The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice Chancellor submitted a Report dated 24th Sept., 1888, from W. C. F. Smith, M.A., Fellow of the University, on Investigations made by him into the Composition of Some native words. It was resolved, on the motion of Professor Hahn, to refer the Report to the Secretary for Agriculture and the Head of the Forestry Department, for the favour of their remarks upon it.

The Vice Chancellor submitted a request from the Committee of the Fine Arts Association for the use of the University Hall from about the middle of November to the end of December for an exhibition of paintings. The request was granted, on the understanding that any damage is to be made good at the expense of the Association.

The Vice Chancellor reported that he had received a letter and subsequent telegram from the Rev. H. Müller, of Pannum, in reference to the case of his son, who was first in the Honours list at the recent B.A. Literatures Examination. Mr. Müller wished the Council to go into the question as to his son's claim to a Scholarship in virtue of his position at the head of the Honours list. It was resolved to inform Mr. Müller that, as the Examiners had not reported any of the Candidates as of sufficient merit for scholarships, the Council cannot now go into the matter.

The Vice Chancellor reported that, owing to a misinterpretation of the standards for the Intermediate and B.A. Examinations, it had been found necessary to issue revised lists of the Successful Candidates

grin, that the Subject of University fellowships be revisited. The Council having adopted the motion, Mr. C. A. Smith moved that the present regulations on the Subject of Fellowships be suspended, the whole matter being now under review. In answer to a question by the Registrar, it was resolved that the Regulations hitherto in force on the Subject of Fellowships be printed in the next issue of the Calendar, with an intimation that for the present the Regulations are suspended. The V. C. gave notice that he would move as follows at the next meeting:— "The Council rescinds the Regulations for Fellowships, but reserves to itself the right to assist Graduates of the University from time to time in prosecuting any special branch of study and research which the Council may approve of, provided that the applicants shall satisfy the Council of their exceptional qualifications to carry on such study and research."

An application was submitted from the Registrar for the usual monthly meet, to commence on the 5th of October. The Registrar stated that he had been invited to undertake Clerical duty at Rosinaley during the absence of the Rev. Mr. Lloyd, of the Presbyterian Church, and would be glad if the leave of absence could be extended. It was thereupon resolved, on the motion of Dr. Van Cortt, that one month's leave of absence be granted, and the V. C. authorized to extend the leave to the date of the next ordinary meeting of Council.

The Vice Chancellor moved, having previously given the required notice:— that the marks assigned to each paper in the several examinations, the standards for passing in each case, and all instructions of the Council to Examiners, be printed. Carried.

The following prospectus of marks and standards at present authorized by the Council, with suggestions and alterations recommended by the Committee of Studies, was laid on the Table. The Council decided that the marks assigned to the papers at the several examinations ^{might} require review and readjustment, and referred the whole subject of marks to the Committee of Studies, which will meet for the consideration of the matter on Saturday, the 20th of October at 10.15 A.M.

The following are the marks and standards at present authorised by the Council, with alterations suggested by the Committee of Studies. [The information which follows is at present confidential and private.]

The Vice Chancellor brought forward the motion of which notice was given at the last meeting on the Subject of Fellowships. After discussion, it was resolved that Regulations hitherto in force on the Subject be rescinded: and the Vice Chancellor gave notice that at the next meeting he would move the following Regulations:-

Fellowships.

- I. It shall be competent for the Council to elect to a Fellowship any Graduate who shall after Examination have obtained the degree of M. A. in this University, and who shall be found to have exceptional qualifications for the prosecution of study and research in such departments of Literature or Science as may be prescribed or approved of by the Council.
- II. The emoluments attached to a Fellowship shall be fixed from time to time by the Council, but shall not exceed £200 per annum.
- III. A Fellowship may be held for a term, approved by the Council, not exceeding three years.
- IV. Only one Fellowship shall be chargeable to the funds of the University at one time.
- V. The emoluments of a Fellowship shall not be drawn concurrently with those of any Studentship or Scholarship.
- VI. The Council shall satisfy itself from time to time that the Fellow is actually and bona fide prosecuting his studies and research in South Africa in such a manner as is likely to produce useful results.

