it was not urged on public attention with the perseverance which would have been used in more prosperous times.

It is to be feared indeed that the movement had slipped from popular memory, when at the meeting of the Committee above mentioned in October last, the following Resolution was passed.

"That the Honble Alfred Odew be appointed Treasurer in the Room of J. R. H. Hewitt, who has left the Town and that the Treasurer be hereby instructed to pay over to the Registrar of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, after 31 Dec: 1854. The amount standing at the credit of the Fund in the Standard Bank, with the view of founding the Freere Scholarship, open to all Educated in South Africa."

In giving effect to this Resolution, I desire to record the conviction, of which I believe this Memorial to be intended, as a permanent Expression, not only of the personal worth and distinguished ability of the late Governor, but also of the sagacious far seeing and comprehensive character of the Policy instituted by him, a Policy which, if carried out would have laid the foundation of a peaceful and progressive future for South Africa.

The minutes of last meeting having been read and confirmed, the Registrar read a letter from the Hon. Alfred Ebdon M.C., Hon. Treasurer of the Free Memorial Fund, stating that at a meeting of the Subscribers to that Fund on the 30th of September last the following Resolution was passed:—

"That the Hon. Alfred Ebdon be appointed Treasurer in the room of M^r. R. A. Hewitt, who has left the town: and that the Treasurer be hereby instructed to pay over to the Registrar of the University of the Cape of Good Hope after 31 Dec, 1884 the amount standing at the credit of the Fund in the Standard Bank, with the view of founding the Free Scholarship, open to all educated in South Africa: and submitting a cheque for £610.0.3, the amount standing to the credit of the Fund in the Standard Bank. On the motion of the Chief Justice it was resolved to accept the Trust, and to convey to the donors through the Hon. M^r. Ebdon the thanks of the Council for the gift.

The Registrar submitted draft Regulations for the Free Memorial. Resolved that the Regulations be printed and circulated among the members of Council, and that they be considered at the next ordinary meeting. It was further resolved that the Registrar be authorized to invest the capital in the purchase of Government Stock on such terms as are approved by the Finance Committee: and that the Scholarship be termed the "Free Exhibition".

As Mr. Reyland is not personally known to any member of Council present at the meeting, his admission is to be provisional, pending the receipt of a satisfactory testimonial from the Bishop of Cape Town.

A list of payments made since last meeting was read, amounting to £5494. 5. 4. In this sum are included a payment of £4061 to the Treasury, in part payment of Government Stock, the purchase of which was authorized by the meeting of 31 Jan. last; and a payment of £816. 4. to the Bank of Africa, for Government Stock purchased for the investment of the Free Memorial Fund and other moneys of the University, in accordance with the instructions given to the Registrar at the last meeting.

Professor MacBewan moved the resolution of which notice was given by him at the meeting of the 31st of January (see minutes of that meeting). After discussion the motion was carried, the change to take effect in the Examinations of 1887.

Professor Thomson moved, in accordance with previous notice,

"That the paragraph beginning "Text-books:—Geometrical Conics, &c." (Calendar 1884-85, page lxxxix.) be deleted, and the following inserted in its place:—

GEOMETRICAL CONICS:—The range of matter and sequence of demonstrations will be as in Wilson's Solid Geometry and Conic Sections, Book V. Students who desire additional information may consult any of the following treatises:—Besant's Geometrical Conic Sections, Taylor's Geometry of Conics, Drew's Conic Sections.

I am directed by the Council of this University to address you on the subject of the privilege granted by the Univ. of Edinburgh to Students in Science who enter at Edinburgh from other approved Institutions (Edinb. Univ. Cal. 1884-5, p. 178, 3.)

The Council wishes to know whether general regulations might not be framed, under which Students of the standing required might be admitted to the privilege in question, from any Colonial Institution approved by both Universities.

I shall be much obliged to you for any information on the subject with which you may favour me.

The Committee beg to recommend that the Registrar should be informed that applications should be sent to this University from the individual Colleges, enclosing full details as to the strength of the teaching staff, the time per session devoted to each particular subject, the library, laboratories, and means of instruction. The Senatus has not power under its regulations to enter into a general arrangement of the kind indicated in the letter of the Registrar, but of course the Senatus would consider all the evidence brought before it, including any statement of opinion that may be made by the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope.

