It was resolved that five Bursaries of £30 a year for 2 years should be offered for competition at the Intermediate Examination in Arts in June 1883.

On the motion of the Vice-Ch. it was resolved that if in 1883 any candidate for the B.A. examination should fail, but should satisfy the examiners that his work was up to the standard of the Intermediate Examination, he might be considered for the purposes of examination to have passed the Intermediate Examination.

On the motion of the Vice-Ch. it was resolved that at the Intermediate Examination in Arts, owing to the scarcity of copies of Yonge's Three Centuries of Modern History, "The General and Constitutional History of England from Henry VIII. to the accession of George I." should be substituted.

On the motion of the Vice-Ch. it was resolved that in the Calendar the words "School Elementary Examination" should be substituted for "Elementary School Examination".

On the motion of the Vice-Ch. it was resolved that to regulate the gradation in the papers set for the School Elementary and the School Honours Examinations, as well as to secure the proper relation between the Examinations for School Honours and Matriculation, the papers for both the School Examinations should be submitted to the Moderators of the Committees of Examiners in Literature and Science; and each paper, when approved, should bear the signature of the Moderator in Literature or in Science, as the case might be, the Vice-Ch. being as at present final referee.

On the motion of the Vice-Ch. the following resolution was carried unanimously: -

Resolved

"The Council desires to express to the Rev^d James Cameron, L.L.D., its high appreciation of the important public services rendered by him during the last 9 years, which have largely contributed to the success that has attended the work of the University since its inauguration in 1873; and the Council specially acknowledges the accuracy and unfailing care with which the arrangements for conducting University examinations throughout the Colony have been made from year to year, as well as the courtesy which has marked the Registrar's official intercourse both with the members of the University and the public generally."

This resolution was read to Dr. Cameron, who replied thanking the Council.

The Vice-Ch. moved that the Council proceed to the election of a member to fill the office of Vice-Ch., from the 1st of Sept. next.

The Council proceeded to the election of a Vice-Ch. for the period of 1 year, from the 1st of September. The Ven^{ble} Archdeacon Badnall was elected and accepted the dignity.

Professor Foot informally spoke a few words expressing the Council's high appreciation of the manner in which Dr. Dale had performed his duties during the seven years of his Vice-Chancellorship.

Dr. Dale briefly replied in acknowledgement.

At the request of the Vice-Ch. it was decided that Mr. Brady should take over the Registrar's functions from this day.

The Vice-Ch. reported that he had in accordance with the resolution of the Council submitted the question of privilege for Counsel's opinion, and read the opinion of Mr. A. W. Cole, L.C. to the effect that "members of the Council are entitled to say both what they think and what they have heard regarding such person" - candidate for ad eundem degree - "always with the limitation that they do not 'set down aught in malice'."

The Secretary of the South African College Council reported that two vacancies had occurred in that Council, Mr. Ross, and the Hon^{ble} Mr. Whinston having vacated their offices by absence. On the motion of Mr. Fuller, Mr. Justice Smith & the Rev^d Mr. Steytler were appointed to fill the vacancies.

A letter was read from Mr. W. G. Fairbridge, B.A. (Canlat.) asking to be admitted ad eundem gradum in this university. The application

was granted.

Professor Hahn moved his resolution (see notice (a) in Minutes of March 29th 1882) that candidates for University Examinations should have a number assigned to each by the Registrar, by which number they should distinguish their papers, instead of, as heretofore, by their names. The motion was carried.

Professor MacOwan invited the Council to express an opinion concerning the desirability of admitting reporters to its meetings; but it was resolved, on the motion of Mr. Justice Smith, to proceed to other business.

The following notices of motion were given

(a) by Mr. Fuller: - That it is desirable to increase the number of subjects in which candidates for the School Elementary Examination are examined.

(b) by Prof. MacOwan: - That the paragraph Calendar 1882. III be altered as follows: -

III. Physical Science - viz either (1) Chemistry, or (2) Geology, or (3) Light and Heat, or (4) Electricity and Magnetism, or (5) Botany, or (6) Zoology.

The Council then proceeded to the consideration of the Further Report of the B.A. and M.A. Revision Committee.

It was decided that the two clauses "For final position etc." and "No candidate etc." ^{on page 2} should be transferred to the end of the B.A. regulations, page 3.

The Rev. Canon Ogilvie moved as an amendment to "III. Award of Scholarships, B.A." that the Porter Studentship be awarded alternately for Science and Literature.

The consideration of the amendment was postponed, and the meeting adjourned till Saturday 29th, at 10.15 A.M.

A letter was read from the Education Department stating that provision would be made in the next year's estimates for £800 for Bursaries.

It was decided to allow the temporary use of the two end rooms in the University Chambers to the Education Department, until Government can obtain the additional accommodation required.

It was decided that applications for Fellowships, accompanied by testimonials etc. should be forwarded to the Registrar on or before the 1st of August in each year.

A letter was read from Prof. Walker, explaining his absence, and giving his opinions about the motions of Prof. Macowan and Mr. Fuller.

On the motion of Prof. Macowan it was resolved that the words 'or (5) Botany, or (6) Zoology' should be added to par. III., page lxxvi. in the Calendar.

The motions of Mr. Fuller and Professor Foot were postponed.

The meeting was adjourned to Saturday, Oct. 14.

Canon Ofilvie's amendment to "III. Award of Scholarships, B.A." was lost, and the paragraph ordered to stand as it was; instructions being given to the Vice-Ch. to have the clause inserted as soon as possible instead of rule 3, in the Regulations for the Porter Studentship, and Mr. Jamison's Scholarship. cal. xciii and xciv.

"Cap. II. Master of Arts" was passed with slight verbal alterations.

