of their opinion.

An application from the Rev. Mr. Jovst, of East London, to be allowed to enter his Son for Matriculation through eight months under 16 years of age was submitted. The applicant stated that he wished three of his Sons to enter together for the examinations, and then proceed together to Edinburgh University. The application was refused.

The usual recess, from 15<sup>th</sup> December to 15<sup>th</sup> January was authorized.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the L. S. Taalbond, offering from the Hoofdstemmer of that body three prizes of £6, £5 and £4 respectively to the Candidates who gain the first three places at the Matriculation and School Highest examinations in 1891. Resolved to accept the offer with thanks, the names of the Candidates who gain these positions to be reported to the Secretary of the Taalbond.

Sir Langham Dale calling attention to the fact that the appointment of the French and German examiners for 1891 seemed not to be in accordance with the Section of the Univ. Incorporation Act which provides that the Council shall avoid, as much as may be, appointing examiners who have been teachers of any of the Candidates - inasmuch as the French examiner, Father Daignault, is the Principal of St Aidan's College, Grahamstown, and Dr. Helms, the German examiner, is a Professor in the South African College, from both of which institutions there are usually Candidates. Dr. Holbo explained that Father Daignault's appointment is merely a temporary one, and that he does not teach at St Aidan's College: and Professor Ritchie stated that no pupils from the South African College would bring up German at any of the examinations of 1891.

Dr. Holbo stated that there was a difference of opinion between the examiners in Philosophy as to the joint authorship of some of the papers and the distribution of the several subjects among the papers, and asked for an instruction from the Council on the subject. Resolved that the matter is one to be decided by the Moderator of the Committee of Examiners in Literature.

The following are the Resolutions of the Taal Congress referred to above: -

1. (a) This Congress is of opinion that the time has arrived, especially with a view to those who prepare for the Civil Service examinations, that the Dutch Language should be added as a compulsory subject to the elementary school examination: but if owing to the present arrangement of our schools insurmountable difficulties should present themselves, the marks shall be dealt with as those given for Greek at the Matriculation examination, that is to say, that although Dutch at the said examination be not made compulsory, the candidate who shall not submit to an examination in Dutch exposes himself to the risk of being his name so much the lower on the list of passing candidates.
- (b) The examination in Dutch shall include an easy Dictation,

The Vice-Chancellor reported the resignation of Professor Hahn as Examiner in German, and the appointment by the Vice-Chancellor, Subject to the confirmation by the Council, of the Rev. C. H. Hahn Jr. to the office, as the latter was the only other person nominated as German Examiner. Professor Hahn's letter of resignation was read, to the effect that when he accepted the appointment there was no student in the S. A. Coll. who intended taking German in any of the examinations of 1891, but that subsequently a student had joined the College who would present himself for examination in German and who is at present under Professor Hahn's tuition in Chemistry. He therefore tendered his resignation, as he had been informed that according to the Act he is disqualified as Examiner. The Registrar read a letter which accompanied the resignation, in which Professor Hahn pointed out that for several years the rule under which he is now disqualified has not been observed, and expressing his opinion that the rule, which he considers to be a good one, if it is to be observed, should always be observed. After discussion, the action of the Vice-Chancellor in the matter was confirmed.

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"With reference to the admission of ad eundem graduates to the examinations for the degree of LL.B. in this University, it was decided that the ad eundem degree of M.A. should be taken in all cases to include that of B.A."

He pointed out that the Incorporation act requires candidates for the LL. B. examinations to have obtained or been admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Arts in this University, and expressed his opinion that a candidate could not be admitted to the LL. B. examinations unless he had been distinctly and formally admitted as a Bachelor of Arts. Discussion ensued, but no resolution was taken on the subject.

Professor Foot gave notice that he would move at the next meeting to reduce the amount of the English work prescribed for the B. A. Lit. examination of 1892.

The Vice Chancellor called the attention of the Council to the resolution requiring all cheques to be countersigned by the Vice Chancellor or Pro-Vice Chancellor, and asked whether the Council desired the regulation to remain in force. Resolved that it remain in force.

A letter was submitted from D. James Key, an unsuccessful Candidate at the Preliminary L.L. B. Examination of this year, stating that questions had been asked in some of the examination papers which could not be answered from the books prescribed for the examination, and asking the Council "to allow the Law Examinations of this Academic year to be prolonged (Cal. p. ci. l. 9) to such a date and such an extent as would enable those rejected under most serious disadvantage to re-examine their Candidates without it: to enlarge the powers conferred to your Examiners under Regulation A 6) so as to equal in your view but not surpass the injury sustained: or otherwise to remedy the matter at your good pleasure." The Vice Chancellor reported that on receipt of this letter, and of a further communication from D. Key which had been sent on to him from the Education Office, on the same subject, he had referred the matter to the Moderator of the Law Committee of Examiners, who stated in reply that

In one of the questions in the Roman Law paper he asked for a translation and explanation of a certain passage in the Institutes, as well as for a statement of the Dutch Law on the subject: and that those Candidates who gave the proper explanation and translation received full marks although unable to state the Dutch Law: and that another question related almost entirely to the Dutch Law, and the marks assigned to this question were distributed over the other questions: and that the same course was adopted by his father in regard to a question inadvertently asked by him in one of his papers. The moderator further stated that if D. Key had received full marks for the questions objected to by him he would still have failed.