The Vice Chancellor brought up the Report of the Committee of Studies on the Subject of marks at the several Examinations. The Report is contained in the following Resolutions adopted by the Committee:-(a) That it is not desirable to make any changes in the marks and standards for the several Examinations in 1889. (b) The Committee requests leave to sit again for the purpose of reviewing the whole Subject of Examinations with reference to marks and standards for passing. The Council adopted the following Rules in reference to the M. A. and Intermediate Examinations:- In the M. A. Examination the standards for passing are left to the discretion of the Examiners, who are to be guided by precedent, or in case of differing therefrom, to report specially their reasons for so doing to the Council. In the Intermediate Examination in Arts the standard for pass and for Honours shall be the same for all Candidates, viz, 683 marks and 1025 marks respectively. The request of the Committee of Studies to sit again was ordered to stand over till a future meeting.

(d) Any person who shall have been admitted to the Second Public Examination under the provisions of clause (c) shall be entitled to supplicate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts so soon as he shall have passed the Second Public Examination and shall have kept statutable residence for eight Terms, provided that he has obtained Honours either in the First or in the Second Public Examination.

5. The Delegates of Local Examinations shall make regulations respecting—

(1) The registration of persons who have been matriculated under the provisions of this section.

(2) The granting of certificates to such persons showing that they have satisfied the special conditions under which they are admitted to the University Examinations, or under which they are entitled to supplicate for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

(3) The sending in of names to the Proctor and the producing of certificates to the Proctor by or on behalf of persons who avail themselves of the privileges granted by this section.

6. No person already matriculated in this University shall be admitted as a Candidate in the First Public Examination under the provisions of this Statute.

7. Any University admitted to the privileges conferred by this section of the Statutes may at any time renounce such privileges, and this University may at any time withdraw the same by a vote of Convocation.

The Vice Chancellor's Memorandum on the revision of the University Lists.

"Certain candidates who had failed in the examinations obtained from the Registrar, in the usual course, the marks assigned to them by the Examiners, and represented to the Vice Chancellor that according to the Standards which they believe to be in force they ought to have been placed on the Pass list.

"The Vice Chancellor, being bound by law to accept the decisions of the Examiners as final, had no authority to cause a revision of the lists, but conferred with the Moderators of the Committees on the subject of the Standards acted upon by them, and found that the Examiners in Literature had misinterpreted the intention of the Council as to the Standards or Tests for the Intermediate and B. A. examinations, and were acting upon the former tests which had been actually or informally set aside by the Council. The Moderators invited the Vice Chancellor to rule as to the interpretation of the Council's intentions, and on his ruling they revised the lists accordingly.

"The error consisted not in the number of marks assigned to the Candidates, but in the application of higher tests than those now authorized."

The ruling of the Vice Chancellor was that -

(A) The Standard for Pass at the Intermediate examination is one third of the marks possible to be obtained on the eight papers taken by the Candidate: and for Honours one half of the marks possible to be obtained on the eight papers.

(B) The Standard for Pass at B. A. is one-third, as in other examinations.

On the motion of Canon Ogilvie it was resolved that this memorandum be entered on the minutes of Council: and the following Instruction to the Vice Chancellor, moved from the Chair, was adopted and ordered to be recorded: -

The Vice Chancellor, on receiving the results of any examination from the Committees of Examiners, shall cause the same to be submitted to Scrutiny by two persons, to be appointed by him, with the view of ascertaining that the results are numerically correct, and that the Standards prescribed by the Council for that examination have been observed: and no lists shall be posted until the Scrutineers have given their certificate to that effect.

As a rule, the Registrar will ex officio be one of the Scrutineers: but when the Registrar is an Examiner, another Scrutineer shall be appointed in his place by the Vice Chancellor.

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13. The Council has been for some time in correspondence with the authorities of the University of Oxford on the subject of the privileges granted to students from Colonial and Indian Universities on their entering on residence at Oxford. The Council has read the satisfaction of reporting that in a Convocation of the University of Oxford held in November last the following decree was unanimously approved by the House :-

"That the University of the Cape of Good Hope be admitted to the privileges of a Colonial University under the provisions of Stat. Tit. ii Sect. vii on Colonial and Indian Universities."

The authorities of the Edinburgh University have also decided to accept the B. A. certificate of this University as sufficient qualification for the degrees of Bachelor of Divinity, Bachelor of Laws, and Doctor of Science in the department of Philosophy in the University of Edinburgh.

14. The Council desires to acknowledge the liberality of the Legislature in restoring the grant to the University to its former amount, and in placing at the disposal of the Council the sum of £250 for Bursaries. The Council has the satisfaction of knowing that these Bursaries have been of material assistance to deserving students, who by this pecuniary help have been enabled to pursue their studies and complete the University Curriculum.

The increased grant, however, has proved insufficient to meet the expenditure of the University: for while all the Trust Funds administered by the Council show a Balance in their favour, the corresponding Balance on the General Fund of the University, which on the 1st of January, 1888, was £78.0.2, now stands at £377.9.4.

