#### REPORT.

The Committee appointed to consider and report upon the proposal that some alteration should be made in the subjects of examination for the B.A. degree in the department of Mathematics and Natural Science, in order that candidates with an aptitude for science should have a greater freedom in the choice of subjects for examination, begs to recommend the adoption of the following revised syllabus in lieu of the present one (see University Calendar 1885-1886, pp. xci. and cxxiii. :—

II. Mathematics and Experimental and Natural Science.—The Examination shall include—

- (a) Algebra and Plane Trigonometry.
  - (b) Plane Geometry and Geometrical Conics.
  - (c) Statics, Dynamics and Hydrostatics.\*
- One paper in each.

\* The questions on Statics, Dynamics and Hydrostatics will not involve a knowledge of the Differential and Integral Calculus or of Analytical Conics.

8. By a resolution of the Subscribers to the "Forsyth Memorial Fund," the Treasurer to the Fund was authorized to pay the amount, viz £610.0.3, standing to its credit in the Standard Bank, to the Registrar of the University, for the purpose of founding a Scholarship in Commemoration of the late Sir Bartle Forth. The amount has been received by the University and invested in permanent Government Stock. The "Forsyth Exhibition" is of the annual value of £30, and is triennial for three years. It will be offered for competition at the Matriculation Examination in 1886.
9. The Annual Ceremony of Conferring degrees was held at the close of the Academical year, in the Hall of the Public Library, courteously granted for the purpose by the Library Committee. Degrees were conferred upon the graduates of the year, and the Vice-Chancellor addressed the Congregation on the work of the University.
10. The Council has made no important changes during the year in the Scheme of the University Examinations. The By-Laws and Regulations in reference to the several Examinations have been thoroughly revised by the Standing Committee of Studies, to which the University is under great obligations for the care with which this revision has been made. The changes in detail, to take effect in and from 1887, are published in the recent issue of the University Calendar.
11. The J. B. Ebdon Prize, for the best Essay on Banking Currency and Finance, was offered for competition during the year, and awarded to Mr. J. G. Chaplin, of Port Elizabeth, a certificate-holder of the late Board of Public Examiners. The thanks of the Council are due to the Rev. Prof. Foot and the Hon. C. Abbot-Smith, for their services in examining for this prize.
12. The Council acknowledges the liberality of the Legislature in providing bursaries for the support of poor students, as well as funds for the ordinary expenditures of the University. These Bursaries very materially assist the work of the University, by enabling students who have given promise of distinction at the lower examinations to continue their studies for degrees or special certificates; and the Council most respectfully urges on the Government and the Legislature the very great importance of maintaining without further reduction the grants of public money for educational purposes.

M<sup>r</sup>. Justice Smith reported that the Committee appointed on the 28<sup>th</sup> of November to consider the proposed division of the B. A. Science Examination had agreed upon certain recommendations, which it was the wish of the Committee to place in the hands of members of Council before submitting them formally to the Council. Proposed that the Recommendations be printed and circulated; and that they be considered by the Council at its next meeting.

The following letter from the Under Colonial Secretary, on the subject of University notices in the Gazette, was read:—

Cape Town, 15 March, 1886

Claim of W. A. Richards & Sons  
to perform printing work.

Sir

Adverting to your letter N<sup>o</sup>. 13 dated 20 May, 1885, being a Report on a letter from Messrs W. A. Richards and Sons submitting that Printing work required to be performed for the University of the Cape of Good Hope and other Educational bodies receiving Government aid should be considered as coming under their Contract with the Government, it would appear that the Contractors have some ground for complaint at all events in so far as the University is concerned.

For many years Messrs Richards & Co have inserted all University "Gazette" notices free of charge, the Registrar holding that they came under the Classification "Official Notices", which under their Contract they were required to insert gratis.

With this exception the Contractors were forced to be satisfied, and surrendered their claim (a large one) for advertisements; but the University was thereby impaled on the horns of a dilemma, in regard to its other Printing requirements, which by analogy should

"The questions will not involve any mathematical knowledge beyond that required for the pass examinations at the B. A. degree."

Professor Walker moved in accordance with previous notice "that the Intermediate Examination in Arts... shall commence on the second Tuesday in June" (Calendar, page LXXXII). After discussion, the motion was withdrawn in favour of the following, which was unanimously accepted:— That the matriculation examinations shall begin on the second Tuesday in June, and the other examinations on the fourth Tuesday in June, (the necessary modification being made in the case of the Senior Examination).

A letter was read from the Rev. Canon Espin, Principal of St. Andrew's College, Grahamstown, expressing the opinion of the Masters and Lecturers in that Institution on the range of the Chemistry to be taken up at the School Higher Examination. The letter was referred to the Committee of Studies.

A letter was read from the Rector of the Grey Institute, Port Elizabeth, suggesting that candidates should be allowed to bring up a second Physical Science Subject instead of Greek at Matriculation, and four instead of three subjects in Group II (if not in Group I also) at the School Higher Examination. The Vice-Chancellor stated that he had already replied to the letter.

