# Report of the Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope for the Year ended 31st December, 1909.

# To be presented to Parliament.

1. The Council of the University of the Cape of Good Hope has the honour to present to His Excellency the Governor the following Report of its proceedings during the year 1909.

2. A vacancy in the sixth Council caused by the temporary absence from South Africa of Mr. J. E. Adamson, M.A., one of the representatives of the Transvaal, was filled by the appointment of Mr. W. E. C. Clarke, M.A. Mr. Clarke subsequently continued to hold office on the present Council until Mr. Adamson returned to South Africa and resumed his seat.

3. The six years' term of office of the sixth Council expired on 30th July, 1909.

13. The examiners for the Chalmers Memorial Prize in 1909 (Col. W. M. Stanford, C.B., and Professor H. C. Notcutt) reported that neither of the essays sent in was deserving of the prize, and the award was accordingly withheld; the subject viz., "Forms and methods of government among the native races in South Africa," being again set for the competition in 1910.

With a view to encouraging greater competition for this Prize, the Council has decided that the value of the Prize shall be increased in and after 1912 to  $\pounds 50$ , and that it shall from the same date be offered for competition every alternate year instead of annually as at present. The subject selected for the first competition under these new regulations, *i.e.*, in 1912, is as follows: "The respective spheres of white, native and other labour appropriate to the development of South Africa."

14. On the recommendation of the Committee of Examiners for the Cornwall and York Prize in 1909 (Dr. Schönland, Dr. Perold, Professor Ogg, Col. Nicholson, M.I.C.E., and the Vice-Chancellor) the Prize was divided between Miss Ethel M. Doidge, M.A., for her thesis on "The flora of certain Kafir beers," and Mr. A. Gordon Irving, B.A., whose thesis was on "Cement and Concrete." The essays of two other competitors were specially commended by the Examiners. The results of the competition for this Prize since its foundation in 1901 have already amply demonstrated its value as a means of encouraging original research on the

part of students by the University.

15. In recommending Mr. William A. Caldecott, B.A., for admission to the degree of D.Sc., by virtue of his thesis on "The Chemistry of Rand Banket Ore Treatment," the Examiners (Professor Hahn and Mr. R. N. Kotze) reported in the highest terms on the importance of Dr. Caldecott's original research work in the development of the cyanide process in the gold industry.

16. The Examinations for the University Licentiateship in Music, which were held for the first time in 1909, attracted no fewer than 56 entries, and 21 of the candidates succeeded in obtaining the title of Licentiate. These new examinations have evidently supplied a real want, and now that teachers and candidates are acquainted with the high standard demanded for the title, it is hoped that a considerable impetus may be given to the more advanced study of music throughout South Africa.

The increasing popularity of the Music Examinations, as a whole, has rendered it necessary for the third year in succession to increase the number of Examiners, of whom there will in 1910 be no fewer than six for the Practical Examinations. Of these six, one has been selected specially for his knowledge of strings, in deference to a desire that has been widely expressed by music teachers.

17. The regulations for the Preliminary and Final Examinations for the Degree of Bachelor in Divinity were issued during the year, and the first examination to be held thereunder will take place in December, 1910.

18. The prescribed course for the degree of B.Sc. in Agriculture will consist of two years of theoretical and two of practical work, and the detailed syllabuses for the full course are now nearly ready for issue. In the meantime the regulations for the First Year's Examination for the Degree have been published, and it is intended to hold the first examination thereunder in 1910. By resolution of the University Court of Edinburgh any candidate who obtains at this First Year's Examination not less than fifty per cent. of the maximum marks in Physics, Chemistry, Botany or Zoology will be excused examination in such subject or subjects in the First Year's Professional Medical Examination at Edinburgh University. Similar privileges will no doubt be granted before long by other recognised medical schools in the United Kingdom, and the concession is one which will be greatly appreciated by those South African students who intend to qualify for the medical profession.

19. The revision of the present scheme for the various Law Examinations was completed during the year, and new syllabuses have been published for both the Lower (Law Certificate and Civil Service Law) and Higher (LL.B. Preliminary and Final) Examinations. Both the Lower Examinations will, under the new scheme, be divided into two parts, and these Examinations will in future be held in June as well as in November in each year.