Dear Sir,

Some time ago I communicated to you certain information I had received from Holland, viz. that the Secretary for Home Affairs, after having decided that Cape students in Law, Theology & Literature would be ^(as usual) admitted at Dutch Universities on showing that they had passed the Intermediate Examination of the Cape University, had discovered that the fact of their having passed that examination was no evidence of their having studied the Greek Language, or of their being more advanced in Latin than they were on passing ~~the~~ Matriculation Examination, and for this reason thought it advisable not to admit them unless they produced an additional certificate of having passed in both languages at the Intermediate.

You then told me that the Registrar, with any special order of the University Council, would give the additional certificates to such students as required them. As, however, it is a matter of importance

Resolved that £700 be invested for the Porter Fund in government stock, at such rate of premium as the Finance Committee may advise: and that a Porter Studentship be offered for competition in 1887 and in 1888: also that in and after 1887 the two Jamison Exhibitions be tenable for one year only, instead of for two years as at present.

A letter was read from M. J. H. Schumann, asking for permission to present himself for the Matriculation and Intermediate examinations in the same year. The Council declined to grant the application.

Resolved, on the motion of Prof. Foot, that the application be accorded to, on the production of satisfactory evidence to the Registrar that M. Holland is a B. A. of Cambridge.

The Registrar reported that by the advice of the Finance Committee he had accepted the offer of the Liquidators of the Cape Commercial Bank to pay the whole of the interest due on the Fixed Deposits in the Bank at the rate of $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, and that now both Principal and interest had been paid.

Mr. Justice Smith to be Chairman and Conservator of the Committee.

Professor Foot called attention to the importance of seating the candidates at examinations in such positions and at such distances from each other as to make it impossible for any candidate to copy or to obtain suggestions from the papers of another candidate. The Registrar was requested to give an instruction on this subject to Commissioners in charge of examinations.

Professor Thomson called attention to the notice on the subject of Geometrical Conics on page CXXIV of the Calendar, where it is stated that the range of matter and sequence of demonstration will be as in Wilson's Solid Geometry and Conic Sections, Book V - and that this change will be introduced in 1887; while the Council by resolution on 28 March last decided that it should be introduced in 1885. The Registrar stated that he had called the attention of the Service Moderators to the matter, and that the Conic paper for 1885 would be so framed as to meet the case of students who have taken either Wilson or the authors previously recommended as their guide in studying the subject.

The following Subjects in Greek and History were selected for the School Higher Examinations in 1887:—

The Registrar reported that the lease of the premises hired by the University would expire on 30 April, and that there must be 3 months notice given if the lease is to be renewed. Resolved that notice be given that the Council will renew the lease for a further period of five years.

A letter was read from the Under Colonial Secretary, stating the intention of the Secretary of State for the Colonies to offer a limited number of Commissions in the Royal Engineers to graduates of this University, on certain conditions, and requesting the Council to nominate as soon as possible any gentlemen who may be desirous of obtaining such Commissions. Resolved that it is desirable to obtain further and fuller information on the subject before making public intimation as to the proposed Commissions.

On the motion of the Vice-Chancellor, Mr. S. T. Wakefield, B. A., of London, was unanimously admitted to the same degree in this University.

A letter was read from Mr. Harold E. Stidolph, requesting the Council to add examinations in Music to the scheme of the School Examinations. Resolved that the matter stand over, as Mr. Stidolph has informed the Registrar that those who are interested in Musical Education in the Colony will probably address the Council on the subject.

The Registrar submitted a list of payments made from 29 Nov. 1885 to 29 Jan., 1886, amounting to £1625.1.4.

13. The tabular statement appended to this Report, giving the comparative result of the University Examinations, shows that there has been a steady increase in the number of Candidates for Examination. The large increase in the number of Candidates for School Certificates is due in great measure to the removal of the age restriction. The review of the year's operations confirms the opinion expressed by the Council in its last Report - that the University retains its hold on public confidence, and is continuing to exercise an important influence on the education of the Country.

14. The usual statements of receipts and expenditure during the year, showing the exact financial position of the University and its several Trust Funds, are appended to this Report. It will be seen from these statements that all moneys held in trust by the University are now invested in Government Securities, with the exception of one amount of eleven hundred pounds invested in Municipal Debentures of the Town Council of Cape Town.

The Registrar submitted a Memorandum on the Subject, which was adopted and ordered to be sent to the Government. The Memorandum is as follows:

Memorandum on the Letter of the Under Colonial Secretary in reference to the Printing required by the University.

1. The Council of the University begs respectfully to call the attention of the Government to the fact that the University has never made a claim to have its notices inserted in the Gazette free of Charge on the ground that they come under the Classification "Official Notices". The uniform practice has been to send the notices to the Colonial Office, with a request that they may be published in the Gazette: and every such publication has been by order of the Government.

