

minations, towards the close of the current year.

The V. C. read a letter from Mr. J. C. Gie, requesting the Council to extend the tenure of Mr. W. P. Schreiner's Doctor's Studentship for an additional year, as without assistance he will be obliged to relinquish his studies. A letter from Mr. Schreiner, to the same effect, was read by the Registrar: whereupon it was moved by the Rev. H. M. Foot, and unanimously carried, that in consideration of Mr. Schreiner's satisfactory career as a student at the Universities of London and Cambridge, and the circumstances explained in his letter to the Registrar, a special allowance of £100 be made to him, for the purpose of enabling him to complete his academical career.

The Rev. H. M. Foot moved, in accordance with notice previously given, "that applications be invited by public advertisement from persons in South Africa willing to undertake the duties of University examiners for the year 1881." After discussion the motion was put and lost—five members voting for and six against it. Canon Ogilvie suggested that at the next ordinary meeting of Council each member should be prepared with a list of persons from which the examiners in Arts and Law should be selected. The suggestion, without being put as a formal motion, was approved of by the Council.

The Vice-Chancellor moved the Resolutions of which he gave notice at the last meeting. After discussion, they were passed in the following form:—

1. That it is advisable to commence the Matriculation examination on the last Tuesday in June, and that the By-Laws be altered accordingly.
2. That it is advisable that, from the year 1882, the other examinations, viz, B. A., M. A., Surgery, and the Law examinations, should commence on the second Tuesday in June, and that the By-Laws be altered accordingly.

3. That the following words be added to Par. 3 of the Regulations for the Elementary School Examination (Cal. 1880, p. xcvi) :- "This clause does not apply to Cape Town, as in future the Registrar will receive the applications and fees of candidates who wish to be examined in Cape Town, and will make the necessary arrangements for the examination there:" and that in Par. 15 of the same regulations all the words after the words "a certificate in the first class" be struck out, and the following words substituted :- "but no candidate who has passed the examination in the first class will, under any circumstances, be admitted to a subsequent examination for the certificate".

4. That the Committee of Examiners in Science be requested to report whether it is desirable to retain the word rarer in defining the Chemistry Subjects for 1881.

Dr. Hahn moved, in accordance with notice previously given, "that in future University examinations, a number, or an appellation other than his own name, shall be assigned to each candidate". After considerable discussion, the Council rested, on the motion of the Rev. H. M. Foot, that the question stand over for decision at a future meeting.

The Registrar submitted a Memorial from the President and the Hon. Secretary of the South African Teachers' Association, praying that the age limit at the elementary examinations should be extended to eighteen years for both sexes, if any limit of age is observed at all: and further enquiring whether a "candidate at the elementary examination, who has once failed, is entitled to a Bursary or Prize on making another attempt, if otherwise deserving of it." The Registrar was instructed to reply, in answer to this enquiry, that failure in one examination is no disqualification for a Prize or Bursary at a subsequent examination: and to inform the President of the Association that the Council does not deem it expedient to make any change in the Regulations as to the age of candidates without longer trial of the working of these Regulations.

Archdeacon Badnall gave the following notice of motion :- "That no one person examine for

more than three years consecutively in the same subject."

The examiners recommend Moltzeno for the Porter Studentship, and the University Scholarship in Literature: Watermeyer for the University Scholarship in Science: and certify that Grobbelaar and Watermeyer have shown sufficient merit for Prizes in Science and Literature respectively. They also decide to recommend Watermeyer to the special notice of the Council, as being so good a second in the competition for the Porter Studentship.

V. Master of Arts examinations.

One candidate, M. C. E. Lewis, B.A., presented himself for this examination, in the department of Languages and Literature, and is entitled to pass.

The Vice-Chancellor, as Moderator of the Committee of Examiners in Literature, stated that M. Lewis had addressed a letter to him in reference to the M. A. examination papers, taking special exception to the paper in Modern History as being in his view inconsistent with the explicit directions of the Calendar, which makes special reference to Motley's Dutch Republic; whereas but a very small proportion of the questions could be answered from that work.

