

A letter was read from the Superintendent-Inspector of Schools, Maritzburg, Natal, requesting the University to conduct an examination of Candidates for Exhibitions given by the Natal Government to Universities of the United Kingdom. Resolved that the Council cannot undertake to conduct such examination.

A list of payments made from 30 Jan. to 25 March was read, amounting to £254. 10. 10.

The Registrar reported the death of Mr. J. W. Coskey, the messenger of the Education Office, hitherto in charge of the University premises. The arrangements for the custody of the premises were left in the hands of the Registrar.

Sir J. H. de Villiers gave the following notice of motion :- "This Council is of opinion that the 19th Section of the Univ: Incorp: Act requires amendment, so as to allow a person who has been admitted to an ad eundem degree of B. A. or M. A. to be a candidate for the certificate of proficiency in Law and Jurisprudence, although he may not have passed the Matriculation Examination or hold the Third Class certificate in Literature and Science granted by the Board of Examiners."

There had prevented him from being present, as the Representative of the University, at the Tercentenary celebrations of the Univ. of Edinburgh: and that, at the request of the Chancellor, Dr. David Gill had represented this University at the Tercentenary anniversary.

The Registrar reported that a notice sent to the Colonial Office for insertion in the Gazette had been returned, with a letter from the Under Colonial Secretary that in the opinion of the Attorney General University notices do not fall within the contract with the Publishers of the Gazette for gratis notices: but that a subsequent notice, containing the results of the School Examinations had been published in the Gazette by order from the Colonial Office. After some conversation, it was resolved to request the Government from time to time as occasion might arise to publish the results of University Examinations in the Gazette as Government notices: and that Reports of meetings of Council should no longer be inserted in the Gazette, but passed on the University Notice Boards.

The Registrar submitted the programme of arrangements for the University Examinations in June, with the dates at which Examinations are to be held.

In the absence of Sir J. H. de Villiers, the motion of notice in his name, on a proposed amendment of the Univ. Incorp. Act, was ordered to stand over.

Dr. Hahn moved, notice having been duly given, to change the day of meeting of Council from Wednesday to Saturday at 10.15 a.m. Carried.

The following motion by Dr. Dale was carried - notice having been duly given: -

"In the Rules for the School Elementary Examination (University Calendar 1884, p. 96), Section 10 to be amended as follows:

There is no restriction as to age, but Candidates whose age exceeds sixteen years on the first day of January preceding the Examination are not eligible for bursaries or prizes.

Section 14. To insert the words *the end of March* after the word *about*.

In the Rules for the School Honours Examination, Sections 3 and 4 to be amended, as follows:

There is no restriction as to age, but Candidates whose age exceeds eighteen years on the first day of January preceding the Examination are not eligible for bursaries or prizes.

Section 13. To omit the words *but no Candidate* below.

Sections 10 and 16 to be expunged.

School Elementary Examination in 1885 to begin on Friday, 27th March, and School Honours Examination on Monday, 30th March.
Names, &c., to be sent on or before 15th February."

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Requisition to the Vice Chancellor to call this special meeting was read, stating the object of the meeting to be to consider the proposal of which the Chief Justice had given notice in reference to Section 19 of the Univ. Incorporation Act (See Minutes of 25 March).

Previous to entering on the special business of the meeting, the following Resolution, on the motion of the Vice Chancellor, was unanimously carried: -

"The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, on the occasion of their first meeting since the death of the distinguished Chancellor of the University, the Right Honourable Sir Bartle Foor, G. C. S. J., D. C. L., & c., do hereby record their profound sorrow at the sad event: and do further direct that a copy of this Minute be communicated to Lady Foor and her family, together with the expression of their warmest sympathy."

With reference to the proposed Amendment of Section 19 of the Incorporation Act, Dr. Dale called attention to certain other respects in which change was desirable: whereupon it was resolved, on the motion of Professor Thomson, to refer the University Acts to a Committee, to consider in what respects change in them is advisable, and to report to the Council at an early date. The Committee to consist of the Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Dale, Judge Smith, Prof. Thomson and Sir J. H. de Villiers.

(A) Notice of Motion by Mr. Justice Smith:—

That for the future there shall be two Examinations for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws, as the Examiners consider that the present range of subjects is too extensive for one examination.

