Dear Sir

In answer to your letter of 26 August last, in which you requested, on behalf of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, that the Arts degrees of that University might be recognised as qualifying for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity in the Univ. of Edinburgh, I am desired to state that the University Court of the latter University had, after communication with the Senatus Academicus, recognised the degree of Master of Arts of the Univ. C. of Hope as qualifying for the degrees of Bachelor of Divinity, Bachelor of Laws and Doctor of Science in the department of Philosophy, in the University of Edinburgh.

On the subject of the new regulations for the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Science (see minutes of 29 May, 1884), to take effect in 1888, it was resolved that, should there be candidates to whom Grahamstown would be a convenient centre, the practical examinations in Chemistry, Botany and Zoology shall be held there as well as in Cape Town.

The Registrar submitted a list of Payments made since last meeting, amounting to £ 613.0.0.

The Vice Chancellor submitted a request from the Literary Examiners that three hours and a half should be allowed for the English paper at Matriculation. The Council decided that three hours is sufficient time for the English as well as for the other papers.

The Vice Chancellor reported that arrangements are being made for the examinations in June at different centres throughout the Colony, and also at Portofortuin and Mankburg: also that two of the candidates for Matriculation at Mankburg are competitors for the Exhibition offered by the Natal Government, and that the Moderators in Literature and Science had privately agreed, at the request of the Council of Education in Natal, to prepare extra papers for candidates for this exhibition.

Professor Foot stated that Sir Gordon Spring had intimated to him his intention of endeavoring to obtain from Parliament authority for laying down a wood pavement in Bunsau and Grove Streets, and that he would be glad to have the views of the University Council on the subject. The Council expressed its opinion very strongly in favour of the proposal, but decided that it could not make any contribution towards defraying the cost of the work.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that the Physical Geography papers of three Uitenhage candidates at the School Higher Examination had not come to hand, and that a new paper had been set on the subject. But after the answers had been valued and the lists published, the original papers were delivered in Cape Town, six weeks after they had been posted at Uitenhage. The Registrar reported that two of the three candidates had completely failed, while the third had obtained a pass. It was accordingly decided to abide by the result of the second examination.

The Conditions of Tenure require that a Candidate for the Fellowship shall satisfy the Council that he is qualified to prosecute study and research in some branch of Literature or Science intimately connected with South Africa. Mr. Charles F. Jurity, who has completed a course of Scientific Study in the South African College, and passed the M. A. examination in the department of Natural Science with high distinction, has been elected to the Fellowship. The Subjects in which Mr. Jurity will conduct research are: The Medicinal Plants of the Colony; The Woods of the Colonial Forests; The Sheep pasturage of the Barroos; and The Leguminous Fodder Plants cultivated in the Colony.

7. At the request of the Government, the Council has conducted the examination of Candidates for the Civil Service Law Examination.

A letter was read from Mr. J. M. Herschenschm, Assistant Master in the Maritzburg High School, asking for permission to enter for the Matriculation and Intermediate Examinations in 1888. A letter from Mr. W. C. Meredith was submitted, asking if an ad eundem B.A. may proceed to the M.A. Examination. The Registrar stated that the question had been settled in the case of Mr. Pringle, who made a similar application in 1881, when it was decided that an ad eundem B.A. may proceed to M.A., but is not eligible for the Fellowship of the University.

The question was raised whether the names of candidates who pass the Elementary Examination should be arranged alphabetically, as at present, or in order of merit, as before the last Examination. A brief discussion ensued, but no resolution was taken on the subject.

A letter was submitted from Mr. C. H. Hutton, asking that in the case of candidates who intend to qualify as Attorneys the minimum age for Matriculation should be fixed at 15 years. Provided that as a Bill on the subject of the qualifications for Attorneys is now before the Legislature, the Council does not deem it expedient to enter upon the question at present.

The Vice Chancellor reported that the School examinations were being held at 62 centres, with 908 candidates for the Elementary and 205 for the higher examinations. It was resolved to offer for competition 20 Bursaries of £10 at the Elementary Examination and 6 of £15 at the Higher Examination, the conditions of tenure to be those already adopted, and the awards to be made by the Executive Officers of the University. It was further resolved, in connection with the Elementary Examination to ask the Examiners in Handwriting to bring up a special report on this subject, and the Moderators to report on the writing and general style of the papers sent in by Candidates.

The Registrar was authorized to pay a fee of £2 to each Commissioner at the Elementary Exam<sup>n</sup>, and £3 to each Commissioner at the Higher Examination: but no fee is to be paid to Commissioners at centres beyond the borders of the Colony.

Resolved that the School Elementary Examination in 1888 shall begin on the 21<sup>st</sup> and the Higher Examination on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of March.

A., of King William's Town, requesting to be allowed to enter as a candidate for the Law Certificate Examination on the ground that he has been admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Arts in this University and should therefore be considered to have passed the Matriculation Examination as required by Sect. 19 of the Univ<sup>er</sup>. Incorporation Act. M<sup>r</sup>. Wakefield further submitted that, in the event of this request being refused, he would apply for relief to the Supreme Court. The Council resolved that under the prohibition contained in the words of Sect. 19 - "no person shall be admitted to be a candidate... who shall not have passed the matriculation Examination in the said University" - it cannot admit M<sup>r</sup>. Wakefield as a Candidate without his matriculating in the University, and the Registrar was instructed to explain to M<sup>r</sup>. Wakefield the Council's regret that it cannot accede to his request.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the S. A. College Council, stating that the Rev. A. J. Snygler will vacate his seat as Member of the Col. lege Council on the 31<sup>st</sup> inst., through effluxion of time, and that the filling up of the vacancy thus arising will rest with the University Council. Dr. Hahn proposed that Sir Thomas Stanger be appointed in the room of M<sup>r</sup>. Snygler. Dr. Van der Merwe moved as an amendment that M<sup>r</sup>. Snygler be reappointed. The amendment was put from the Chair and lost. Dr. Hahn's motion was then put and adopted.