M. Lewis also complained of the extreme length of many of the classical papers, which prevented him from reaching the end of the papers in the allotted time. M. Lewis's letter was read by the Vice-Chancellor, together with the following memorandum from the Examiners in Literature:—

The Committee of Examiners in Literature desire to report to the Council that the enclosed letter was received from the M. A. Candidate, M. C. E. Lewis; and after being duly considered, the Committee resolved that in their opinion the

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Modern History paper (attached) is within the prescribed range: and that in the Classical Papers the proportion of passages for Translation and critical questions is fairly balanced, and that the length of the Papers is not unusual. (Signed) L. Dale, Moderator.

The Registrar was instructed to write to Mr. Lewis, stating that the matters to which his letter refers have been duly considered by the Examiners, and giving him the substance of the memorandum quoted above:— at the same time informing Mr. Lewis that the Council considers such communications from candidates to Examiners to be irregular.

The Rev. H. M. Foot moved that in consideration of the special recommendation by the Examiners of Walmseyer as a good second in the Porter Studentship Competition, the Ullid: scholarship awarded to him be of the value of £100 p.a. for two years. The motion was put and lost: and a motion by Mr. Justice Smith that its value be £75 p.a. for two years was put and carried.

The following Resolution by the Examiners in Literature was read by the Vice-Chancellor:-

The Examiners consider that though the marks assigned to Mr. Lewis's papers at the examination for the degree of Master of Arts do not justify them in recommending him for the Fellowship, his translations from the Latin and Greek Authors are of sufficient excellence to deserve special recognition.

Canon Agilrie moved that a Prize of £25 in books be awarded to Mr. Lewis, in consideration of the recommendation of the Examiners. This was put to the meeting and lost: whereupon the Council resolved that Mr. Lewis be informed that the Examiners have reported in terms of high commendation on his translations from the Greek and Latin Authors.

Messrs. Farie and Beard were appointed judges for the Ebdou Prize Essay, with the Rev. H. M. Foot as referee.

Canon Agilrie gave notice of motion that the Geodesy paper at the Survey examination be referred to the Science Examiners for 1881.

The Registrar was instructed to see Mr. F. Porter on the subject of the Chancellor's Medal for 1881, and to ascertain whether the late Chancellor made any provision for its transmission to the Colony before his death. In case it should be necessary, the Council agreed to bear the expense of providing the Medal for this year.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Rev. H. M. Foot moved that Reporters for the Press be admitted to meetings of the Council, provided that they withdraw when requested to do so by the Vice-Chancellor or Chairman. To this an amendment was moved by Archd. Badnall, that the question as to the admission of Reporters be deferred to a fuller meeting of Council: The amendment was carried.

A letter was read from the Chairman and Acting Secretary of Convocation, informing the Council of the election, on the 29th of September last, of His Excellency Sir Bartle Frere as Chancellor of the University in succession to the late Hon. W. Porter: and the reply of Sir Bartle Frere to the Vice-Chancellor, accepting the office of Chancellor, was laid on the Table. The letter from Convocation further contained copies of resolutions passed at the same meeting in reference to the loss sustained by the death of Mr. Porter, and of a resolution on the subject of the absence from the Colony of the Secretary of Convocation.

It was decided that the annual ceremony of conferring degrees should be held on Friday, the 10th inst.: and that the next competition for the Porter Studentship should be in October, 1881.

On the motion of the V. C. it was resolved to strike out, in the Second of the Regulations for the Porter Studentship, all the words after the word "University" (Cal. 1880 p. LXXXV.): and the same words in the Second of the Regulations for M^r. Jannison's Scholarship. (Ib. p. LXXXVI)

Messrs A. G. Jones and L. Marquard were appointed Auditors of the University Accounts for the year.