The Council is therefore compelled to bring to the notice of the Government that it will not be possible, without a larger grant, to meet the obligations and to carry on the increasing work of the University.

II. The Committee reports as follows on the matters referred to it by the Council :-

- (a.) The Committee approves of Mr. Whitton's motion : That the names of candidates who are above 16 and 18 years of age, respectively, in the School Elementary and School Higher Examinations, be distinguished in the published lists from the names of those who are eligible for Bursaries or Prizes. * *
- (b.) With reference to Professor Ritchie's notice of motion :- "That in the classical papers at the Matriculation Examination not more than one-fifth of the marks shall be given for translation from the set books, and that in the Intermediate and B.A. Examinations less importance than now should be attached to translations from the set books," * *

** to take effect

the Committee approves of the general principle of the motion, and recommends that the Classical Papers be so framed and marked as to require, as a condition of passing, more than a simple translation of passages from the set authors. Further, the Committee considers that candidates at the B.A. Classical Examination should be required to pass in each Miscellaneous Paper as well as in each Paper on set authors.

- (c.) B.A. Lit. Exam. : On the subject of more accurate definition of the range of subjects at the Honours Examination, the Committee recommends that a foot-note or paragraph be introduced to the following effect :-

"In the B.A. Honours Papers in English and Modern Languages, at least one half of the work will be based upon the set subjects of the year. * *

The Subject of Philology will include :

- (a). Theories of Language and its Origin.
- (b). Physiology of Speech.
- (c). Morphology.
- (d). Classification of Languages.
- (e). Theories of the Origin of Language.

The Paper in Philology will be on general principles, and their application to the Classical Languages ; and the special application of these principles to the various modern Languages will be dealt with in the Papers on those languages."

- * * * (d.) Matriculation : The Committee recommends that candidates who do not take Greek at Matriculation should be allowed to take both Chemistry and Dynamics ; and that the number of marks in modern language should be raised from 150 to 200

* * * The first section of this Paragraph to take effect in 1890: the second (increase of mod. Lang. marks) to take effect in 1889.

The Vice Chanceller having signified his intention to vacate office on the 30th inst., in order that the New Vice Chanceller might enter upon his duties as nearly as possible at the commencement of the Academic year, the Council proceeded to the election of a Vice Chanceller to hold office from the 1st of October. Dr. Van Cordt moved, and Mr. Philip Steadman that Dr Dale be re-elected to the office. Mr. Whitton, seconded by Dr. Hahn, moved as an amendment that Dr Dale be requested to withdraw his resignation. Dr. Van Cordt having withdrawn his motion in favour of the amendment, Dr Dale agreed to accede to the unanimous desire of the Council and to remain in office to the 31st of July next.

The Vice Chanceller moved, in accordance with notice previously

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The application was supported by certificates from two of the Göttingen Professors, bearing testimony to the diligence and success with which M. Poin is pursuing his studies in Classical Literature. Resolved that as the Maquard fund will not admit of his tenure of the Scholarship for an additional year, M. Poin be allowed to retain the Scholarship for nine months in addition to the original period of two years.

On the motion of Mr. Justice Buchanan, Mr. F. S. Lewis, M. A. Queen's Coll., Oxford, was admitted to the Seniors degree in this University.

A list of Payments made since last meeting was submitted by the Registrar: total amount £918.10.0

The Vice Chanceller reported that several letters had reached him from teachers and others interested in the School Examinations, complaining that the Candidates could not hear some portions of the passage given for Dictation. Resolved that these letters, and any similar representations which may still be received, be sent on to the Examiner in English and Dictation, for his information and guidance.

The Registrar reported that the School Examinations had been conducted at the times fixed by the Council, at 80 different centres in this Colony, Orange Free State, Transvaal Republic, and British Bechuanaland. For the Elementary examination 924 Candidates have been registered: for the Higher Examination, 197.

Resolved that the same number of Bursaries be offered in connection with these Examinations as in 1888, viz, 6 of £15 each at the Higher, and 20 of £10 each at the Elementary Examinations.

Resolved that the Vice Chanceller be requested to prepare an address to H. E. Sir Hercules Robinson on the occasion of his approaching departure from the Colony - the address to be signed by the Vice Chanceller and Members of Council.

The following Recommendations from the Committee of Studies were submitted:—

SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS.—To give the Dictation and English paper at the Elementary Examination 300 instead of 250 marks.
To give the History and Physical Geography papers only two-thirds of the marks assigned to the other papers in the Higher Examination.
To hold the School Examinations early in June, if practicable.