A letter was read from M<sup>r</sup>. L. E. Benjamin, Scholar of St. Peter's College, Cambridge, requesting that his tenure of the Maynard Scholarship might be extended to three years. The application was accompanied by a re-

On the motion of the Vice Chancellor it was ordered to amend the Regulations for the nomination and appointment of examiners, as follows: - That a special meeting for the appointment of examiners shall be held fourteen days after the meeting for the nomination of examiners.

The Vice Chancellor stated that his term of office would expire on the 31<sup>st</sup> of July, and that a Vice Chancellor would have to be elected at the next ordinary meeting, for the two years beginning 1<sup>st</sup> of August next.

The Vice Chancellor moved that all candidates for University examinations should be required to pay an additional fee each time that their names are registered for examination and that By-Law 9 A (Calendar p. LXV.) be altered accordingly. The motion was adopted, the fees on re-registration to be as follows: -

Candidates for Matriculation to pay 10/- each. Intermediate, 10/- each.

Candidates for all other University examinations to pay £1 each.

It was also decided to charge a fee of 5/- for the issue of a duplicate University Certificate, and 2/6 for a duplicate School Certificate.

The Registrar reported Payments since last meeting, to the amount of £944. 9. 9.

A letter was read from the Hon. Sec. of the Incorporated Law Society, stating that the Society is about to introduce a Bill into Parliament to amend the Law relating to the admission of attorneys, notaries and conveyancers, and that it is proposed to allow any ad eundem Graduate to become a candidate for the Law Certificate without previously passing the matriculation examination of this University, and to require of all persons applying for admission as Attorneys or Conveyancers that they shall have previously passed the University Law Examination. The letter further requested the Council to express an opinion on the proposed changes, and to say whether the University would be disposed to make any modification of its present Law Examination in the event of the proposed changes being accepted by the Legislature.

On the motion of the Hon. Mr. Justice Smith, it was resolved "that the University Council has no objection to the first alteration proposed (viz. to admit ad eundem graduates to the Law Certificate Examination without matriculating in this University): that the Council expresses no opinion about the desirableness of the alterations proposed to be made in the tests for the admission of attorneys, notaries and conveyancers: that in the event of any alteration being made by Parliament as suggested by the Law Society, the Council will be prepared to make such modifications in the Examination for the Certificate of Proficiency in Law and Jurisprudence as may be deemed necessary and desirable."

Resolved that arrangements be made for holding the ceremony of conferring degrees during Lord Carnarvon's visit, and that he be requested by letter to preside on that occasion as Chancellor of the University.

The Vice Chancellor stated that his term of office would expire on the 31<sup>st</sup> inst., and retired from the meeting while the Council elected the Vice Chancellor for the ensuing term of two years. The Hon. Mr. Justice Smith having been appointed to take the Chair, the Registrar submitted a message to the Council from Dr. Dale, urging reasons why the Council should elect another member to the office in preference to re-electing himself. The Council was unanimously of opinion that it would be most appropriate that during the Chancellor's expected visit the Vice-Chair should be filled by one so intimately acquainted and associated with the work of the University and resolved on the motion of Professor Walker to re-elect Dr. Dale. The Resolution was conveyed to Dr. Dale by Mr. Justice Smith and the Registrar. Dr. Dale, on receiving the Chair, acknowledged the Honour done him by the Council, and said that he would not resist the unanimous desire that he should continue in office.

(a) On the motion of M<sup>r</sup>. Justice Smith: to consider and report upon the practicability of introducing Political Economy and Constitutional History as special subjects in the University Curriculum.

(b) On the motion of D<sup>r</sup>. Van Cort: to enquire into and report upon the working of the present examinations for the B. A. degree.

(c) On the motion of Prof. MacLewan: to consider and report on the examinations in Dutch and German, as compared with that in the two other Modern Languages, with a view to secure in the first named an equivalent to the work covered by such text books as Earle's Philology of the English Language and Prætor's Historical Grammar.

(d) A memorandum by M<sup>r</sup>. Brady on Subjects for the French examinations of 1888.

Bishop Webb raised the question as to the desirableness of allowing candidates to proceed to the Higher School examinations without passing the elementary examination. No resolution was taken on the subject.

In answer to a question by Bishop Webb in reference to certain privileges which might be asked from the University of Oxford in the case of students who have passed the Intermediate Examination of this University, the Vice Chancellor stated that a communication on the subject had been received from the Committee appointed at Oxford to consider the admission to the University of Students coming from Indian and Colonial Universities, but that nothing had been definitely settled.

Bishop Webb expressed his hope that some steps would be taken towards the establishment of schools and examinations in Medicine.

Message from the Vice Chancellor.

On former occasions, at the periodical election of a Vice Chancellor, I have put before the Council my reasons, personal and other, for wishing to be released from a further term of office. The personal reasons I need not dwell upon, except to say that any diminution of the various responsible duties that devolve upon me would be very grateful to me at my time of life: but on other and general grounds I respectfully suggest that the Council would do well to follow the practice of the old Universities, and the obvious intention of the University Incorporation Act.

It seems desirable that the office should not be held by the same person for a lengthened period - certainly not for more than four successive years.

Several members of the Council would then in turn have to make themselves acquainted with the University work in all its details, as well as to watch the effect of the operations of the University Examinations throughout the Colony.

The Council would certainly derive much benefit from the wide experiences of such members and from their guidance, more particularly in extending and directing the practical Scientific training which will bear on the industries of the people.