The Vice-Chancellor had a letter from Mr. Justice Smith, calling attention to the difficulty found by himself and other members of the legal profession in attending the ordinary meetings of Council, as the days fixed for those meetings usually fall in the Term Time of the Supreme Court; and suggesting the last Wednesday in January, April, July and October as more convenient dates. The V. C. gave notice that at the next meeting he would move to alter the dates for holding the ordinary meetings of Council.

The V. C. reported that on the unanimous recommendation of the judges (Prof. Hahn, Prof. MacLellan, and Mr. C. L. Morgan) the Chancellor's Gold Medal for 1880 was awarded to Mr. John Adams, J. of Fultbargh. Mr. Adams passed the Matriculation Examination in 1874. In forwarding his report on Mr. Adams's Essay, Dr. Hahn stated his opinion that the essay should be translated into Dutch and published for the benefit of our farming population. The Registrar was instructed to communicate this opinion to Mr. Adams.

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A letter was read from M. J. C. Young, asking for the refund of the fee for the Surrey examination paid by him in 1879, as he has now left the Colony, and has derived no advantage for the money paid to the University - having been prevented by professional engagements from presenting himself for the examination. On the motion of D. Hahn it was resolved to direct M. Young's attention to the printed rule on this subject, and to inform him that the Council sees no sufficient reason for departing from the rule.

A letter was read from Professor Murray, to the effect that in his opinion, and that of the Professors of the St. Petersburg College nothing more is to be expected from any investigation into the late irregularities at the Matriculation Examination, and that as far as they are concerned the investigation may be considered as closed. It was resolved to call Professor Murray's attention to the terms in which this Council appointed the Commission of Enquiry, and to request that a full report on the subject may be made by the Commission.

It was agreed that there should be the usual recess of one month, in the early part of next year.

Archdeacon Baonall moved "That no one person examine for more than 3 years consecutively in the same subject." After discussion, the motion was withdrawn by permission of the Council.

Canon Ogilvie moved "That the Geodesy paper at the Surrey examination be referred to the Science examiners for 1881." The mover stated that his object in bringing this matter forward was to prevent students from spending an undue amount of time and labour in preparation for this paper, the general impression at present being that it is essential to pass in this subject. He wished that the Examiners should consider the expediency of intimating to candidates that the paper on Geodesy is optional. The Resolution was adopted, the Registrar to obtain the opinion of the Science examiners on the question raised by Canon Ogilvie.

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The Registrar read a letter from Professor Murray, requesting that his name should be omitted from the list of examiners for 1881, and suggesting that Dr. Ashm, Professor Walker, and Dr. Van Oordt might with advantage be employed as examiners in Classics. A letter was read from Mr. Justice Smith, proposing Mr. P. M. Laurence, B.A., LL.M., as an examiner in Classics. The Council proceeded to the nomination and appointment of examiners for 1881. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Canon Ogilvie reported that the Rev. Mr. Bond had left the Colony in ill health and tendered his resignation as a Member of Council. Mr. Bond's resignation was accepted by the Council - the necessary steps to be taken for filling up the vacancy.

The Rev. H. M. Foot brought forward the Resolution moved by him on the 1st inst. with reference to the admission of Reporters to meetings of Council. The motion was put to the meeting and lost by a majority of 5 votes to 3. Archdeacon Badnall then moved that as a request has been made that the proceedings of the Council should be given to the Public, the Council publish an official account of the proceedings of each meeting in the Government Gazette. The motion was put and carried.

A Report was laid on the Table from Professor Murray, on behalf of himself and Professor Gordon on

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the subject of the irregularities at the Stellenbosch Matriculation examination: but as the Report represented only two members of the Commission appointed by the Council, it was by permission of the Council withdrawn.

The following recommendations from the Committee of Examiners in Science were adopted:—

(a) To retain the word "rarer" in defining the Chemistry subject for Matriculation in 1881.