That no Candidate shall be admitted to the second Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws until after the expiration of one academic year from the date of his passing the first Examination.

That Candidates shall be examined in the following subjects:—

Preliminary / First LL.B. Examination.

1. General Jurisprudence.
2. Roman Law.
3. English Law.
4. International Law.

Final / Second LL.B. Examination.

1. Roman-Dutch Law.
2. Colonial Statute Law.
3. Law of Evidence.
4. Roman Law (a Special Subject).
5. Roman-Dutch Law (a Special Subject).

That the Examination for the first LL.B. Examination in 1885
1886 shall embrace:—

1. In General Jurisprudence: Austin's Jurisprudence (omitting Lectures 2, 3 and 4), Maine's Ancient Law.
2. In Roman Law: the Institutes of Gaius, the Institutes of Justinian.
3. In English Law: Stephen's Commentaries on the Laws of England (omitting the chapters on real property).
4. In International Law: Woolsey's Introduction to the Study of International Law.

That the examination for the second LL.B. Examination in 1886 shall embrace:—

The Resolutions were adopted: the examinations to be known as the "Preliminary" and "Final" L.B. examinations, and the subjects selected for the Preliminary examination in 1885 to be the subjects for 1886 also. It was further resolved to hold an examination for the degree of L.B., according to the Regulations hitherto in force, in 1885, should any candidate offer himself for such examination.

The following report from the Standing Committee of Studies was submitted:—

Report of Standing Committee of Studies, printed by
order of the University Council.

University of the Cape of Good Hope,
28th May, 1884.

1. The Standing Committee of Studies has the honour to report as follows on the several matters referred by the Council to the Committee.

2. The Committee recommends that the Elements of Dynamics (Elementary Mechanics, Hydrostatics, Hydraulics and Pneumatics) be added to the list of optional science subjects at Matriculation; and that Geology, Light and Heat, and Electricity and Magnetism be removed from that list. In Dynamics, Blackie's *Elements of Dynamics* will sufficiently indicate the range of the examination.

3. In the matter of the further definition of the M.A. Subjects in Modern Languages, the Committee recommends the addition of the following note, Calendar, p. 82, after the words "Historical Development of the Languages," viz:—

N.B.—The Examination on the Historical Development of English will extend over the three stages of Old English (or Anglo-Saxon), Middle English and Modern English. The Examination in French will extend from _____; in Italian from _____; in German from _____; and in Dutch from _____.

4. With reference to the question of standard texts of Classical Authors, the Committee will be careful, in recommending Classical Authors for the several Examinations, to specify a standard text whenever in the judgment of the Committee it is necessary or advisable to do so.

5. The Committee recommends the following changes in Text-books:—To substitute on p. 80 of Calendar "Smith's *Analytical Conics*," for "Todhunter's *Plane Co-ord. Geometry*," after "Diff. Calculus Text-books," to insert "Williamson's *Diff. Calculus* or"; after "Todhunter's *Integ. Calculus*" to insert "or Williamson's *Integ. Calculus*"; to substitute Minchin's *Statics* for Ellicott's *Elementary Statics*.

Resolved to accept the recommendation in paragraph 2; the subjects of Geology, Light and Heat and Electricity and Magnetism to be removed from the list of optional matriculation subjects after 1885: Paragraph 3 to stand over: and paragraph 5 adopted, reading instead of the passage as printed the following: "Todhunter's *Plane Co-ordinate Geometry*, or Smith's *Analytical Conics*."

The Report of the Committee on the Incorporation Act was again laid on the table. Resolved that the Report be printed and brought before the next meeting of Council.

Professor Mac Osan moved, in accordance with previous notice, "That for the protection of Examiners the arrangement whereby 'two Examiners are joined in the assessment of Candidates' papers' in literature and Philosophy shall be extended to those in Chemistry." After discussion, the motion was, with the leave of the Council, withdrawn by the Mover.

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to H. E. the Governor the following account of its proceedings during the year 1884.

2. A vacancy in the Council was caused by the absence from the Colony, for more than six months, of David Gill Esq. L.D. The Government appointed J. W. G. van Coodt Esq., Ph. D., to the vacant seat.

