: analysis of sentences: and English Composition.
 - (b) Arithmetic.
 - (c) Handwriting.
 - (d) Outlines of the History of England.
 - (e) Geography, descriptive and physical.
11. Certificates of age must be furnished to the local

Committee, and the Commissioners or Commissioners will have to certify to the University Council that the certificate in each case has been actually furnished, and is found to be satisfactory.

12. Throughout each examination the Commissioners or Commissioners shall be present.

13. The Commissioners or Commissioners will be charged with the duty of dictating the presented passages.

14. The examinations shall take place simultaneously throughout the Colony about the early part of April in each year.

15. An exhibition of £24 per annum, tenable for two years, will be given to the most deserving Candidate, who has reached the standard of merit fixed by the Council, and satisfies the Council that he is prosecuting his studies at some College or higher institution.

The Registrar was instructed to have these resolutions, thus provisionally adopted, printed, and supplied to the members of Council - and the Resolutions were ordered to be reconsidered at the next ordinary meeting of Council in September.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that the special business for which the meeting had been summoned was to receive the report of the Examiners of Candidates for Matriculation, and read the official lists, signed by the Moderators, of the names of Candidates who have passed with honours and who have failed, respectively. The Vice-Chancellor also reported that several applications had been made by candidates and their teachers for a statement of the number of marks gained by the usual candidates, and that the Committee of Examiners had decided that it was left in their power to furnish the information thus required.

The Council accepted the reports of the Examiners, and ordered that the lists should be officially published in the next Gazette; also that certificates should be issued to the Candidates on application, according to the forms prescribed in the By-Laws and Regulations. It was also decided that the Registrar should enter upon the minutes of the Council a complete list of all the Candidates who had presented themselves for the examination, with the number of marks gained by each Candidate in the several subjects of examination. The Registrar was authorized to furnish to each Candidate, or to his teacher, on application, a list of the marks gained by each Candidate in each subject.

The Vice-Chancellor read a report from the Examiners, signed by the Moderators, stating that in the opinion of the Examiners P. Gregorowski and M. Searle had shown sufficient merit to justify the award of the University Exhibitions. These gentlemen were accordingly elected University Exhibitors, each exhibition being of the annual value of thirty

pounds Sterling, and payable for two years, subject to the condition specified in the By-Laws and Regulations for the Matriculation Examination: the Exhibitions to be held from the 1st of July last, and to be paid at the end of each quarter.

The Registrar was instructed, in publishing the Matriculation lists in the Gazette, to attach in each case the name of the Institution where the Candidate was educated: those who are not connected with any Institution to be marked private Study.

The Registrar was directed to destroy all the answers furnished by Candidates to the Examination Questions.

M^r. Stone gave notice, in writing, that at the next ordinary meeting of Council he would move the following Resolution:—

"That two additional papers on the higher parts of the
 "Subjects of Examination be set at the Matriculation and
 "B. A. Examinations: one of these papers to contain miscellaneous problems in Mathematics and Science; the other
 "to contain passages from any English Author for translation
 "into Greek or Latin, or from any Greek or Latin Author
 "for translation into English. The marks assigned
 "to these papers to have no influence in determining whether
 "a candidate shall pass or be rejected, but the
 "relative positions of the Candidates to be decided by the
 "aggregate number of marks obtained from the whole of
 "the papers, or, in the B. A. Examinations, from the
 "whole of the papers in one of the Sections."

The subject of a system of School examinations and certificates was brought forward, and the printed suggestions, provisionally adopted at the last ordinary meeting, were considered seriatim. The following series of Resolutions was finally adopted:—

University of the Cape of Good Hope.

1. The University Council is prepared to undertake periodical examinations of boys and girls who are candidates for certificates of proficiency in Elementary Subjects of instruction, and to issue certificates to such as reach a standard prescribed by the University.
2. The Examinations will take place in the chief towns of the Colony, and at other convenient centres where satisfactory arrangements can be made.
3. Teachers and others interested in Education, must at each centre constitute a local Committee of Supervision, to provide the necessary accommodation, and make all other local arrangements, for the Examination.
4. The University Council will appoint Commissioners, to be charged with the personal Superintendence of all Candidates throughout the Examination, and to be responsible for the integrity of the work done during the Examination.
5. The answers of the Candidates will be sealed up by the Commissioners, who will forward them at once to the Registrar of the University.
6. The local Committee must defray all the expenses incurred at the place of Examination.

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7. The University will defray all expenses incurred in printing the examination papers, examining the answers of the Candidates, and issuing certificates. For this purpose a fee of seven shillings and six pence shall be paid to the University by each Candidate. The local Committee must collect the fees, and transmit the amount to the Registrar.

8. The University Council will appoint examiners to value the answers of the Candidates, and to arrange the names of successful ones in two classes.

9. The Registrar will issue a certificate to all Candidates who have passed the prescribed examination.

10. Candidates, whether boys or girls, shall be under sixteen years of age when the examination begins.

11. Candidates shall satisfy the examiners of their proficiency in the following subjects of examination:

(a) The English Language, viz:— Writing passages from dictation: parsing of words: analysis of sentences: and English Composition.

(b) Arithmetic, including vulgar and decimal fractions, Practice, Proportion, and Simple Interest.

(c) Handwriting.

(d) Outlines of the History of England, and of South Africa.

(e) Outlines of Geography, Descriptive and Physical.

12. The Commissioners will be charged with the duty of dictating the prescribed passages.

13. Certificates of age must be furnished to the local Committee, and the Commissioners will have to certify to the University Council that the certificate in each case is satisfactory.

14. The examinations shall take place simultaneously throughout the Colony about the early part of April in each year.

Clause 15 of the printed suggestions, respecting an exhibition to the most deserving candidate, was ordered to stand over for future consideration: and a letter from His Honour the Chief Justice, suggesting that the fee attaching to his appointment as