(b) To omit the words "including the practical use of logarithmic tables" (Cal. p. Lxvii. ll. 14, 15)

(c) To omit the words "as may from time to time be notified by the Council" (Cal. p. Lxviii.) and to state the Subjects in Physical Science at Matriculation thus:—

Either (1) Chemistry

or (2) Geology

or (3) Light and Heat

or (4) Electricity and Magnetism.

(d) To add the words "Geometrical Conics" after the words "to Prop. 21 inclusive" on page Lxxviii. line 7 of Calendar: and on the same page to read "Elements of Astronomy" instead of "Elements of Plane Astronomy".

(e) To state the Physical Science Subjects for the B.A. Examination thus:—

Either (1) Inorganic Chemistry

or (2) Geology and Mineralogy

or (3) Light and Heat

or (4) Electricity.

(f) To define the Subject of Plane Trigonometry for the B.A. Examination thus:— "Plane Trigonometry, excluding the expansions dependent on De Moivre's Theorem, but including the Exponential Theorem and the expansions derived from it."

The following recommendations from the Committee of Examiners in Science were referred to the Committee appointed to inquire into the Subject of the Revision of the B.A. and M.A. Examinations:—

(a) To add to the subjects in Geometry for B.A. and Society examinations "Euclid, Book XI. pp. 1—21 inclusive."

(b) To define Elementary Mechanics at B.A. examination thus:— "Statics, Dynamics, and Hydrostatics."

(c) The same Committee was requested to report upon the proposed addition of Physiology to Inorganic Chemistry at the B.A. Examination.

The recommendations from the Examiners in Lite-

rather to omit the words "with special reference to Motley's Dutch Republic" in describing the Modern History Subject for the M. A. Examination (Cal. p. LXXXVII) was adopted.

The following subjects for the Matriculation Examination in 1882 were selected:—

The V. C. read a letter from Archdeacon White, resigning his seat as a member of Council; and a letter from the Acting Under Col. Secretary, informing the

* M. Ogilvie's name should be omitted, as he was not present.

Council that H. E. the Administrator had been pleased to appoint David Gill Esq., Astronomer Royal, to the seat vacant by the resignation of Archdeacon White.

The V. C. read a letter from Sir Bartle Frere, intimating his intention to offer annually a Chancellor's Gold Medal for competitors. The V. C. also stated that the Medal for last year had arrived, and that he had requested Mr. F. Potter to arrange that the dies for the medal, now in possession of the late Chancellor's executors, should be sent to Sir Bartle Frere.

The V. C. proposed as the Subject for the Essay for the Chancellor's Medal in 1881 - "Present explorations and discoveries in South Eastern Central Africa." Mr. Fuller moved an amendment that the Subject be "Present explorations and discoveries in Africa South of the Equator". This amendment having been withdrawn, the V. C.'s motion was carried, with the omission of the word 'Eastern'. The Essays to be sent in on or before the 15th of November.

The Report of the Judges for the Ebdon Prize was laid on the table - two of the three awarding the Prize to the Essay bearing the motto "Hai eko amali." The sealed envelope containing the name of the writer was then opened, and the successful competitor found to be Mr. W. Hammond Tooke, of Cape Town, who matriculated in 1879. The Registrar was authorized to pay Mr. Tooke the Prize of £50.

The Registrar submitted a Draft of the Report of the Council for 1880, together with a complete financial statement, certified by the Auditors as correct, of the several funds of the University. The Report, with the addition of a paragraph referring to the withdrawal from the estimates of £1000 for School Bursaries, was adopted. The V. C. laid on the table a letter from Government, enclosing Despatch and Correspondence with reference to the proposed allocation, annually, of a Cadetship at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, to this University. The following Draft of reply to the Government was submitted by the V. C. and approved:—

The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, incorporated under Royal Charter dated 8th of August, 1847, is prepared to accept the Rules laid down* with reference to the annual grant of a Military Cadetship at the R. M. College, Sandhurst, to the Chartered University of the Cape of Good Hope. These Rules, with a few Supplementary instructions for the guidance of Candidates, are as follows:—

1. No candidate will be recommended for a Cadetship who has not taken the degree of Bachelor of Arts in the Univ. of G. Hope, nor whose age is below 17 or exceeds 22 years.