MATRICULATION.—To add to the History paper "descriptive geography, as connected with the period of History selected."
To allow Candidates for Matriculation to come up at the age of 15.

INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION.—To expunge the words "Dutch-French or German" in the note on p. lxxix (Calendar 1888-9) and to add to the Intermediate regulations an intimation that the examinations in French, Dutch and German will be confined in each case to the language, and will not include Literature.

B. A. EXAMINATION.—To reduce the marks in the modern language pass paper from 300 to 200, and to raise the marks in the English pass papers from 300 to 400.

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lot in Science, stated that Mr. Thomson had furnished a memorandum on the Subject, which had been submitted to the Mathematical Examiners. These Examiners were unanimous in their opinion that the questions do not in any case go beyond the prescribed range. Professor Thomson therefore gave notice of motion to add to the last paragraph on p. LXXIX (Col. 1888-9) the words "Excluding questions on the associated circles of the triangle".

The Vice Chancellor moved the Regulations standing in his name on the Subject of Fellowships (see minutes of 24 Nov. 1888). Regulations I to V inclusive were adopted as proposed by the Vice Chancellor; and No. VI was adopted in the following form: "Every Fellow shall satisfy the Council, from time to time, that he is actually and *bonâ fide* prosecuting his studies and research at a place approved by the Council, and in such a manner as is likely to produce useful results." The amended regulations to be forwarded to the Government for approval and publication.

On the motion of Dr. Van Cort, Mr. Bodkin was appointed a member of the Committee of Studies.

A Communication from the Principals and Teachers of Schools in Cape Town and its neighbourhood, on the Subject of the School Examinations, was read by the Registrar. The Subscribers express their opinion that the Examinations as at present constituted fairly meet the object for which they were established, and trust that any proposal to give certain Subjects more marks than other Subjects would not be adopted, if the effect yet should be to give great preponderance to any Subject or Class of Subjects. They also consider the present time of holding the Examinations an inconvenient one. The Registrar was directed to acknowledge the receipt of the Communication, and to express to the Subscribers the Council's hope that the slight changes now introduced will meet with general approval.

Oxford.*

ON COLONIAL AND INDIAN UNIVERSITIES.

1. ANY University situated in any part of the British Dominions other than the United Kingdom may apply to this University to be admitted to the privileges of this section of the Statutes.

2. The application shall be addressed to the Vice-Chancellor, who shall report the same to the Hebdomadal Council.

3. The Hebdomadal Council, after considering such application and after making such enquiry as it shall deem necessary, shall, if it think fit, propose to Convocation that the University so applying shall be admitted to the privileges of this section of the Statutes.

4. (a) Any person who shall have pursued during two full years a course of study prescribed by a University which has been admitted to the privileges of this section, and shall have passed all the Examinations connected with the course, may, although he shall not have been matriculated, or have satisfied the Masters of the Schools at Responsions or in an Additional Subject, be admitted to any one or more of the following Examinations, viz. any part of the First Public Examination, any Preliminary Examination in the Second Public Examination.

(b) Any such person who shall either have passed the Examination of Candidates not seeking Honours in the First Public Examination, or have obtained Honours in Greek and Latin Literature or in Mathematics in that Examination, or have passed a Preliminary Examination in the Second Public Examination, shall, if he is matriculated not later than the Michaelmas Term next following, be entitled to the following privilege, viz. the Term in which he is matriculated shall be reckoned, for the purposes of any provisions respecting the standing of members of the University, as the fifth Term from his matriculation.

(c) Any person who shall have been matriculated under the provisions of clause (b) may be admitted to any part of the Second Public Examination, if he has passed Responsions, or one of the Examinations which under *Statt. Tit. VI. Sect. 1.* give exemption from Responsions, or has passed the Examination of Candidates not seeking Honours in the First Public Examination, or has obtained Honours in Greek and Latin Literature in that Examination, or has passed a Preliminary Examination having satisfied the Examiners in a Greek book, and if he has also passed the

9. The annual ceremony of conferring degrees was held in the Public Library on the 31st of September, when the Vice-Chancellor, in the presence of the Council and the Convocation of the University, conferred degrees upon those whom the Council had declared to be qualified to receive them, and addressed the Congregation on the work of the Academic year.

10. The present holder of the University Fellowship has been engaged during the year in investigations on Colonial food-plants and on native woods. The Council proposes to reconsider the question of Fellowships, and trusts that it will be able to attract students, by judicious encouragement and pecuniary assistance, to the important subject of original research in matters bearing upon public interest. In the mean time the Regulations hitherto in force on the subject of the University Fellowship have been suspended.