3. On the Report of the Secretary of the S. A. Coll. Council that the seat held by the Rev. A. Skynner had become vacant by effluxion of time, the vacancy was filled by the re-appointment of that gentleman as a member of the College Council.

4. Langham Dele Esq., M. A., L.D., was unanimously elected Vice-Chancellor of the University on the 26th of July, in succession to the Ven. Archdeacon Badmell D.D., who was obliged to leave the Colony on important private business.

5. An invitation was received by the Council from the University of Edinburgh, to appoint a delegate to represent the Univ. of C. G. Hope at the Celebration of the Tercentenary of the Edinburgh University. At the request of the Council the late Chancellor of the University, the Right Hon. Sir H. B. E. Frow, undertook to represent the University on that occasion. The serious illness of the Chancellor, however, prevented him from being able to render this service to the University; and at his request Dr. David Gill F.R.S., who was at the time in England and a member of this Council, represented the University at the Tercentenary celebration.

6. The fatal issue of Sir Bartholomew Frow's illness left the University for a second time without a Chancellor. On the receipt of the intelligence of his death, the Council forwarded to Lady Frow a resolution expressing its sympathy with the bereaved family, to which Lady Frow replied in the following letter: (see Minutes of 27 Sept. 1884).

7. By the unanimous vote of Convocation on the 6th of Dec. 1884, the Right Hon. the Earl of Carnarvon was elected Chancellor of the University in succession to the Right Hon. Sir Bartholomew Frow.

13. The Annual ceremony of conferring degrees was held on the 1st of August, in the Public Library, again courteously granted for the purpose by the Library Committee: when the Vice Chancellor, in the presence of the Council and the Convocation of the University, conferred degrees upon those whom the Council had declared qualified to receive them, and addressed the Congregation on the works of the University.

14. The Council desires again to acknowledge the liberality of the Legislature in providing funds for Bursaries for the Support of poor Students, as well as for the ordinary expenditure of the University.

15. The present Council will, in July next, have completed its term of six years, and will then go out of office by effluxion of time. During this period the work of the University, so carefully inaugurated by the first Council, has been considerably extended, and some important changes have been made - especially in the examinations for degrees. It will be for the Council which succeeds the present one to watch the effect of these changes, and to be guided in its action by the results presented during the next few years. Meanwhile the Statistics which accompany this Report encourage the belief that the University has not lost, under the direction of the present Council, its hold on the public confidence, and is continuing to exercise an important influence on the Education of the Country.

16. Appended to this Report is a complete Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure of the University during the year: with a tabular Statement, showing the results of all the examinations conducted by the University since its Incorporation.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the South
African College Council, informing the Council that the Hon. Al-
fred Eddon Esq. M.L.C. will vacate his seat as a member of the
College Council on the 31st of March, and that the nomination of

of the University. Professor Foot, Sec. of the College Council,

4. Competitors must be under Eighteen years of age when the Examination begins, and must produce certificates that they have been prosecuting their studies, during the two years preceding the Examination, in the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, or in a South African Colony or State making such annual contributions to the funds of the University as is described in the By-Laws and Regulations framed in accordance with the provisions of the University Extension Act, 1875.

5. The holder of the Free Exhibition shall satisfy the Vice-Chancellor, from time to time, that he is pursuing his studies with a view to graduation in this University.

6. The first competition for the Free Exhibition shall be at the Matriculation Examination in 1880.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that the number of candidates for the School Examinations is greatly in excess of any previous number. 11. On the recommendation of the Law Examiners, the examination for the degree of Bachelor of Laws has been divided into two parts - a Preliminary and a Final Examⁿ, with an interval of not less than one year between the two examinations.

12. The Council has made one important change in the School Examinations. Candidates are no longer required to be under a certain age at the date of the examination: but no candidates for the Elementary Examⁿ above 16, or for the Honours Examⁿ above 18, will be eligible for Prizes or Bursaries. This change has given general satisfaction to those who are interested in these examinations.

A list of fees paid to School examiners in 1885 was read, showing a total amount paid for these examinations of £282.10. —

On the motion of the Vice-Chancellor, the Rev. T. Chamberlain, M.A., Cambridge, was admitted to the same degree in this University.

It was voted that the standard for Honours at the Intermediate Examination in Arts be fixed at 1000 marks, i.e. one half of Total aggregate.
