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at the same time he is of opinion that the English Subject is too indefinite, and not sufficiently distinct from the English brought up for the Elementary.

The Council proceeded to discuss the several points in Dr. Dale's motion, and after consideration agreed to the motion, with the following changes:—

(a) In Group II of subjects, the words "Inorganic Chemistry" to be substituted for the word "Chemistry": and section (4) to read as follows:—"The elements of Physics, or Physical Geography, with the outlines of any one of the four Subjects Mineralogy, Botany, Zoology, Geology."

(b) In the next paragraph the concluding sentence to stand thus:—"A candidate may choose only one of the subjects marked (4) in each group."

(c) In the programme of the order of the examination, the words "the outlines of Geology, with" to be struck out.

(d) The whole of the last Paragraph to be struck out, and the following Paragraphs substituted:—

Chemistry. An ordinary Textbook, such as Roscoe's Lectures in Elementary Chemistry, will sufficiently indicate the range of the Examination.

Physics. The Candidate may select either of the two following subjects:—

(α) Light, Heat, Electricity and Magnetism, as treated in Balfour Stewart's Elementary Physics:

(β) Hydrostatics, Mechanics, Hydraulics, as treated in

For the purpose of completing the last sentence, and of adding the necessary instructions with reference to the other subjects included in the Examination, a Committee was appointed, with power to complete the details of the Scheme, and to publish the whole in the Gazette—The Committee to consist of Dr. Dale, Dr. Aahn, Prof. Guthrie, and the Registrar.

On the motion of Prof. Guthrie, the following addition to the Regulations for the Honours Examination was made:—
"The Registrar will issue a certificate to all Candidates who have passed the Examination, and the certificate will specify the subjects in which the Candidate has passed."

The V. The V. A letter was read from the Secretary of the S. A. College Council, stating that the Hon. T. Wroughton has vacated his office as Member of the S. A. College Council, by absence. On the motion of Mr. Fuller, Mr. Wroughton was unanimously re-elected.

It was agreed that there should be a Porter Studentship offered for competition in October, 1880. The Vice-Chancellor having remarked on the insufficiency of the amount of the Studentship in consequence of heavy expenses incurred by the holder in travelling and entering into residence at an European University, the Council expressed its opinion that, should the Funds and the circumstances of the student justify additional expenditure, favourable consideration should be given to an application for a grant to meet such expenses.

The next competition for the Jamison scholarship was fixed for October, 1882.

The Vice-Chancellor having brought to the notice of the Council the inadequacy of the salary attached to the office of Registrar, it was moved by the Chief Justice, seconded by Archdeacon Radnall, and unanimously resolved that the salary of the Registrar be increased to £500 per annum: and that the Vice-Chancellor be requested, in communicating this Resolution to the Rev. D. Compton, to express the Council's high appreciation of his services, which have so largely contributed to the success of the University.

The selection of centres for the examinations in October was left to the discretion of the Vice-Chancellor.

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The V.C. represented the growth of the Examination work; from year to year, and the insufficiency of the Honorarium of 50£ paid annually to each examiner, being the same amount as was paid to a member of the late Board of Examiners twenty one years ago. The Subject having been discussed, on the motion of the V.C. the remuneration for an examiner was fixed at 100£ p.a.; to begin from the 1st of January next.

The Vice-Chancellor proposed that in addition to the ordinary estimate of expenditures for the year 1880-1, an application should be made to the Government to place on the Estimates a sum of money to be appropriated for Bursaries to aid students who are preparing for University examinations, and whose circumstances are such as to justify

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to H. E. the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1879.

2. In accordance with the provisions of the University Incorporation Act, the first Council of the University expired by effluxion of time on the 30th of July. H. E. the Governor was pleased to appoint the following

5. The fifth examination of candidates for certificates of proficiency in Elementary Subjects of instruction was held in April. 7. The exam^{ns} for degrees and certificates were held in October, at Blomfontein, Port Elizabeth, and Stellenbosch, in addition to Cape Town.