A letter was read from M. W. B. Robinson, who has made three unsuccessful attempts to pass the Surrey Examination, requesting that his fee for that examination may be allowed to extend to next year, as he was not in good health at the time of the last examination, and is not able to pay the fee again. Resolved that the matter stand over, and that Mr. Robinson be asked to furnish evidence of illness at the time of examination.

A letter was read from the Secretary of Senate of the Stultensbosch College, with reference to the violation of discipline referred to in the minutes of the last meeting. The letter expressed the opinion of the Senate that, should the candidate make a satisfactory apology, the ends of University discipline would be secured without proceeding to the extremity of making the exclusion from examination permanent. A letter was read on the same subject from G. B. Budler, the candidate in question, offering his humblest apology for what he had done, and disclaiming any intention to insult any one. The writer begged the Council to forgive his rash and thoughtless act, and not to sentence him to permanent exclusion from future University examinations. Resolved to accept the apology, provided the examiners who reported the offensive remarks are satisfied with it, and to allow the candidate to present himself hereafter for examination, should he desire to do so.

A letter was read from Mr. Charles F. Juritz, M.A., applying for the University Fellowship. Mr. Juritz proposes to make researches and investigations in Colonial Botany, Forestry and Agriculture. Resolved that the application stand over till next meeting.

without the Special Consent of the Council.

M. W. B. Robinson's application for exemption from the payment of a Second Society Examination fee in 1887 was again submitted, with a further letter from M. R. stating that he could not furnish a medical certificate of illness. It is stated that the Council cannot depart from the usual rule as to the payment of fees.

A letter was read from the Under Colonial Secretary, enclosing a letter from the Agent-General and copy of a letter from D. H. D. Harper, Principal of Jesus College, Oxford, in reference to certain privileges which it is proposed to grant to members of Colonial Universities should they seek admission to the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge. The suggestions of the Council are invited on the following proposal:—

(Amended issue.)

[For the Hebdomadal Council only.]

At a meeting of the Committee appointed to consider the admission to the University of Students coming from Indian and Colonial Universities,—

Present—The PRINCIPAL OF JESUS, PROFESSOR PRICE, DR. MARKBY, MR. ROBINSON, MR. JACKSON,—

It was agreed, after consultation with the Council of the Senate at Cambridge, to recommend—

That any person who shall have been a member for not less than two years of any Indian or Colonial University approved by Decree of Convocation, and who shall have passed the Examination prescribed by such University for students at the end of their second year, shall have the same privileges which the existing Statute grants to students of Affiliated Colleges, i.e. "he shall be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination of the University without having been matriculated; and if he shall have satisfied the Moderators in that Examination and shall have been matriculated in the course of the Term next following, he shall not be required to pass Responsions, and the Term in which he shall have matriculated shall, for the purposes of any provision respecting the standing of Members of the University, be reckoned as the fifth Term from his Matriculation; and if he shall have obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination, he shall be allowed to supplicate for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts as soon as he shall have kept statutable residence and employed himself in the study of Arts and in hearing lectures for eight Terms and shall have passed the Second Public Examination." (Statutes, II. vii. § 6 (p. 7).)

That in order to carry out this proposal a new Statute be introduced, having the title "On Indian and Colonial Universities."

[May 10, 1886.]

It was resolved to furnish the Oxford Authorities with full particulars of the Arts Examinations of this University, and to recommend that the proposed concessions be extended to candidates who have graduated in Arts in the University of the Cape of Good Hope.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice Chancellor reported that a meeting of Convocation would be summoned for the 2<sup>nd</sup> of October, for the election of a member of Council in the place of the late D<sup>r</sup> Ebdon, and of the President of Convocation.

The Vice Chancellor reported that owing to an error on the part of one of the Examiners the name of Frederick S. Green was omitted from the list of successful candidates at Matriculation, although he was entitled to pass, but the name has subsequently been added and appears in the final publication of the lists in the Gazette.

On the motion of the Vice Chancellor, leave was given to the Standing Committee of Studies to meet in Sections, representing Literature and Philosophy, Mathematics and Natural Science, and Law respectively.

The Vice Chancellor reported that the School Elementary Examination would commence on Thursday, the 24<sup>th</sup> of March, and the School Higher Examination on Monday, the 28<sup>th</sup> of March.

A letter was read from M<sup>r</sup> H. Lardner Beake, B.A., LL.B., applying for an appointment as examiner in Literature and Philosophy. The Vice Chancellor called the attention of the Council to the rule which requires Examiners to be nominated at one ordinary meeting and appointed at the next.

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Standing Committee of Studies, and resolved accordingly to appoint Dr. Holbe a member of that Committee.

Professor Foot moved the Resolution of which he gave notice at last meeting, in reference to the appointment of examiners. The motion was carried in the following form:— "That the nominations of examiners shall be made at the special meeting when the results of the University examinations are reported to the Council."