11. During his recent visit to South Africa, Sir Donald Currie forwarded to the V. C. the sum of £100, to be used as the V. C. may consider most expedient for the advancement of learning. The amount has been divided into four prizes of £25 each, to be given to students recommended by the Authorities of the following Institutions: S. A. Coll.; Vict. Coll., Stellenbosch; Dic. Coll. Rondebosch; and S. Andr. Coll., Grahamstown. The students thus recommended are R. N. Potze, S. A. Coll.; N. J. Brummer and Miss F. Swerney, Vict. Coll. Stellenbosch; A. Shoyer, Dic. Coll. Rondebosch; and H. A. Moffat, S. Andr. Coll. Grahamstown.

The Right Hon. the Earl of Carnarvon, Chancellor of the Univ., has also signified his wish to give a prize of £20 in books to the best Classical Scholar at the next B. A. Examination.

12. Mr. Arthur Dwyer, nominated by the Council in 1887 to a Military Cadetship, has during the year joined the Royal Military College at Sandhurst and passed the final examination for a Commission; and Mr. Marmont R. W. Nightingale, nominated to a Cadetship in July last, will join the Military College early in the present year.

AB.CD, to denote the rectangle contained by the straight lines AB and CD.

AB², to denote the square described on the straight line AB.

∴ to denote therefore.

AB : CD = EF : GH to denote the equality of the two ratios AB to CD and EF to GH.

EUCLID'S PROOFS.

The actual proofs of propositions as given in Euclid will not be required, but no proof of any proposition occurring in Euclid will be admitted in which use is made of any proposition which in Euclid's order occurs subsequently.

INSTRUCTIONS TO EXAMINERS.—To add the following:— No marks under 15 per cent. of the aggregate are to be counted in the optional papers at any examination.

The recommendations were considered separately, and the Council decided as follows:—

School Examinations. To give the English and Dictation paper at the Elementary Examination 300 instead of 250 marks. The marks in History and in Physical Geography at the Higher Examination &c in each case 200, and each of the other papers to be valued at 300 marks. The School Examinations &c held about the beginning of June.

Matriculation. To add to the History paper "Descriptive Geography, as connected with the period of history selected. To add to Par. 2 on p. LXXIX (Cal. 1888-9) the following:—"In exceptional cases the Council reserves to itself the right of admitting to the Matriculation Examination candidates who have not reached the age of sixteen years."

Intermediate Examination. To expunge the note on p. LXXIX (Cal. 1888-9) and to add to the Intermediate Regulations a notice that the Examinations in French, Dutch and German will be confined in each case to the Language, and will not include Literature.

The recommendations about marks in English and Dutch at the B. A. Examination to stand over for further consideration.

The recommendations about Geometrical Abbreviations and Symbols were accepted as printed, with the addition of ∴ to denote because

The recommendation about Euclid's Proofs was accepted as printed.

The recommendation under "Instructions to Examiners" was ordered to stand over for further consideration, Mr. Abercrombie Smith giving notice of the following emblem on the subject:—"Should the marks gained by a candidate in any paper fall short of five per cent of the maximum marks assigned to that paper, such marks shall not be counted."

**THE UNIVERSITY COUNCIL
AND THE GOVERNOR.**

PRESENTATION OF AN ADDRESS.

On Saturday last, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, Dr. Langham Dale, with the Rev. Dr. Cameron, the Registrar, waited upon the Governor, and presented the following address:—

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir HERCULES G. R. ROBINSON, P.C., G.C.M.G.
May it please Your Excellency,—We, the Vice-Chancellor and Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, desire to express the high sense that we entertain of your unflinching interest in the University and the Colleges connected with it. Your Excellency has missed no opportunity of being present at our public ceremonies; and the words of wise experience that you have addressed to the students from time to time are fresh and fruitful. We sincerely thank you for your cordial sympathy with the growing work of the University; and we add our heartfelt wishes for the health and happiness of Your Excellency and Lady Robinson. It will be indeed a source of gratification to us all if we are permitted to welcome your return to resume the high and important duties of Governor of this colony.

His Excellency replied as follows:—Mr. Vice-Chancellor and Members of the University Council.—I have watched with much interest the proceedings of the University and the Colleges during my residence in this colony, and it is gratifying to notice that South African students generally take an honourable place in the home Universities. I was pleased to see that the first candidate nominated by the University to the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, passed a creditable examination, besides getting a special certificate for riding.