(a) For the degree of Master of Arts two candidates were registered, in the department of Languages and Literature. Both these candidates, however, were compelled by ill health to withdraw their names before the Exam^{ns} commenced.

(b) For the degree of Bachelor of Laws there was one candidate, who failed to satisfy the Examiners.

(c) For the degree of Bachelor of Arts 15 candidates were examined - seven in Cape Town, six at Stellenbosch, and two at Port Elizabeth. Of these candidates, Charles Murray obtained the degree with Honours in Lit. and Sc.: George E. C. Anderson obtained the degree with Honours in Science: and Nicolaas Hofmeyr, Langley Pelham, Joshua Jacobus, Shreezer Starkley, George Eyre, and Frederick Price obtained the degree. The Univ. Scholarships in Lit. and Sc., and the Porter Studeuskijs, were awarded to Charles Murray, of the Pub. Sch., Stellenbosch: and an additional Scholarship in Science was awarded to George E. C. Anderson, of the S. A. College.

(d) For the certificate of Proficiency in Law and Jurisprudence there were 5 candidates, viz, Charles Leonard, P. J. Wierls, Fred. Lindenberg, H. W. Todd and E. Nathan. All these candidates obtained the certificate.

(e) For the certificate of Proficiency in the Theory of Land Surveying there were 12 candidates, 8 of whom were examined in Cape Town, two at Port Elizabeth, and 2 at Blomfontein. The certificate was obtained by A. E. Wayland, W. H. A. Pritchard, G. Baumann, G. R. Van Wiedigh, S. de Kock, D. W. F. Ballot, T. Threen, and S. C. Norris.

8. The third competition for the Chancellor's Gold Medal was taken place during the year. The judges appointed to report upon the competing essays were the Ven. Archdeacon Badnell, Mr. Advocate Cole, and J. G. Graubler Esq. On the unanimous recommendation of the judges, the Council awarded the Medal to W. Hammond Tooke, an undergraduate of the University. The subject

of the essay was a discussion of the following Thesis:—
"No study affords a wider or more wholesome field for
"exercising the faculties and preparing men for life, than that
"of Metaphysics—the term being used so as to embrace the
"Philosophy of the mind, with Logic as a component part,

10. In the Report of the Council for 1878, reference was made to an extension of the range of the examinations in elementary subjects of instruction, and to a proposed modification of the matriculation examⁿ, in order that girls might be able to pass it without showing competent knowledge in subjects which are not usually taught in girls' schools. These points have received careful consideration during the year. The Council, while recognizing the great importance of encouraging the higher departments of female education, has considered it inexpedient to modify the present Matric. Examⁿ: and it has reason to believe that the newly instituted School Examⁿ for Honours will meet the wants of those who have passed the Elementary Examⁿ, and wish to pursue their studies in other directions than those

marked out for the matric. Examⁿ. In this school Examⁿ for Honours, the candidate may select two or three subjects from each of the following groups:-

Group I. Literature

- (a) Latin.
- (b) English Language and Literature.
- (c) French.
- (d) German or Dutch.

Group II. Science.

- (a) Arithmetic.
- (b) Geometry.
- (c) Inorganic Chemistry.
- (d) The elements of Physics: or Physical Geography, with the outlines of any one of the following subjects: - Mineralogy, Botany, Zoology, Geology.

The object of instituting this new examⁿ is to encourage the continuous study of such subjects as are usually included in a superior course of education, and to stimulate the study of the elements of the Physical Sciences, both in girls' and boys' schools. The examination will also serve as a convenient test of the fitness and capacity of a youth to proceed to matriculation.

11. By the removal of Mr. E. J. Stone, F.R.S., from the Observatory at the Cape to the Radcliffe Observatory, Oxford, the University has lost the services of one whose Councils and assistance are of very high value. The Council has recorded on its minutes its sense of the benefit the University has had in the co-operation of one so eminent in the highest departments of modern Science.