Resolved to inform D. Key that his letter has been submitted to the Moderator of the Committee of Examiners in Law, and that full allowance was made to Candidates in respect of any questions which do not strictly fall within the limits prescribed for the examinations: and that if he had received full marks for the questions objected to by him he would still have failed.

The Registrar laid on the Table the results of the examinations of the year, the Vice Chancellor reporting that the results had been examined by scrutineers appointed by him and certified to be numerically correct and in accordance with the prescribed standards. The results are as follows:—

this question, which in the judgment of this Council should be answered so as to satisfy the reasonable expectations of those who wish to encourage the study of that language, and at the same time secure for all candidates that ample and impartial justice without which there can be no public confidence.

13. During the absence of the Registrar on leave for six months, the duties of his office were efficiently performed by Mr. J. H. Brady, M.A.

14. The usual annual ceremony of conferring degrees was held in the Public Library, courteously put at the disposal of the Council by the Library authorities, in September, when the Vice-Chancellor, in the presence of the Council and the Convocation of the University, conferred degrees upon the candidates whom the Council had declared qualified to receive them, and addressed the congregation on the work of the University.

10. The J. B. Ebdon Prize of £50 has been awarded to Mr. D. P. de Bruyn, B.A., LL.B., for an Essay On the advantages, or otherwise, of a Customs Union, whether general or partial, for the different Colonies and States of South Africa. The thanks of the Council are due to Messrs Board and Wicnes, the judges, and Professor Foot, the referee, for their services in awarding the Prize.

11. The Council regrets to say that the amount of the Student Scholarship Endowment Fund, £4750, with the interest for a year, was lodged in the Cape of Good Hope Bank when it stopped payment. Most of the money will probably be recovered in the course of the liquidation of the Bank: but it is inevitable that the value of the Scholarship will be considerably reduced. There was also a floating balance in the Bank of £380. 10. 5, part of which will probably be lost. The Council, however, notwithstanding these estimated losses, is able to report that the financial position of the University is a sound one, owing to the liberal support of the Legislature, and the augmented revenue derived from the fees of candidates for Examinations.

12. The present occasion is the last at which this Council will have the honour of making its Report to His Excellency, as the Council will expire by Effluxion of time on the 31<sup>st</sup> of July next. During its term of office the Council has not considered it desirable to make any important changes in the system of examinations, being strongly of opinion that frequent change has a tendency to disturb public confidence, and that measures which have been adopted after long and careful deliberation should not be set aside until lengthened experience and a general consensus of educated opinion have shown the necessity of change. The Council has therefore been content to watch, closely and carefully, the working of the present regulations, and does not think that the time for any fundamental change has arrived. It will be for the new Council to decide whether the present regulations can with advantage be modified. Recent discussions as to the place of Dutch in the examinations seem to indicate that the Council will have to deal with this question, which in the judgment of this Council should be answered so as to satisfy the reasonable

Sir,

I am directed by the Committee of the South African Teachers' Association to inform you that the recommendations forwarded by the Synod of the Dutch Reformed Church, contained in yours of the 1st December ult., have been carefully considered and the following resolutions unanimously adopted :

The Committee begs to inform the Council that at the late Conference of Teachers, held at Port Elizabeth in July last, the subject of Dutch was discussed, and the following resolution was passed :—“ That this Conference fully recognizes the claim which the Dutch-speaking part of the community has, when it demands that the teaching of Dutch should receive prominence in the schools of the country ; and this Conference is of opinion that such prominence is being given to the study of the Dutch language in schools where the demand is made.”

At the same time a proposal that Dutch should be one of the subjects for the School Elementary Examination was negatived.

This Committee however, is of opinion, that if a general desire exists for an Examination in Dutch at that stage, the Dutch language might be added to the subjects prescribed for the School Elementary Examination ; in such a manner, however, that no Candidate shall be compelled to take that language, and that Candidates taking it shall be classified in a separate list.

With regard to proposal (b) the Committee understands that the values assigned to the Dutch and English papers in the School Higher Examination are equal ; to the second clause “ and that these values should exceed those assigned to other languages,” the Committee does not agree.

In regard to proposal (c) the Committee would recommend that in the Matriculation Examination the modern language papers, (English, Dutch, French, German, Kafir, and Sesuto) should have equal values.