2. The nominated Candidate will be required to enter the R. M. College within six months of his passing the requisite qualifying examination, otherwise his claim to a Cadetship will lapse.

3. Certificates of age and of moral character for the preceding four years, together with a recommendation of the Candidate by the proper University authority, are to be forwarded to the Military Secretary, Horse

guards, so as to reach him at least one month before the date of the Candidate's joining Sandhurst, the terms commencing 10 Feb. and 1 Sept. respectively. The address of the nominee in Great Britain or Ireland is at the same ^{time} to be notified.

4. The Colonial University will undertake the examination of the candidates in Geometrical Drawing, this being an obligatory subject.

The University Council would be glad to have the foregoing Rules authoritatively sanctioned by the War Office, and would respectfully ask advice and information on the following points:-

(a) Is the nominated Candidate to bring medical certificates from the Cape of Good Hope? and if so, of what nature?

(b) What is the date when the first nomination of a candidate can be made?

(c) What is the estimated annual cost to parents of a Military cadet, not covered by pay and local allowances?

The V.C. moved that in future the ordinary meetings of Council be held on the last Wednesday in each alternate month, commencing with January. Carried unanimously.

A resolution was submitted from the Committee of Examiners in Literature to the effect that the Committee thinks it desirable that the Registrar of the University should be present at its meetings, and, if convenient, should be the Secretary of the Committee. The Council resolved that the Registrar should, as far as is practicable, act as Secretary to the Committees of Examiners.

5. The sixth examination of Candidates for certificates of proficiency in elementary subjects of instruction was held in April. The examination was conducted, by Commissioners specially appointed by the Council, at thirty different centres within the Colony. The number of Candidates registered for the examination was 296, of whom 281 presented themselves for examination, with the following result:-

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13. The only change of importance that has been made in the By-Laws is that from and after the year 1882 the examinations for degrees and certificates will commence in June instead of in October. This alteration will suit the convenience of teachers and students, and will be of special advantage to those students who intend, after passing their examinations in the Colony, to proceed to some European University.

14. Important questions have been raised in reference to the B.A. and M.A. examinations - more especially whether it is desirable to divide the former into two distinct examinations to be passed at different times in the student's course. The Council appointed a Committee to Enquire into and report on the whole subject of the revision of these examinations. The Committee has collected a large and valuable body of evidence bearing on this subject: and its Report may be expected early in the present year.

15. The Council desires to express its regret that owing to the withdrawal of the item of £1000, placed on the Estimates last year for School and College Bursaries, the funds at its disposal will be inadequate to meet the expenditure for the continuance of the System of Bursaries initiated in April, 1880: and the Council expresses its hope that the Government will provide in the Estimates for 1881-1882 for this additional and necessary expenditure.

16. The Convocation of the University, at its meeting on 29th Sept, elected the Rt Hon. Sir Bartle Frere, Bart., L.D., D.C.L., F.R.S., &c &c, to the office of Chancellor of the University, in succession to the late Hon. W. Porter. Sir Bartle Frere has intimated to the Council and the Convocation his acceptance of the office.

17. The Annual Ceremony of Confer-
ring degrees was held on the 10th of December, in the Public Library, courteously granted for the purpose by the Committee of that Institution.