12. The only changes in the By-Laws during the year have been the rescinding of the regulation that no candidate can obtain honours at matriculation without showing competent knowledge in each of the subjects of Examⁿ; and the addition, at the matric. and B. A. exam^{ns}, of Latin and Sesuto to the list of modern languages from which a candidate may make a selection.

13. The annual ceremony of conferring degrees was held in the Public Library on the 10th of December, when the V.C., in the name of the Univ. and in the presence of the Council and the Convocation, conferred degrees upon the several candidates whom the Council

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had declared qualified. The V.C. afterwards addressed
the Congregation on the work of the University.

The Council has again to acknowledge the
courtesy of the Library Committee in granting the use
of the Library on the occasion.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the South Afr. College Council, reporting that the Hon. T. Uppington will vacate his seat as a member of the College Council on the 31st of March, owing to effluxion of time: and that the nomination of a gentleman to fill the vacancy has arising sets with the Council of the University. The Council unanimously re-appointed Mr. Uppington.

The Vice-Chancellor introduced the subject of the new Bursaries in connection with the school examinations. The following Resolutions were adopted:—

(a) Instead of the three Bursaries hitherto given at the Elementary examination there shall be six Prizes — one of £20, two of £15 each, and three of £10 each.

(b) At the next Elementary examination there shall be 15 Bursaries offered, of 20£ each, tenable for one year. Candidates for these Bursaries must pass in the First Class, and must satisfy the University Authorities that they are pursuing their studies for a further examination, and that their circumstances are such as to require pecuniary assistance.

(c) At the school examination for Honours in 1880 there shall be 4 Bursaries of 25£ each, tenable for one year — which may under special circumstances be extended to two years; under the same conditions as those specified above for the Bursaries at the Elementary examination.

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(d) That a Prize of £25 shall be given to the Candidate who passes highest in the School examⁿ for Honours.

(e) That in the awarding of Prizes at the School Examinations candidates shall be considered to have claims according to their standing in the List.

The question of the remuneration of examiners for the School Honours Certificate was discussed, and the Council resolved that for each paper there should be a fee of £5 when there are no candidates in that subject to be examined, and £10 when there are candidates.

The following members were appointed a Committee to inquire into and report on the whole subject of the revision of the B.A. and M.A. Examinations:— The Vice-Chancellor, Canon Ogilvie, Hon. C. A. Smith, Rev. H. M. Foot, Dr. Hahn, and Professor Gordon.

The First Book of the Aeneid was selected as the Latin Subject at the Honours examⁿ in 1881.

Some discussion ensued as to the desirableness of continuing to print the name of an examiner on the paper prepared by him. It was resolved that the rule bearing on this subject (n^o 12 on p. LXVI, Calendar for 1880) be referred to each of the Committees of Examiners for the favour of its opinion thereon.

The Vice-Chancellor gave notice of motion to alter the number of days which must elapse between giving intimation of a meeting and the meeting itself from twenty one to eight. (Rule 6, p. LX, Cal. 1880).

The third of the Recommendations of the Committee appointed to report on the present system of marks at matriculation (see Minutes of meeting on 3 Dec. 1879) was referred to the Committee of Examiners in Science for the favour of its Report.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that in accordance with the resolution of the Council at its last meeting bursaries had been awarded, on the specified conditions, to the first fifteen candidates in the Elementary School examination and the first four candidates in the School examination for Honours; and that three of the former and two of the latter bursaries had been declined. It was resolved that the bursaries thus declined should be offered to the candidates next in order on the lists.

The V. C. reported that arrangements were in progress for holding the Matriculation examination at the following places in addition to Cape Town:— Bedford, Bloemfontein, Burgersdorp, George, Graaff Reinet, Grahamstown, King's Mountain, Port Elizabeth, Pondebosch, and Stellenbosch; and the examinations for degrees and certificates at Alwal North, Port Elizabeth and Stellenbosch.