In clause 3 of the Regulations for the Award of Fellowships it was decided to omit the words "or must be graduates in Arts" etc. to end of clause; and to substitute "but if no qualified candidates appear, Graduates in Arts, who have been admitted *ad eundem gradum* in this University, will be eligible.

It was resolved on the motion of Prof. Macowan to omit clause 4, fixing a limit of age.

It was resolved to insert the words "in South Africa" after the word "research" in clause 6.

The remaining clauses were passed without alteration.

The M.A. and Fellowships Amended Regulations are as follows:-

AMENDED REGULATIONS.

MASTER OF ARTS.

The examination for the degree of Master of Arts shall take place once in each year, and commence on the first Monday in June.

No candidate shall be admitted to this examination until he has furnished a certificate that he has completed his twelfth year and has paid to the Registrar a fee of five pounds, and until the expiration of one year from the time of his having obtained the degree of Bachelor of Arts in this University.

A candidate for the degree of M.A. shall be examined in any one of the five following Departments, unless he may select:-

1. Classics.
2. Modern Languages and History.
3. Mental and Moral Science.
4. Mathematics and Natural Philosophy.
5. Natural Science.

The Examination in Classics shall include-

- (a). The Greek and Latin Classic Authors.
- (b). Latin and Greek Prose Composition.
- (c). Questions—Philological, Critical, and Historical.

The Examination in Modern Languages and History shall include-

- (a). The English Language and Literature; and
- (b). Any two of the following Languages: German, Dutch, French, Italian; with the Literature and the Historical development of the Languages.
- (c). Modern History from 1453 A.D.

The Examination in Mental and Moral Science shall include-

- (a). Logic.
- (b). Psychology.
- (c). The Ethical Systems.
- (d). The History of Philosophy.
- (e). Political Economy.

The Examination in Mathematics and Natural Philosophy shall include, in addition to more advanced Papers in the subjects named for the B.A. Examination,

- (a). Geometry of Three Dimensions, excluding the Curvature of Surfaces.
- (b). Geometrical Optics.

The examination in Natural Science shall include one of the four following branches.

- (a). Physical Geography, Meteorology, Geology, Mineralogy and Crystallography.

- (b). Botany.—Morphology, Systematic Botany, and Vegetable Physiology; Zoology.—Comparative Anatomy, Systematic Zoology, and Animal Physiology.
- (c). Inorganic Chemistry; Organic Chemistry; Qualitative and Quantitative Analytical Chemistry; Chemical Technology; Agricultural Chemistry.
- (d). Light, Heat, Sound, Magnetism, Electricity.

AMENDED REGULATIONS.

FELLOWSHIPS.

1. At the conclusion of the examinations for Degrees in Arts, the Council will elect, annually, to a Fellowship in Literature or Science.
2. The Fellowship shall be of the value of £200 per annum, and be tenable for three years, but may be renewed at the discretion of the Council for a further period not exceeding three years.
3. Candidates for a Fellowship must have graduated in Arts, after examination, in this University; but if no qualified candidates appear, Graduates in Arts, who have been admitted *ad eundem gradum* in this University, will be eligible.
4. The Council will select one candidate whose University standing and other credentials show him to be the most highly qualified to prosecute study and research in some branch of Literature or Science intimately connected with South Africa. If necessary, the Competitors will be subjected to a special examination of their qualifications to prosecute the branches of research which they have chosen.
5. Every fellow shall satisfy the Council from year to year that he is prosecuting his studies and research in South Africa, in such a manner as is likely to produce useful results.
6. The branches of knowledge in which the Council would at present encourage research are:—The Languages, Ethnology, History, Laws and Customs of the Native Races of South Africa. Geography and Meteorology; Geology and Mineralogy; Botany; Zoology; Chemistry. In each case, research must be carried on with special reference to South Africa.
7. The emoluments of a Fellowship shall not be drawn concurrently with those of a Porter Studentship or a Jamison Scholarship.

I have come to the turn in a man's life when the prospect of active work begins to fade; and therefore the sympathy of those with whom I have been associated in the Council is the more grateful, as showing that I have kept to the last their esteem & confidence in doing the duties of the Vice-Chancellorship, to which they elected me.

REPORT of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope for the Year ended 31st December, 1882.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by command of His Excellency the Governor.
1883.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF THE UNIVERSITY OF THE CAPE OF GOOD HOPE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1882.

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1882:—

2. The Council desires to acknowledge the liberality of the Colonial Legislature in voting, during the last session of Parliament, the sum of £500 to meet the expenditure for the continuance of the system of bursaries initiated in 1880. The conditions of tenure of these bursaries are that the holders satisfy the Vice-Chancellor that they are pursuing their studies for some higher University examination, and that their circumstances are such as to justify the Council in giving them pecuniary assistance.

3. The Ven. Archdeacon Badnall, D.D., was elected Vice-Chancellor of the University, in the place of Langham Dale, Esq., LL.D., who resigned.

4. The Rev. J. Murray, M.A., was elected President of Convocation, in the place of the Venerable Archdeacon Badnall, D.D., who resigned.

5. A vacancy in the University Council, caused by the absence from the Colony, for more than six months, of the Rev. H. M. Foot, LL.B., was filled by Convocation, which elected the Rev. H. M. Foot, LL.B.

A second vacancy in the University Council, caused by the absence from the Colony for more than six months, of the Rev. J. Murray, M.A., was filled by Government, which appointed the Rev. J. Murray, M.A.

A third vacancy in the University Council, caused by the death of George Gordon, Esq., M.A., was filled by Convocation, which elected Donald Ross, Esq., M.A.

It was decided that the 15th of March should be the last day for receiving applications for admission to University Examinations, instead of, as previously, the first of February

The meeting was then adjourned till Saturday 17th, to finish the business on the agenda paper.