18. Appended to this Report are
(a) A tabular statement, showing the number of candidates examined by the University since its

given for 5 years, at a rental of £150 p.a., with the option of renewal on the same terms for a further period of 5 years. As the increased accommodation thus obtained will enable the Council to have a University Library accessible to students, it was resolved that the following gentlemen form a Committee for the purpose of making suitable arrangements for extending the Library: - The Vice-Chancellor, Rev. H. M. Foot, Hon. C. A. Smith, Mr. J. G. Gamble, and Rev. D. Cameron: The Committee being empowered to spend a sum not exceeding £250 in the purchase of Books and fittings, and to frame Regulations for the Library - such regulations to be submitted for the approval of the Council.

A letter was read from Mr. J. C. Young, requesting his request for the refund of the Survey Fee paid by him in 1879, on the ground that he had not withdrawn from the examination, but that circumstances had rendered it impossible for him to present himself for examination. On the motion of the Rev. H. M. Foot it was ordered that, under the special circumstances of the case, the amount of the ordinary degree Fee, viz £5, be retained by the University, and the remaining £10 be returned to Mr. Young.

A letter was read from the Secretary to the S. A. College Council, stating that R. M. Ross Esq. will vacate his seat as a member of the College Council on the 31st of March, and that the appointment to the vacancy thus arising rests with the University Council. Resolved that Mr. Ross be reappointed.

A letter was read from Mr. W. L. Bristol, B.A., requesting to know whether, having been admitted to an ad eundem degree (B.A.) in this University, he may now proceed to the M. A. examination. After discussion, Mr. C. A. Smith gave notice of motion that, whereas the present regulations do not seem to be such as to enable the Council to give the desired permission, the words "or been admitted to" be inserted after the word "obtained" in the 2nd paragraph of the M. A. By-Laws, and the words "of his having obtained" be inserted before the words "the Second Class Certificate" in the same Paragraph. (Cal. 1881. p. Lxxix.)

Chairman

The question having been raised whether an ad eundem B. A., on proceeding to M. A. by examination, is eligible for a fellowship, it was moved by the Pres. H. M. Foot and carried That the Council is of opinion that no candidate should be eligible for a University Fellowship who has not matriculated and passed the examination for the degree of B. A. in this University. Mr. Foot gave notice that he would move an addition to this effect in the M. A. Bylaws. The Registrar was instructed, in communicating to Mr. Bristowe the Council's answer to his application, to inform him of the Resolution in reference to the Fellowship.

It was resolved to make the following changes, rendered necessary by the alteration in the time of holding the examinations: -

- (a) To substitute the word "February" for the word April in Par. 7 of "Bylaws for the Conduct of Examinations in General", and in Par. 3 of Bylaws for Matriculation. (Cal. pp. LXVII and LXXI.)
- (b) That the selection of examiners be made annually, in September, and the degree day held in September, or Early in October, at the option of the Vice-Chancellor.
- (c) That the Subject for the Chancellor's Medal be announced in September.

A notice of motion by the V. C., proposing that each Examiner in Literature and Science shall receive a fee of £50 for examining at Matriculation, £25 at B. A. (including the Purse Examⁿ.) and £25 at M. A.; and each Law Examiner a fee of £25 for examining at Ld. B., £25 at Ld. D., and £25 at the Law Certificate Examination, was ordered to stand over for future consideration.

The Registrar read a list of the Payments made from 30 March to 25 May, 1881, amounting to £689. 6. 2.

The Registrar submitted the following changes in the programme of the Sch: examinations for 1882, recommended by the V. C.:-

(a) Elementary.

Calendar, p. cii., d. The following to be substituted instead of the words "Outlines of the History of England and of South Africa":—"History of England and France during the period from the accession of Edward I to the death of Queen Elizabeth. [For French History reference is recommended to the "History of France" in the "Historical Course for Schools" edited by Dr. E. A. Freeman (Macmillan & Co)]"

(b) Honours.

Calendar, p. cv., par. 2. Instead of the words "Outlines of the History of English Literature" to substitute the following:—"In addition to the general outline of the history of English Literature, the examination will specially test the Candidate's acquaintance with the specimens of Lyric Poetry given in "The Child's Treasury of English Song", Part 2 (Macmillan & Co.), and with Charles Lamb's "Tales from Shakespeare", Parts 1, 2 and 3 (W. and R. Chambers)."