The V. C. formally reported to the Council the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Justice Stockenström. It was resolved that the vacancy be reported to the Government, with an intimation that the appointment to the vacant seat rests with the Government.

A report was read from the Committee of

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Examiners in Law on the rule n^o 12, page LXVI, Calendar for 1880. The Committee expressed its opinion that no change should be made in the rule. A report to the same effect was read from the Committee of Examiners in Science. The V.C., as Moderator of the Committee of Examiners in Literature, reported that that Committee does not advocate any change of the rule at present.

On the motion of the Vice-Chancellor it was unanimously resolved to make the following alteration in rule 6, page LX, Calendar for 1880:— instead of "twenty-one" to substitute the words "not less than eight."

The minutes of the last meeting having been read and confirmed, the Registrar laid on the table the lists, signed by the Moderators, of successful candidates at the recent Matriculation Examination. Of 124 candidates registered, 118 were actually examined, with the following result:—

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

A letter was read from the Colonial Secretary, informing the Council that H. E. the Governor has been pleased to appoint the Hon. M. Justice Smith to be a member of the University Council in the room of the late M. Justice Stockstrom.

The Vice-Chancellor reported to the Council the death, on the 13th of July, of the Hon. W. Porter, Chancellor of the University, and stated that a meeting of Convocation for the election of a successor had been summoned for the 29th of September. The following Resolutions, on the motion of the V. C., was unanimously adopted, and ordered to be communicated to Mr. Porter's family:—

"The Council has heard with sincere regret of the
"death of the Hon. W. Porter, C. M. G., the first
"Chancellor of the University, and desires to put on
"record its sense of the usefulness and importance
"of the munificent Porter Endowment, which the
"University enjoys through his gifts made from
"time to time, now amounting to £7000.

"The Council further desires to express its
"admiration of the noble, generous, and humane
"character of the late Chancellor, who was ever
"foremost in promoting the most liberal measures
"both for the diffusion of popular education

"and for the good of all classes of the community".

The Vice-Chancellor reported that his attention had been called to certain alleged irregularities at the recent Matriculation examination in Stellenbosch. A letter, signed "an unsuccessful candidate", had been received by the Registrar, stating that some of the candidates at Stellenbosch had copied answers from the papers of other candidates: and the same charge had been publicly made by the correspondent of one of the newspapers. The V.C. had therefore instructed the Registrar to proceed to Stellenbosch and enquire into the matter. The Registrar stated that on Friday, the 20th of August, such of the candidates as could be brought together were examined in the presence of the Chairman and other members of the Board, fellow-managers of the Stellenbosch Pub. School, and of the Professors of the Stellenbosch College. From the statements of several candidates it was clear that there had been copying on the part of some of the candidates. A letter, dated 31 August, from Prof. Murray, was read, stating that one of the candidates had been induced to acknowledge his offence: and this letter was accompanied by one from this candidate to the V.C., confessing with shame and remorse that he had taken a paper from his neighbour's table and copied it. It was thereupon resolved that the certificate issued to Jacques du Toit, who by his own confession "took a paper from his neighbour's table and copied it", be cancelled: but that he be allowed to appear as a candidate at a future Matriculation examination - Entering as a new candidate and paying the fee again: and that this resolution be communicated to the Chairman of the Senate of the Stellenbosch College. Professors Murray and Gordon, with the Registrar, were appointed a Commission to continue the enquiry. The Registrar stated that he had received a second letter on the subject, signed "Civis", alleging that such irregularities were not confined to Stellenbosch or to the present year. The Council could take no action on a vague charge of this nature, but felt the importance of using every precaution to secure the integrity of the examinations.

The Council authorized the Registrar to pay the Bursaries, awarded at the last school exam-