The Committee agrees to proposals (d) and (e)

(3) Whether the Council would undertake to appoint men to supervise the syllabuses of the lectures and to examine the students—all fees being paid from the funds of the movement?

Other points will doubtless suggest themselves during discussion, so I content myself with thus opening the matter.

4. This Congress is of opinion that in all the lower schools elementary instruction should be given in and by means of the language of the majority of the local population, to which instruction in the second language may soon be added. Where it is deemed advisable, in farmers' schools, to give instruction only in and by means of Dutch, these schools should have the same claim to Government aid as the schools in which English is exclusively taught.
5. This Congress is of opinion, that the teaching, in this Colony, of the history of the country and the people, as also of humanity in general, is inadequate, and instructs the "Hoofdbestuur" to devise a plan for remedying this evil as soon as possible and lay such before the Department of Education and the University Council.
6. This Congress is of opinion that in all the examinations the papers on Dutch should be written and answered in that language.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that he had given permission to Mr. B. J. Van der Riet, M.A., University Fellow, to delay entering on the duties of the Fellowship till the beginning of July next, but that no further postponement would be allowed.

The Council proceeded to consider the Resolutions of the Synod of the Dutch Reformed Church and of the Vestal Congress on the subject of the Dutch Language in the University examinations, and the Report of the S. That an optional paper in Dutch be set at the School Elementary Examination - no marks to be given for it, but Candidates who pass in Dutch shall be stated in their Certificates.

(c) By Dr. Van Coot:

That in the School Higher Examination equal values should be assigned to the English and Dutch papers, and that these values should successively be assigned to other Modern Language papers.

(d) By Prof. Thomson:

That at the Matriculation Examination 250 marks should be assigned to the English, Dutch, French and German papers, and 200 to the Latin and Science papers.

(e) By Prof. Helms:

That an examination be arranged Equivalent to the present School Elementary Examination, the Dutch language taking the place of English in all Subjects: this Examination to be alternative with the present one. Each of these five Resolutions was put from the Chair and lost.

In addition to these Resolutions, as an amendment to Dr. Helms's motion, Dr. Van Coot moved that Resolution (d) of the Synod of the D. R. Church be adopted by the Council. The motion was put from the Chair and lost.

The Committee further makes the following recommendations:—

- (a). To divide the Latin and Greek papers at Matriculation, and the Latin paper at the School Higher Examination, into two parts: Part I to contain passages from the set authors, with questions arising

out of them: value 100 marks. Part II to contain general questions, unseen work, composition, grammar and accidence: value 200 marks. No candidate to pass in these subjects who does not show competent knowledge of Part II.

- (b). To divide the English, History and Geography papers at the School Elementary Examination between two Examiners, as follows:—

English Paper in two parts: Part I to be the general paper in grammar, parsing, analysis; to occupy 2 hours. Part II to contain the special tests in writing, dictation and composition; to occupy 1 hour. The special writing test to be a single sentence, value 20 marks, and the handwriting of the composition and dictation exercises to be valued at 30 marks. Dictation exercise to occupy not more than 15 minutes.

History Paper: In two parts, English History, 2 hours; 120 marks. Colonial History, 1 hour; 80 marks.

Geography: In two parts, General and Physical. Each 1½ hours and 100 marks.

In all cases where the Paper is in two parts, the answers to the first part are to be collected before the second part is given to the candidates.

- (c). On p. lxxxiii of the calendar (1890—1) under III, Physical Science, to substitute for clause (b) the words "Natural Philosophy (Dynamics and Heat)"; and on p. lxxxvi, under III, Natural Science, instead of "Dynamics" to read "Natural Philosophy (Dynamics, Heat and Light)." Details in each case as in accompanying programmes.



The Vice-Chancellor reported that he had given permission to Mr. B. J. Van der Riet, M. A., University Fellow, to delay entering on the duties of the Fellowship till the beginning of July next, but that no further postponement would be allowed.

The Council proceeded to consider the Resolutions of the Synod of the Dutch Reformed Church and of the Facult Congress on the Subject of the Dutch Language at the University Examinations, and the Report of the S. A. Teachers' Association on the Subject. After discussion, the following Resolutions were successively moved:—

(a) By Dr. Van Coort:

That the Dutch Language should be added to the Subjects now prescribed for the School Elementary Examination: in such manner however that no Candidate shall be compelled to take that Subject, but that any Candidate passing in Dutch shall thereby be entitled to obtain higher marks, and that the Value of the Dutch Paper be fixed at 200 marks.

(b) By the Vice-Chancellor:

That an optional Paper in Dutch be set at the School Elementary Examination — no marks to be given for it, but Candidates who pass in Dutch shall be stated in their Certificates.

(c) By Dr. Van Coort:

That in the School Higher Examination equal Values should be assigned to the English and Dutch Papers, and that these Values should exceed those assigned to other Modern Language Papers.