These changes were adopted. A further change recommended by the V. C. to add to the subjects in literature at the Honours examination the "General Sketch of European History" in Freeman's Historical course for Schools, was not adopted.

The following was selected as the Latin subject at the Honours Examⁿ in 1882:-

Caesar, de bello Gallico: from Book iv. c. 20 to Book v. c. 23, both chapters included.

Virgil: Georgics, IV. from v. 315 to the end.

In the absence of the Hon. C. A. Smith, the Rev. H. M. Foot proposed the motion standing in the name of the former - "To insert the words "or been admitted to" after the word "obtained" in Par. 2 of the M. A. By Laws: and the words "of his having obtained" before the words "the second class certificate" in the same Paragraph. (Cal. p. LXXIX.). Carried.

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who has not passed the Matriculation Examination in the University of the Cape of Good Hope, nor whose age is below 17 or exceeds 22 years: and *celeriis paribus* the nomination will be made with reference to the standing of the Candidates in this University." This was adopted, and the Registrar was instructed to publish a statement on the subject for general information.

The Vice-Chancellor reported that Parliament had voted £500 for School and College Bursaries. It was resolved that one fourth of the amount of the 12 School Bursaries awarded at the last school examinations be paid out of the general funds of the University, and the balance, viz. £180, charged to this Parliamentary Grant: and that there be ten College Bursaries of £30 yearly, terminable for two years, at the Matriculation of this year, under the following conditions:—

(a) The holder must satisfy the Vice-Chancellor that he is pursuing his studies for one of the highest University Examinations.

(b) The circumstances of the holders must be such as to require such assistance in the prosecution of their studies.

It was further resolved that there should be no limit of age in the case of these Bursaries, and that a Bursary may be held by a candidate who is an University Exhibitionsist or a Jamison Exhibitionsist: the nominations to be made at the meeting of Council to which the Examiners report the results of the Matriculation Examination.

Coakes, first in Honours, is disqualified by age from holding an Exhibition, it was resolved to award the University Exhibitions to Daniel Wessels and Herbert Veale, the Jamison Exhibitions to Edward Buckland and Charles Juritz, and a special prize of £25, in money or books, to George S. Coakes, in recognition of his position at the Head of the Honours List. The Bursaries out of the Parliamentary grant were awarded, on the specified conditions, to the first ten candidates in Honours; the Bursary, in the case of any candidate declining to accept it, to be offered to the next on the list.

The names and marks of all who were examined, and the lists of successful candidates, are given on the pages which follow.

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Greek classes. Resolved to inform Mr. Rice that it is not the business of the University Council to define what is necessary to obtain from the College authorities a certificate of having attended the classes of the College.

On the motion of the Ven. Dr. Badnell, Dr. Dale was unanimously re-elected to fill the office of Vice-Chancellor for the period of two years from the 1st of September next.

The Report of the Examiners in Science was again submitted in reference to the Grodrey Paper at the Sauney Examination, when Dr. Gill gave notice of motion that the Report be considered at the next meeting, with a view to opening up the whole subject of the Sauney Examinations.

It was resolved that the Report of the Committee on the Revision of the B.A. and M.A. examinations be considered at the next ordinary meeting.

A list of payments made since the date of last meeting was read, amounting to £909. 10. 6.

On the motion of the V. C., the Council adjourned to Saturday, the 30th inst., at 10.15 a.m.

The subject of the Fees of Examiners was brought forward by the V. C., and the Council resolved that each member of the Committees of Examiners in Literature and Science shall receive a Fee of £50 at Matriculation, £25 at B.A., and £25 at M.A.; and each Examiner in Law and Jurisprudence a Fee of £25 at LL.B., £25 at LL.D., and £25 at the Law Certificate Examination.