The Vice-Chancellor moved the following Resolutions, of which due notice had been given:—

1. That in 1888, there being no Foundation Scholarships available, each University Scholarship shall be of the value of £150 per annum, and be tenable, as at present, for two years, under the same conditions as the Porter and Jamison Scholarships.
2. That in 1890, the Jamison being the only Foundation Scholarship available, one University Scholarship of £150 per annum shall be given, tenable for two years, under the same conditions as the Porter and Jamison Scholarships, on the understanding that if the First Candidate in Literature and Philosophy takes the Jamison, the First in Mathematics and Science shall take the University Scholarship, and *vice versa*.
3. That the arrangements for Scholarships stand as follows:—  
1887. Porter and Maynard.  
1888. Two University Scholarships, £150 per annum each.  
1889. Porter and Maynard.  
1890. Jamison and one University Scholarship at £150 per annum.
4. That at the School Examinations the Commissioners shall be appointed and paid by the University Council, and to meet part of this additional expense the fee for each Candidate at the School Elementary Examination shall be 10s, and at the School Higher Examination, 15s.

The Resolutions were adopted as printed, striking out all the words in Resolution 2 after the words "as the Porter and Jamison Scholarships".

The Council proceeded to consider the following

MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-CHANCELLOR.

The Vice-Chancellor respectfully signifies to the Council his intention to vacate office on 1st August next, on the completion of a further term of service for two years; and trusts that it will be convenient to the Council to appoint his successor at the ordinary meeting in July.

The Vice-Chancellor considered that it would be more convenient to the Council to deal with the matter in his absence and retired from the meeting. Canon Ogilvie having been voted into the Chair, it was moved by Professor Foot, seconded by Professor Thomson and carried unanimously that Dr. Dale be asked to withdraw his resignation. The mover and second of the Resolution were appointed a deputation to wait upon the Vice-Chancellor and communicate the Resolutions, assuring him at the same time of the Council's very high appreciation of his services to the Council and the University. The deputation, having carried out the Council's instruction, returned with the Vice-Chancellor, who intimated his compliance with the wish of the Council and resumed the Chair amidst the acclamation of the Meeting.

A letter was read from Mr. D. W. Zeeman, asking to be allowed to proceed to the B. A. examinations, for which he was an unsuccessful candidate in 1880, without having previously passed the Intermediate Ex-

9. The annual ceremony of conferring degrees was held at the close of the Academical year, in the Hall of the Public Library. Degrees were conferred on the graduates of the year, and the Vice-Chancellor addressed the Congregation on the work of the University.
10. The Council has resolved that, for the future, Commissioners in charge of the School Examinations shall receive a stated fee for their services. In order to meet this additional expense, it has been found necessary to make a slight increase in the fees payable by Candidates for School Certificates.
11. The Council again acknowledges the liberality of the Legislature in providing Bursaries for the support of poor students, as well as funds for the ordinary expenditure of the University. There has been an eager competition for the Bursaries, and they have in many cases enabled deserving students to prosecute their studies, which but for this assistance would have been discontinued or interrupted. It would be a great satisfaction to the Council if the grant for Bursaries could be restored to its original amount: while, in reference to the grant for ordinary expenditure, the Council begs respectfully to state that it will not be able to meet its obligations in 1887, unless the Government contribution is at least equal to the amount provided for in the Estimates of 1885 and previous years.
12. The usual Statements of Receipts and Expenditure during the year are appended to this Report, and show the exact financial position of the School Trust and other Funds administered by the University. To these is added a tabular statement of the number of Candidates who have presented themselves for examination since the Incorporation of the University in 1873.

The Vice Chancellor reported that Dr. J. H. M. Beck, M.B., C.M., had been duly nominated for the vacant seat in the University Council: and that the Congregation of the University for conferring degrees would be held on the 15<sup>th</sup> of October.

The Vice Chancellor further reported the award of the Matriculation Baccalariats to W. Caldwell and E. G. Mallesco, and of the Intermediate Baccalariats to G. Müller and D. P. de Bruyn: and that the apology offered by G. B. Budden had been accepted by the Examiners.

On the motion of Professor Walker, Mr. J. H. Brady was appointed French Examiner for 1887.

A communication was read from Canon Espie, of the Dioc. Coll., Grahamstown, to the effect that the changes in the dates of the final examinations do not suit the Committee of the College Authorities, and requesting a reconsideration of the subject. Resolving that the changes were made in accordance with the wishes of the majority of professors and teachers whom they affect, and that it is not expedient to re-open the question.

The application for a Fellowship from Mr. C. F. Juritz, M.A., was again read. On the motion of Canon Ogilvie, seconded by the Rev. D. Holbe, it was resolved that Mr. Juritz be elected to the University Fellowship, in terms of the By-Laws on the subject: that Professors Hahn and Macoscan be appointed a Committee to confer with Mr. Juritz, and arrange with him the exact subjects to which his researches will have reference: that the term of the Fellowship date from the 1<sup>st</sup> of January, 1887, provided the report of the Committee's conference with Mr. Juritz is satisfactory to the Council: and that the holder of the Fellowship is not at liberty to accept any other engagements.