(d) By Prof. Thomson:

That at the Articulation Examination 250 marks should be assigned to the English, Dutch, French and German Papers, and 200 to the Latin and Greek Papers.

(e) By Prof. Hahn:

That an Examination be arranged equivalent to the present School Elementary Examination, the Dutch Language taking the place of English in all Subjects: this Examination to be alternative with the present one. Each of these five Resolutions was put from the Chair and lost.

In addition to these Resolutions, <sup>as an amendment to Dr. Hahn's motion</sup> Dr. Van Coort moved that Resolution (d) of the Synod of the D. R. Church be adopted by the Council. The motion was put from the Chair and lost.

An application for admission to a degree from the Rev. L. P. Booth, M. D., of Trinity College, Toronto, was ordered to stand over, pending the receipt of further information as to the examinations and degrees of Trinity College.

The Vice Chancellor reported the renewal of the lease of the premises occupied by the University, for a further period of five years, at the same rental, viz. £150 per annum.

The Vice Chancellor reported that the plaster ceiling of the hall had been declared unsafe, and that the proprietors had offered to substitute for it a ceiling of wood if the University would contribute £20 towards the expense. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice Chancellor reported that as requested by the Council he had waited on the Attorney General on the subject of vesting the functions of the proposed and Pharmaceutical Council or Board in the University Council, and that the Attorney General had promised that the proposal should receive consideration.

The Vice Chancellor called the attention of the Council to the case of F. W. Elliott, to whom a Journalism Exhibition was awarded in 1890, but the money had not been paid on the ground that he had left the Institution from which he matriculated and had entered a Lawyer's Office. The V. C. stated that he was satisfied that Elliott had been pursuing his studies for further examination by the University, and that he had presented himself as a Candidate at the recent Intermediate Examination. Attention was also called to the case of E. Herbert, to whom a Bursary had been awarded in 1890, but the money had not been paid, as he also had left the Institution and gone into business; but the Tutor to whom he was trading privately certified that he was prosecuting his studies; and he also had entered for the Intermediate Examination. Sir Langham Dale called the attention of the Council to the fact that the money from which Bursaries are paid is voted by the Parliament for "School and College Bursaries", and that money paid to a private student could not be paid out of this Fund. After discussion it was resolved that the amounts to be paid to Elliott and Herbert as voted by the Council, inasmuch as there is no condition expressed in the Regulations that Bursars or Exhibitioners must be students actually attending School or College; but that it be added in the general conditions

I am directed by the General Committee of the S. A. Teachers' Association to forward for the information of the University Council the following Resolutions which were adopted at the annual conference held at Kimberley on the 24<sup>th</sup>, 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> June last.

"That in the opinion of this Conference the poverty test should no longer be applied in awarding University Bursaries or Scholarships."

Matriculation Examination.

"Resolved that this Conference recommend to the University Council -

(1) That Candidates for Matriculation who do not take Greek be allowed to take as an alternative Dynamics or one of the prescribed Science Subjects.

(2) That in assigning the marks at the Matriculation and the two School examinations, the principle of deducting the minimum number of marks required for a pass from the number obtained by each candidate (as in the Examination for the Indian Civil Service) would be better adapted to discourage superficiality than the principle now in force.

That this Conference thankfully acknowledges the approval by the University Council of the principle that firstly an effort should be made to obtain the views of Teachers throughout the Colony before important changes are made in the School examinations: and secondly that no such change should in any case take place except until at least 12 months have elapsed from the time when notification of the change was published in the University Calendar, and respectfully requests that this principle may be extended to the Matriculation Examination.

Professor Thomson called attention to a somewhat similar motion proposed by him and adopted by the Council on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of August last, that an annual abstract of the proceedings of the Council be printed for the use of Members of Council. Such abstract was prepared by the Acting Registrar and laid on the Table on the 27<sup>th</sup> of September, but the printing of the Abstract was ordered to stand over. Professor Walker's motion was put from the Chair and lost: whereupon it was resolved that effect be given to Prof. Thomson's motion of August, 1890, and a report of the proceedings of the Council for the year 1890-1 be prepared by the Registrar, and printed if approved by the Vice Chancellor.

The Vice Chancellor reported that he had summoned a special meeting of the New Council for Saturday, the 1<sup>st</sup> of August, to elect a Vice Chancellor, appoint Examiners for 1892, and for other business. On the suggestion of some of the members present, the V.C. stated that he would have the meeting summoned for Saturday, the 8<sup>th</sup> of August, as this would give time for communicating with nominees for Committees of Examiners who reside at a distance from Cape Town.

The Vice Chancellor read a letter from Rev. Dr. Rolke, in reference to a proposal to start a movement in Cape Town analogous to the University Extension in England. Resolved that Dr. Rolke's letter be printed with the Agenda of next meeting and then considered.