20. Among the more important changes in Examination Regulations which were decided upon during 1909, apart from the foregoing, may be mentioned the following :—

In the B.A. Examination, in and after 1911, the subject of Economics, with special reference to South African conditions, will be introduced, and Ethics and Politics, another new subject, will be made an alternative to Logic and Psychology.

In the Intermediate Examination in Arts, in and after 1911, English and Dutch will become alternative subjects and the papers in each will be set on exactly parallel lines.

In the Matriculation and Senior and Junior Certificate Examinations, in and after 1911, new and consecutive History syllabuses will come into force. These syllabuses have been carefully prepared with a view to concentrating attention on South Africa and on those aspects of modern History bearing directly upon colonial development with special reference to South Africa.

21. Further changes connected with the use of Dutch as a medium of examination were also discussed during the year with the co-operation of representatives of the various interests involved in the question from all parts of South Africa. These changes were not actually approved by the Council until after the close of the year, but they will take the form of making English and Dutch alternative subjects in the Junior Certificate Examination in 1910 and subsequently in the Senior Certificate and Matriculation Examinations also, while in addition candidates will be allowed to take the examinations either through the medium of English or that of Dutch.

22. The University received from Mr. Otto Beit, through Sir John Buchanan,

a donation to the Hall Building Fund of  $\pm 500$  accompanied by a promise of a further sum of  $\pm 500$ . This Fund showed a balance in hand of  $\pm 1,934$  2s. 5d. at the end of the year; but it is satisfactory to be able to state that since then Sir John Buchanan has been instrumental in obtaining from the daughters of the late Sir Donald Currie a donation of  $\pm 25,000$  as a memorial of their father's close connection with and his interest in South Africa. This generous contribution will enable the University to proceed without delay with the completion of the University Hall. There still remains a small deficit on the original Building and Lands Fund of  $\pm 2,250$  1s. 11d., which has been temporarily covered by the balance on the General Fund.

23. The usual Financial Statements showing the receipts and expenditure for the year 1909, and the position of each of the funds administered by the University will be found in Annexure B to this Report.

24. This being the last occasion on which a Report will be submitted by the University before the inauguration of the Union of South Africa, it may not be out of place to add here a few particulars as to the number of students who have matriculated and graduated since the Incorporation of the University in 1873, and as to the University's financial position on 31st December, 1909.

The University has admitted to degrees 1,167 graduates by examination (viz., D.Sc. 2, LL.D. 3, M.A. 45, B.A. 952, B.Sc. 41, LL.B. 124), as well as 24 holders of certificates of the old Board of Examiners (viz., M.A. 4 (1 also LL.B.), B.A. 20), and 671 graduates of other Universities by admission *ad eundem gradum* (viz. Litt.D. 2, D.Sc. 7, LL.D. 9 (2 also M.A., 2 also B.A.), M.D. 60 (2 also M.A.), M.A. 337, M.Sc. 5, B.A. 199, B.Sc. 11 (1 also M.A.), LL.B. 15 (5 also M.A., 3 also B.A.), M.B. 47 (1 also M.A.).

The total number of matriculated students entered upon the records of the University is 9,955. The proportion of these who have actually proceeded to a degree has been only ten per cent., but it is estimated that out of every 100 matriculated students 43 have passed some further University Examination to which the Matriculation Examination was a preliminary.

25. The capitalised value of the University's invested endowments, buildings and property (purchased for the extension of the site), etc., amounted, with a small uninvested balance at the close of the year, to over £100,000, as shown in the subjoined statement :—

26. Now that a further sum amounting to £25,500 has been obtained for the completion of the University Buildings (making a total of £27,500 privately contributed for the purpose) it is to be hoped that the State may see its way clear to make good the small debt referred to above in § 22 on the present building, and also the outlay of £12,239 15s. 9d. on the extension of the site bequeathed by Dr. Hiddingh, which has been temporarily met by the diversion of endowment funds from other investments. The total amount required for these two purposes is £14,490.
