UNIVERSITY COUNCIL.

An ordinary meeting of the Council was held on Saturday. Present: Dr. Beck, Mr. Bodkin, Rev. Prof. Foot, Dr. Hahn, Rev. Dr. Kolbe, Rev. Prof. Marais, Prof. MacOwan, Rev. Canon Ogilvie, Dr. Van Oort, Hon. C.A. Smith, Hon. Mr Justice Smith, Prof. Thomson, Rev Prof. Walker, Mr. Whiston.

In the absence of the Vice-Chancellor, the Hon Mr Justice Smith was called to take the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Registrar reported that the amended regulations for fellowships had been submitted to, and approved by, His Excellency the Governor.

The Registrar read the address prepared by the Vice-Chancellor to the Governor on the occasion of his recent departure from the colony, and His Excellency's reply. Ordered that both be recorded.

On the motion of Prof. Thomson, resolved that in the last paragraph of regulations for the trigonometry subject at the intermediate examination the following words be added: "Excluding questions connected with the radii of the circumscribed, inscribed and escribed circles."

Mr. N. Porter, M.A., Cambridge, admitted as *audem gradum*.

Registrar reported the death of Mr. Advocate Frames, B.A., B. Sc., one of the University examiners in science. Resolved to put on record the Council's regret at his early death, and the loss of his faithful and valuable services to the University.

THE VICE-CHANCELLOR'S MESSAGE TO THE COUNCIL.

The Vice-Chancellor, whose period of office will expire on 31st inst., desires to convey to the Council his sincere thanks for the honour done to him by re-election to office on several occasions, and for the confidence thus shown in the discharge of the functions committed to him.

Failing health renders it absolutely necessary for him to seek release from the responsibilities of the Vice-Chancellor's office; and there are obvious and weighty reasons for the selection of a successor who may bring freshness and vigour into the direction of the affairs of the University.

An intimation, at the last meeting of Council, that the present Vice-Chancellor might be invited to continue his services, induces him to signify early his decision, and the Council will not, he trusts, consider this as ungracious or ungrateful, after his long term of service.

The Council felt that it would not be right, with this message before it, to request the retiring Vice-Chancellor to enter upon a new term of office, while it would be undesirable that a new Vice-Chancellor should have to preside at the annual ceremony of conferring degrees. At the request of the Council Dr. Van Cordt and Dr. Beck waited upon Sir Langham Dale, and ascertained from him that he would be willing to continue in office until the Degree Day proceedings were over. asking the Council to extend the period of additional tenure of the Maynard Scholarship from nine to twelve months. The application was granted.

An application was submitted from M. E. G. Little, asking that his tenure of the Porter Studentship may be extended to a fourth year. The application was accompanied by a very favourable testimonial from the Dean of the Medical School of St. George's Hospital, London, where M. Little is a student. Dr. Beck proposed that an additional sum of £100 be given to M. Little, to enable him to complete his medical studies. Professor MacLewin considered that the friends of the applicant should assist him, and moved as an amendment that the sum of £50 be granted by the Council. On proceeding to the vote the amendment was lost and the original motion was carried.

M. L. Marguard was appointed Auditor of the University accounts for the year.

An application for an ad eundem degree was submitted from M. Julius Gordon, M. A., Edinburgh. As no member of Council present was acquainted with M. Gordon, the application was ordered to stand over for further information.

An application for the degree of Master of Arts was submitted from Dr. Franz Lange, Ph. D. of the University of Jena. Dr. Lange is resident in England. Proposed that Dr. Lange be informed that it is not the practice of the Council to admit persons who are not resident in and have no connection with South Africa to degrees in the University.

The Registrar submitted a list of Payments made since last meeting, amounting to £618. 4. 11.

Prof. Thomson moved, in accordance with previous notice, that the following clause be added to the note on Geometrical Conics Calendar 1888-9. p. LXXXVI):— "Proofs by the method of projection are admissible." The motion was carried.

The following is the Report of the University Council for the year 1889:—

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1889.

2. The vacancy in the Council caused by the death of the Rev. W. B. Philip, B. A., alluded to in the last Report, was filled by the Convocation of the University, which elected A. A. Botkin Esq., M. A., to the vacant seat. The only vacancy which has arisen during the year was caused by the resignation of the Hon. J. Tuckhope Esq., M. L. A. The government appointed the Most Reverend Bishop Jones, D. D., to fill the vacant seat.

3. The Hon. Mr. Justice Smith has been reappointed by the Council to a seat on the Council of the South African College.

4. The School Examinations conducted by the University were held in March, at 80 different centres in this Colony, the Orange Free State, the Transvaal Republic, and British Bechuanaland. At the Elementary Examination 915 candidates presented themselves, of whom 610 passed. At the higher examination 193 candidates were examined, of whom 162 passed. 12. The annual ceremony of conferring degrees was held in the Public Library in September, when the Vice-Chancellor, in the presence of the Council and the Convocation of the University conferred degrees upon those whom the Council had declared to be qualified to receive them. The Council took this opportunity of presenting an address to the retiring Vice-Chancellor, Sir Langham Dale, congratulating him on the honour of Knighthood conferred upon him by Her Majesty the Queen, and recognizing his important services to the cause of education in the Colony. The Vice-Chancellor thanked the Council for the address, and proceeded to review the work of the Academical year.

13. The Council desires to acknowledge the liberality of the Legislature in increasing the grant to the University, and in voting a sum of money for Bursaries to poor students. With the means thus put at its disposal the Council believes that it will be able to carry out with greater efficiency and success the important duties with which it is charged.

Balfour Stewart's *Lessons in Elementary Physics* will sufficiently indicate the range of the Examination.

The same range as for Matriculation, but Candidates will be expected to show a more exact knowledge of the processes required for the determination of physical constants—such as, *Specific Heat; Thermal and Electric Conductivity of a substance; Velocity of Light, &c.*

- (II) That Arithmetic be removed from the subjects prescribed for the Intermediate Examination.
(III) That Candidates be allowed to take two science subjects at the Intermediate Examination.

With reference to Sir Langham Dale's motion, the mover explained that his object was simply to assert the principle that if permission is given to substitute any Physical Science at all for Greek at Matriculation, such permission should be extended to all the Physical Science Subjects; but that he himself was not in favour of allowing any Subject to be taken as a compensation by Candidates who do not take Greek. Letters on the subject were read from the Senate of the South African College, and the Principals and Lecturers of the

and carried unanimously, that the Hon. Mr Justice Smith be elected Vice-Chancellor, to hold Office from the 1st of October next, Sir Lingham Dale continuing in Office till that date.

1. Your Committee met on Tuesday, the 21st of January. There were present The Vice Chancellor and the Registrar.

2. Your Committee is of opinion that in any future amendment of the Act the following changes should be introduced:-

(a) Section V, line 2: omit the words "for the space of six months", and substitute for them the words "for more than two months without the leave of the Council.

(b) Section VI to read as follows:- "The Said Council shall, at the first meeting thereof, elect from amongst its own members the Vice Chancellor of the University, who shall in the absence of the Chancellor perform all duties and functions appertaining to the office of Chancellor, and who shall, when present, preside at all meetings of the Council: but it shall be competent for the Council to elect from time to time from amongst its own members a Pro Vice Chancellor, who shall in the unavoidable absence of the Vice Chancellor perform all duties and functions pertaining to the Vice Chancellor's office: Provided that any meeting of such Council at which neither the Vice Chancellor nor the Pro Vice Chancellor is present may elect its own Chairman."