2. Since therefore the University has not claimed that its notices are to be considered official, the dilemma spoken of in the Letter of the Under Colonial Secretary does not seem to the Council to exist. An order of the Government to insert University notices in the Gazette does not, in the judgment of the Council, affect the right of the University to make such arrangements for its printing and other requirements as may be considered most expedient.

3. The Council is of opinion that it is of the highest importance to the interests of the University and the public that the University should be completely at liberty to make its own arrangements for printing. The Council has reason to believe that great additional confidence is secured by the fact that most of the University printing is done out of the Colony.

A letter was read from the Superintendent General of Education, stating that, owing to the reduced amount that will be available for Educational grants during the next financial year, the Grant to the University from 1 July will be at the reduced rate of £1750 p.a.; and the amount for School and College Bursaries will be £250 p.a. from the same date. Should no further reductions be ordered by Parliament.

The Registrar reported that 76 centres for the School Examinations had been fixed: and that the number of Candidates registered was 1010 for the Elementary and 113 for the Honours Examination. It was resolved that four Bursaries of £15 should be given at the Honours Examination, and twenty of £10 at the Elementary - the awards to be made by the Vice-Chancellor on the conditions already laid

Professor Thomson submitted a list of mathematical text books, drawn up by himself and M. C. A. Smith at the request of the Committee of Studies. After discussion, the Council decided, by a majority of votes, not to issue such a list. It was ordered to call the attention of the Moderators of the Science Committee to the changes to be introduced in 1887 in the Algebra and Trigonometry Subjects of the Intermediate Examination, and to request him to see that the Intermediate Science papers in 1886 are less difficult than those set in 1885.

The following Resolution, adopted by the Committee of Studies on the motion of Prof. Macbrian, was ordered to stand over for consideration at the next meeting of Council:—

That it is advisable to provide for the increasing Class of Students whose special tendency is towards Experimental and Biological Science, by making the Examination in Science consist of two Branches, viz:—

- I. Mathematics as Principal Subject.
Experimental and Biological Science as Subsidiary.
- II. Experimental and Biological Science as Principal Subject.
Mathematics as Subsidiary.

the words 'experimentally treated' be inserted after the word 'Electricity' (Ca-
lendar 1885-6, page xcvi, (d)). After discussion it was resolved that
instead of the proposed insertion the following be added as a foot-note:-

Mr. Cornett was appointed Auditor of the University accounts for 1885, with a fee of £5.

The usual recess was fixed for one month, from the 21st of December.

With reference to the letter from Mr. Clouston on the Subject of the U. A. Hood, the Registrar was requested to get a specimen hood made, with violet or gold coloured silk instead of white silk, to be submitted to the next meeting of Council.

The Report of the Committee appointed to consider and report upon the Civil Service Law Examination was laid on the Table. The Report recommends

1. That the Subjects for Examination shall be the same as those prescribed for the Certificate of Proficiency in Law and Jurisprudence, omitting Roman Law and Notarial Practice.
 2. That the Regulations shall be the same as those for the Law Certificate Examination, except that Candidates shall not be required to have passed the Matriculation Examination, or to hold third class certificates in Literature and Science.
 3. That the first Examination shall begin on the first Tuesday in June.
- The Report was adopted, and a Copy got ordered to be sent to the Government.

Professor Thomson moved that it be committed to the Committee of Studies to consider and report upon the By-Laws and Regulations for the award of Scholarships at the B. A. Examination. After discussion, the motion was withdrawn by the leave of the Council.

Professor Thomson further moved that on page cxxiii of the Calendar (1885-6) the word Experimental be inserted before Physics. The Resolution was carried, no change to be made in the next issue of the Calendar, and the Moderator in Science requested to see that in the Physics B. A. Examination of 1886 preponderance be given to Experimental and not to Mathematical Physics. A letter on the Subject from Professor Fischer, of Göttingen, was submitted by the Registrar.

Professor Macowan brought forward his motion, standing over from last meeting, on the division of the B. A. Science Examination into two Branches, one of which should be the Principal and the other a Subsidiary Subject. After discussion, the motion was withdrawn in favour of the following amendment by Mr. Justice Smith: "That a Committee be appointed to consider and report upon the question whether it is desirable to provide for a class of Students who may have a special tendency towards Experimental Science." This motion was adopted: the Committee to consist of Professors Hahn, Macowan and Thomson, the Hon. C. A. Smith and the Hon. Mr. Justice Smith.
