Dear Professor Matthews,

I was very glad to have your letter, the other day, on my return from a holiday abroad. You have, as I am sure you must know, my deepest sympathy in the terrible problem which faces you; but I am sure, despite all the sacrifices it involves, you would never feel fully happy remaining in your work under conditions of apartheid.

While I cannot, obviously, give any guarantee or quote any definite figures, you can be sure that we shall not fail to do what we can to help, if you find it is impossible to keep your son going in his course over here. I would, naturally, have to consult my Committee, and I cannot speak for them in advance, but I do know that any specific request would certainly be received with every sympathy. Unfortunately, we have our scholarship fund now fully committed and no hopehof increasing it so I cannot do more than promise to help if possible. Anyway, do keep me informed how things go. Incidentally, as the universities are now involved in this matter of scholarships for Africans, and as our fund is exhausted, Christian Action has decided not to continue this particular aspect of our work, in future.

You will be glad to know that I had a metter from your son, this week; and am happy to say that we have been able to help him with next term's residence fees. I was also glad to note that he hopes to be in London in the near future, and shall hope to see him then.
