It was directed that the two special Survey papers (Coord.Geom. etc., and Spherical Trig. etc.) should in future be taken on Saturday, in order that candidates might be able to enter their names for the Survey and Intermediate Examinations in the same year.

The following rearrangement of dates was agreed to— the change to begin in 1884:—
The B.A. ^(Liter.) M.A., Law and Intermediate Examinations to begin on the first Tuesday in June.
The Survey Exam: to begin on the Thursday after the first Tuesday in June.
The Matriculation Examinations to begin on the second Tuesday in June.
The B.A. (Science) Examinations to begin on the third Tuesday in June.

A statement of the expenditure from Jan. 31st to March 27th, 1883, amounting to £770.17.2, was read and laid on the table.

On the motion of Prof. Walker, it was resolved that the annual nominations of University Examiners take place at one ordinary meeting of Council, and the appointment be made at the next: and that nominations be made of Gentlemen as Examiners for specified subjects, one or more.

The following recommendations of the Standing Committee of Studies were submitted and assented to:—

1. That in the Regulations for the Intermediate Examination in Arts, after Latin, one Author, and after Greek, one Author, the following words be inserted, or Selections in Prose and Verse.
2. That, in consequence of the omission of Modern Descriptive Geography from the Matriculation subjects from and after June, 1884, the same marks be given for History as used to be given for History and Geography combined.
3. That, at the final Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, two Examiners be associated, if practicable, in estimating the value of Candidates' answers to each paper in Literature and Philosophy.
4. That the minimum of marks for the B.A. Examination be, as in the Matriculation and Intermediate Examinations, one-third.
5. That, after the definition of Ethics, p. 108, Calendar 1883, the following note be added:—

"N.B.—The Examination for the pass degree does not extend in Psychology beyond the Senses and Intellect."

A letter was read from the Secretary of the S. A. Coll. Council stating that a vacancy in that Council, caused by Mr. Justice Smith's vacating his seat through effluxion of time, was to be filled by the University Council. Mr. Justice Smith was reelected.

The Vice-Chancellor announced that, at a meeting of Convocation held on the 1st of August, Mr. Justice Smith had been elected president of Convocation in place of the late Rev. J. Murray; and Prof. Thomson member of Council in place of the late Mr. Ross.

The Acting Registrar read a statement of the expenditure from July 31st to Sep. 26th, inclusive, amounting to £790-7-7.

Mr. Hugh N. Powell, B.A., Dublin, was admitted to the degree of B.A. in this University.

The Chairman stated that there was a probability of a candidate for the M.A. examination in Classics presenting himself this year, and that additional help might be required in preparing the examination papers. Resolved that such additional help, if required, be procured by the Vice-Chancellor, but that the expense so incurred be defrayed pro rata by those members of the Committee of Examiners in Librarianship who do not take their due share in the work of the examination for the M.A. degree.

The Registrar submitted the following documents:-

- (a) Draft Report of the Council for 1883.
- (b) The financial Statements of the University, with an account of all Receipts and Expenditure in 1883, certified by the auditors as correct.

On the recommendation of the Committee of Examiners in Science, Mr. Stewart was appointed Extra Science Examiner for the Matriculation and Intermediate Examinations, with a fee of £10 for the Matriculation Examination, and £5 for the Intermediate.

An application for a Fellowship from Mr. G. Mitchell, B.A., was submitted to the Council. The Registrar was directed to draw his attention to the conditions of tenure (cal. 1883, p. 114), and to the fact that he had omitted to state in what "branch of Literature or Science intimately connected with South Africa" he proposed to "prosecute study and research".

Prof. Thomson was appointed a member of the Standing Committee of Studies, in place of the late Mr. Ross.

A committee consisting of Dr. Dale, Mr. Foot and Mr. Murray was appointed to consider the conditions of tenure of Matriculation bursaries; and the final award of bursaries and the ^{consideration of the} case of F. P. Crots were postponed till their report of the committee should be sent in.

14. The Subject selected for the Chancellor's Prize Essay in 1883 was "The Government and Civilization of the Native Races in South Africa". The Rev. Prof. Foot and H. E. R. Bright Esq., C. C. of Stellenbosch, were appointed to examine for this prize, and they have awarded the Chancellor's Gold Medal for 1883 to Mr. A. E. Caldecott, of Kimberley. Mr. Caldecott matriculated in 1878 and passed the Law Certificate Examination in 1881. The thanks of the Council are due to Prof. Foot and Mr. Bright for the Service they have rendered to the University.

15. The Council, while acknowledging the liberality of the Colonial Legislature in voting a grant of money to meet the expenditure for School and College Bursaries, desires to call the attention of the Government to the gradually extending work of the University, and trusts that provision will be made for continuing the system of Bursaries which has been of great practical service. The obligations which the Council was pledged to meet under this head were considerably in excess of the amount placed at its disposal, and the result has been to leave the University in debt at the end of the year.

16. The Council has made no change of importance, during the year, in the character of the various University Examinations, but is watching
